### **ABC Class**

Two people already recently signed up to take our next ABC class to be held sometime after the holidays during winter quarter at the NW School of Wooden Boatbuilding. The dates for the class are not decided yet, but they will be determined soon. We will likely divide the twelve-hour class into four separate evenings. This will ascertain that people will be able to stay engaged in the subject without becoming overly tired while trying to remember a significant amount of information in a short period of time.

Please advertise this class to your fellow boating friends who may not belong to our squadron. I'm sure there are many boaters in this area who haven't taken the class yet and who still need to qualify for the WA State Boater's Card. This card requirement is for persons who were born after January 1, 1955 and who operate a motorized vessel with at least a 15HP engine. In addition to obtaining certification, the ABC class is the entry-level class for people who want to become more proficient in boating safety knowledge, seamanship and navigation skills. This is the best deal in town for the price. The price of the class for either a member or a non-squadron member is \$36. This price includes the cost of the textbook and postage fees.



### **Marine Electronic Navigation or Marine Electrical**

Gordan Lacey, a member of the Squadron and electronics expert, offered to teach the Marine Electronic Navigation or Marine Electrical course. You might know Gordan, too, as an assistant manager at the West Marine Store in Port Townsend. ### Proposed bills from the WA State Department of Parks and Recreation

Wade Alonzo, Boating Program Manager in the WA State Department of Parks and Recreation, recently outlined three proposed bills his agency is considering for introduction in the next legislative session. Most boaters have no problem with a couple of "housekeeping" bills. We'd especially welcome a bill that allows an exemption for flare guns used by vessels from the Initiative 594 weapons background check requirements. Support of this bill would presumably encourage marine suppliers to once again reinstate flare gun inventory in their stores.

The Recreational Boaters of Washington (RBAW) directors and their lobbyist are working with Wade and the State Parks Boating Safety Advisory Council to provide input for drafting a vessel impound bill at the request of law enforcement. Currently, if a boat operator is stopped and found to be under the influence, law enforcement must remove the operator from the boat. This leaves law enforcement in an awkward position if an alternate operator is not available on board the boat to take it safely to port. RBAW is proposing that vessel impound would be used as a last resort only after exhausting other alternatives for securing the vessel in a safe harbor. Additionally, law enforcement does not wish to comply with all the necessary procedures required to impound a vessel, and they agree that although vessel impound is occasionally a necessary option, it was not designed to be a punitive measure for the boat owner/operator. We will continue to monitor this proposal and will support it if vessel impound is used by law enforcement as a last resort after all other options are exhausted.

### No Discharge Zone (NDZ)

In July, the Department of Ecology (DOE) issued a formal petition to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to designate the entire Puget Sound basin as a NDZ. Such a restriction like this would be the most expansive of its kind in the United States. In August, an appeal financed by the Marine Alliance, which represents mostly commercial interests, was filed with the Pollution Control Hearing Board (PCHB) which is the oversight Board of the state DOE. The PCHB challenged the viability of the faulty scientific evidence submitted by the DOE in support of their petition. RBAW is closely watching the effects of this petition. Contact Linda Newland for more specific information concerning the unreliable conclusions released by the DOE if you're interested in this subject. The US EPA should require more reliable data from the DOE before considering a NDZ designation.

# Decal Awareness Program (DAP)


There is a new replacement tool in the Vessel Safety Check (VSC) tool box called "DAP"-acronym for "Decal Awareness Program". The flyers and posters were designed to display the
three primary aspects of the United States Power Squadrons: EDUCATION, SAFETY, and
CAMARADERIE. Using the Vessel Safety Check decal at its nucleus is beneficial; since it is a
recognizable symbol. Another benefit of the flyer is Squadrons and VEs can add their contact
information electronically from their computer. Also displayed on the flyer is the Quick Response
(QR) code for the USPS web site, plus a QR code for the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary VSC
locater web site. This is a new National project that adheres to the USPS branding manual policy.

"Save a Life" boater safety signs were designed to be placed at recreational merchant locations and boat ramps. By including the form 7012, boaters will know in advance what is expected in order to pass a VSC. One of the signs is designed to have a Squadron address box and the other is a Universal sign that combines the USPS and USCGAUX.


With your leadership and support, the Decal Awareness Program can increase the number of annual Vessel Safety Checks.

- 1 Oct The moon sets early, making tonight great for stargazing. Look for Saturn low in the west at dusk, Mars 2 fist-widths to the upper left near Sagittarius and the Summer Triangle directly overhead.
- 3 Oct At dusk, Venus is 2 finger-widths below the crescent moon. The pair sets within 2 hours of sunset.
- 4 Oct The moon is at apogee, 63.7 Earth-radii (406,000 kilometers) away.
- 5 Oct At dusk, Saturn is 2 finger-widths to the moon's left, and Antares is 3 finger-widths below Saturn.
- 6 Oct The moon lies between Saturn, 4 finger-widths to the lower right, and Mars, 2 fist-widths to the lower left. Mars passes within 0.2 degrees of Kaus Borealis, at the top of the Teapot constellation Sagittarius.
- 7 Oct At sunset, Mars is 4 finger-widths to the moon's lower left. Mars is ½ degree to the left of Kaus Borealis.
- 8 Oct Mars is 4 finger-widths to the moon's lower right.
- 9 Oct In the early evening, bright Altair is 2½ fist-widths above the moon. Look for the other stars in the Summer Triangle: Vega, 3 fist-widths to the upper right, and Deneb, 3½ fist-widths to the upper left.
- 11 Oct If you have a clear view of the eastern horizon, look for Mercury and Jupiter an hour before dawn. Mercury is 0.79 degrees to Jupiter's left.
- 16 Oct The moon is at perigee, 56.11 Earth-radii (358,000 kilometers) away. Perigee occurs 19.4 hours after the full moon, so we can expect tidal extremes.
- 18 Oct By midnight, the moon passes within 0.34 degrees of Aldebaran.
- 19 Oct Before dawn, Aldebaran is 1 finger-width to the moon's lower right.
- 20 Oct The moon and Betelgeuse rise an hour before midnight.
- Before dawn, the moon is between Pollux, 1½ fist-widths to the upper left, and Betelgeuse, 2 fist-widths to the lower right. Procyon is the same distance to the lower left.
- 24 Oct Before first light, Regulus is 4 finger-widths to the moon's lower left.
- 27 Oct Low in the southwest at dusk, Saturn, Venus and Antares line up less than 2 finger-widths from each other.
- 28 Oct Before dawn, Jupiter is less than 1 finger-width to the moon's upper right.
- 31 Oct The moon is at apogee, 63.8 Earth-radii (407,000 kilometers) away.


