Let Go, Trust God, Rise Up! -------With Pastor Eric

¹⁸I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, ¹⁹and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God. ²⁰Now

to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, ²¹to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen. (*Paul's prayer in Ephesians 3:18-21*)

Just before Lent, our congregation council gathered in the Iowa State Alumni Center for many hours on a Saturday to ask one another a series of questions about God's plan for our present and future on the tail end of COVID. We asked about what we feared before, during, and after the pandemic regarding the "congregation's life and future." We wondered what's holding us back from pursuing God's purpose for us in this place. We asked what dreams and hopes are burning in our hearts and minds for this congregation, and what opportunities has God provided us to flourish in this new time.

We challenged ourselves and one another to let go of what's holding us back. There is nothing easy about letting go but that is exactly what Jesus calls us to do every day. Let go of past sins, hurts, and mistakes because they weigh us down and keep us from learning and growing. Repenting is part of this process of "letting go," which comes from the light and power of the gospel which is forgiveness. We let go to continue the relationship in a new and deeper way with God and with other people. Once we named our fears and worries then we addressed them and began to let go. Now we had space to dream and voice the Spirit's calling from within us. What is God empowering in our dreams for our community? We came up with ideas from a recreation facility, to increased staffing for youth and adults, to a greater footprint with social media and livestream, to reaching out in meaningful ways into our own denomination, etc. Pastor Dick Wills, in <u>Walking to God's Dream</u>, states this exercise well when he writes, "Instead of asking God to bless your good ideas, ask God to alight you with the things God wants to bless!"

The space for dreaming and wonder gave way to the final task of our time together – Rising up to embrace new opportunities that we believe God is inviting us to pursue. What does this look like? It looks something like prayer and focusing on God. It looks like people getting together and trying new things. It looks like renewing traditional understandings in a new time with respect and discernment. It looks like the love of God lived out in each person, each family and in every neighborhood. Maybe it's more "reaching out events" or staffing for community facility use, or developing interns for ordained ministry, or a recreation center for gatherings and community sports year-round. What opportunities do you see as you let go, trust God, and rise up?

Much like Holy Week itself, we begin with our own hopes and expectations with praise as on Palm Sunday, then we encounter the fear, doubts and worries of what pursuing these ideas might mean when God shapes them into more than we thought or bargained for, and we resist or do nothing, like Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. On the third day, Easter comes, and we let go of our fears as new opportunities rise up among us and dreams become manageable steps and people become empowered in a new way! Try this yourself.

National Child Abuse Prevention Month

According to the most recent Iowa Department of Human Services data, 10,539 Iowa children were subject to abuse or neglect. The most common forms of abuse included denial of critical care, physical injury, exposure to illegal drugs or dangerous substance, and sexual abuse.

Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI) helps combat child abuse through prevention, safety, and stability services, as well as mental and behavioral health care.

Through regular in-home visits to families, LSI Early Childhood Services prevent child abuse by giving parents the support, education, and resources they need to build a healthy, stable home for their children. In 2021, our Early Childhood programs provided more than 11,000 of these in-home visits to families.

LSI Family Centered Services help children and families already involved in a crisis or abuse situation to become safer and more stable, and LSI's Bremwood Residential Treatment Center serves many children and youth who have experienced trauma from past abuse or neglect.

Creating Bright Futures

When Makenzey found out she was pregnant, she felt nervous and overwhelmed at the thought of being a first-time mom. She didn't know what to expect, but she wanted to create the best life for her child. While she was pregnant, Makenzey enrolled in a local service that provides free housing to expecting moms. Through the organization, she learned about LSI Early Childhood Services. With support and guidance from her LSI Parent Educator, Hannah, Makenzey prepared for a healthy birth and transition into motherhood.

"Being a new mom was really scary for me. I had no idea what I was doing," Makenzey says. "I needed to learn the basics."

Since Makenzey welcomed her daughter, Maleigha, she has since found a job she loves and saved enough money to find a home for her new family. Through it all, Hannah provided check-ins with Makenzey, introducing her to important resources, educational materials, and age-appropriate toys and activities to ensure Maleigha hit all her developmental milestones.

"Especially when you're a first-time mom, you'll have a lot of questions. I don't have a ton of support right now, but Hannah helped me and answered every question I had about being a mom," Makenzey says. "LSI has been a really helpful service."
