MASSACHUSETTS EMT-INTERMEDIATE

All individuals seeking to recertify a Massachusetts EMT-Intermediate certification in 2015 need to follow the steps outlined on this page. Please read it carefully.

RECERTIFICATION STEPS

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SCOPE OF PRACTICE TRANSITION

Prior to this initiative, there were over 40 different EMS certification levels across the country; in many cases the same title meant very different skill sets and training requirements. In an effort to standardize all EMS certifications there is a nationwide initiative to update all providers to the most modern *minimum* standards on top of which statewide treatment

protocols will build.

WHY?

The Massachusetts EMT-Intermediate certification is based on curriculum from 1985. At that time, there was a significant disparity of Paramedics in especially rural areas. In the almost 30 years since the 1985 curriculum was developed, there have been a number of significant changes that have reduced the need for the EMT-I in its current design. The goal of the Advanced-EMT is to provide a higher level of care than the EMT-I for chronic medical patients (a health population we are dealing with far more than trauma patients). The AEMT would still have the ability to perform advanced airway interventions (not intubation, but a supraglottic airway) and IV access (with additional medications), but the focus would be on enhanced assessment with much more anatomy/physiology education and an understanding of disease processes.

This transition course will be more extensive than the other levels. The skills and knowledge gap between what an EMT-I85 and AEMT are expected to know is significant. At the AEMT level, there is a much heavier emphasis placed on anatomy and physiology in addition to a focus on chronic disease processes.

HOW?

The Department has released guidelines regarding the curriculum for these EMT-I to AEMT transition courses (A/R 2-212A) and courses are beginning to become available around the state. Please visit the OEMS website for more information on where to find these courses.

EMT-Intermediates must transition to "Advanced EMT" by 3/31/17 or drop to the EMT-Basic level by completing the EMT-Basic recertification standards and emailing oems.recert@

CONTINUING EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

OVERVIEW: Current continuing education requirements are now broken into 3 categories totaling 50 hours. As a total, at the EMT-I level, it is 12 hours less than the prior standard. The new requirements involve redesigned and innovative education focused on increased clinical skills and changes in practice.

APPROVAL & SUBMISSION: Training institutions and Continuing Education sponsors no longer submit rosters to the state but will retain copies on file; it is the individual EMT's responsibility to maintain documentation of their completed continuing education in the form of either a course certificate or copy of roster. **All courses** must have an OEMS approval number (if NREMT certified, courses must have a state and/or CECBEMS approval number).

Important fact: If you do not have NREMT certification and elect to test into the NREMT during your recertification period (which is optional), you will fulfill the continuing education requirements for your Massachusetts certification and can continue through the recertification process (to step 3). Thereafter, recertifying your NREMT certification will automatically satisfy Massachusetts steps 1 & 2.
