Memory Keepers Discovery Team: Working to End **American Indian Health Disparities**

The element of fire is important to Neil Henderson, who says that keeping a gas fireplace lit at the Memory Keepers center is a way to honor his Oklahoma Choctaw heritage.

"Back home we build a fire for gatherings with the belief that virtually everything comes from the sun, so a fire is like bringing a little piece of sun to where you are so the power from it radiates into the special occasion," said Henderson.

At the center he says the constantly burning flame serves a reminder to the team that they are serving an important role in Native American communities to reduce disparities of health.

Keepers, Henderson is a professor in the department of biobehavioral health and population sciences on the Medical School's Duluth campus.

Memory Keepers is being funded out of a state budget surplus in 2015, and is one of four programs being launched out of the University of Minnesota Medical School to study health equity in tribal and rural communities in Minnesota.

Located in downtown Duluth at 7th Avenue and First Street, the design of the space was important to Henderson and his team as plans were made for renovating an existing building to become a research center for Native Americans.

With an entryway aligned to the street and Lake Superior at a northwest angle, tuning it into

the "Four Directions", part of tradition American Indian spiritual teachings was important.

Even though the space is intended for scientific research, developers of the program knew it was important to create a space that felt culturally comfortable as they investigate health issues that affect Native Americans disproportionately.

Keeping the open window space that allows a connection to Lake Superior is part of that thoughtful design. A conference space, lounge seating and kitchen remain in one great room so that it can still be used for large events, with a central round table in medicine wheel colors and cedar wood paneling.

though the space is a "lab", incorporating a ceremonial room with native medicines and exhaust fans that allow the ceremonial burning of sage, sweetgrass and tobacco without fire alarms going off was also key to serving Native people with respect.

Henderson says that even

"It's a space made uniquely for Native people as part of the University of Minnesota Medical School, and yet we can use these traditional medicines on special occasions," Henderson said.

Coming from a long academic background studying diabetes and dementia in Native Americans, Henderson says that the relationship between those two conditions is complicated and central to the current research at Memory Keepers.

"We want to learn the best way

to intervene when someone is developing diabetes, doesn't yet have symptoms, and how to forestall the potential development of related dementia," said Henderson.

Diabetes can contribute to cardiovascular disease and Alzheimer's progression, and has components of social behavior such as inactivity related to obesity, and is correlated to lower educational levels and socioeconomic status.

When someone has both diabetes and dementia, Henderson says the two conditions can interact with greater risk of vascular dementia when diabetes is poorly controlled. When diabetes is not under control and blood sugars run too high, damage to the interior of blood vessel walls can result, leaving a higher risk of hemorrhagic (bleeding) stroke.

"Rates of diabetes and cognitive impairment are increasing across all populations with both on the Top 10 Killers list in the U.S., and when you look them then operating concurrently there is an even higher risk of health status and dysfunction," Henderson said.

and dementia is even higher than the collective population. Diabetes is three times higher than for whites, and American Indians have the second highest rate of dementia across five different population groups.

For American Indians diabetes

Henderson says that it's not genetics driving these alarmingly high rates of dementia and diabetes, but rather life vulnerabilities. "For American Indians as a

population we are talking about toxic stress at a higher magnitude than normal that is related to life experience vulnerabilities that include higher rates of low socioeconomic status with more serious health outcomes," Henderson said.

He points to studies of children who live in areas of poverty, compared to kids from wealthier neighborhoods. The study looked at the telomeres of the children: telomeres are the end caps on our chromosomes, like the plastic tips at the end of a shoelace they act as a way to keep things from unraveling. Shorter telomeres indicate DNA damage that can be associated with poorer health.

Stress and poor diet can shorten telomeres and result in greater rates of chronic diseases and shorter life spans. Children in the poor homes had shorter telomeres, and Henderson says that shows why financial stress can be related to poorer health.

According to Henderson, vulnerable populations such as American Indians accumulate social traumas that eventually convert to physical diseases, such as diabetes, vascular weakness, and dementia.

With the first research grant scheduled to begin in January 2019, the \$10 million grant will allow researchers to focus on dementia in American Indians in area Anishinaabe tribes, Canadian Anishinaabe, and Wisconsin Oneida.
