INSTRUCTIONS FOR PET ID FORM

Complete the items on the form, and attach a *CURRENT* picture of you with your pet. Make several copies of the completed form with the picture in place. Keep the original form with your important papers. If you have a cell phone, take a picture of the completed form and this instruction sheet with your phone.

Put the copies in places where you might need them in an emergency. For example:

- Your family's "go bag"
- Your car (pets can get loose and become lost after a vehicle accident)
- With a family member or trusted friend or neighbor

If your pet does become lost:

- Look for your pet immediately, don't wait for him/her to come home
- Tell your friends and neighbors the animal is missing, and distribute flyers with your pet's info and picture
- If you are on social media like Facebook, post that your pet is missing, and include a picture and contact information
- Call your municipal office, report that your pet is missing, and get the name and number of the animal control service that they use. Call that service, give them your pet's information and your contact information, and ask where animals are taken if they are picked up by that service; then contact that facility, and give them your information.
- If you live near the border with other towns, do the same steps with each one.
- If your pet is missing for more than a day, visit the animal shelter facilities used by each of the animal control services above, and physically look at their animals to make sure your pet is not there. Shelters are often understaffed, and information can fall through the cracks.
