Philadelphia Ave. to undergo 'refresh'

Veterans Day service to be held at Legion Hall





Business owners on Philadelphia Avenue attended a meeting at City Hall Wednesday, Oct. 18 to learn about grants being offered by the Egg Harbor City Neighborhood Preservation Program to "refresh" the look of the downtown business district.

Property owners learned they are eligible to receive up to \$5,000 to upgrade their storefronts, which the NPP program hopes will revitalize the avenue and attract more businesses to lease vacant storefronts.

Commercial property owners and business owners operating on Philadelphia Avenue met with NPP Coordinator Karen Adams and design consultant Cindy Williams, who provided a preview of grant requirements and façade improvements, including pressure washing, painting with a suggested color scheme, awnings, blade signage, window and door upgrades and more.

Adams distributed applications and explained that businesses on the 100- to 300-blocks will be eligible to participate in the NPP's first round of funding this year. The grants will be extended to properties in other blocks in 2024 and 2025. Grants will be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis each year.

Carmen DeFeo, owner of Al's Luncheonette on the 400-block said he would participate in the program when his block is eligible.

"I'm very excited about this program," he said during the meeting. "I will definitely participate when it's my turn."

Business owners who agree to participate will have a private consultation with Williams to

develop a plan for their property.

Some properties may only need new signage, others may need painting or new doors, Williams said.

The EHC NPP is funded through a five-year grant awarded to the city by the NJ Neighborhood Preservation Program in 2022. The city receives \$125,000 a year to fund improvements and programs in the NPP District and is required to provide a \$25,000 cash match.

The district includes both sides of Philadelphia Avenue and the west side of Cincinnati Avenue from the pike to Duerer Street, and the east side of the 100-block of Liverpool Avenue.

Other improvements being undertaken by the NPP include establishing a pocket park called Archway Greene at the old Ed and Rick's site next to Crossroads, and upgrading "First Responder Park" on the corner of Philadelphia Avenue and the White Horse Pike to include new landscaping, a stainless steel center of place sign, and a new flagpole to display the American flag along with a first responder flag.

The program also provides funding for community events, including the Food Truck Festival, Fall Family Festival and the upcoming Winter Bazaar. The program also funds security cameras, seasonal flowers for Philadelphia Avenue, and murals and art installations on vacant storefront windows.

The city has introduced a new ordinance to prevent salt and other de-icing materials from polluting the environment.

The ordinance has been mandated by the NJ Department of Environmental Protection's new MS4 requirements to prevent these materials from flowing into the stormwater system and polluting the waterways.

The new ordinance requires residents to safely store salt and other de-icing materials in a closed container to prevent precipitation from seeping out, or in a permanent structure on private property.

The structure must have an impermeable floor, roof and walls to protect the materials from wind and rain. Businesses using de-icing materials are required to perform weekly inspections to ensure there are no leaks.

Violations of the new ordinance can result in a fine of \$100 for the first offense, \$200 for the second offense and \$300 for subsequent offenses.

A public hearing on the ordinance is scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 9 at Egg Harbor City Hall, 500 London Ave.

Because City Hall will be closed on Nov. 10 in observance of Veterans Day, the grace period for fourth quarter tax payments has been extended to Nov. 13.

Fourth quarter taxes are normally due on Nov. 1, with a 10-day grace period before penalties and 18% interest accrues.

Due to the holiday, the grace period has been extended to Monday, Nov. 13.

Taxpayers can pay their taxes in person at the Tax Collector's Office or use the online tax portal to make their payments.

In addition to paying quarterly taxes, property owners are required to pay any outstanding balance on their utility account that pre-dates the sale of the utility to New Jersey American Water Company on July 1, 2023.

Tax Collector Laura Shaw recommends taxpayers not wait until the last minute to pay their taxes, which can result in paying additional penalties and interest. Shaw will be preparing the delinquent tax sale notification on Nov. 14 for public notification in the newspaper.

Any outstanding tax and utility debt will be sold as tax liens at an online auction scheduled for Wednesday, Dec. 13. Avoid embarrassment and difficulties removing a tax lien by paying on time, Shaw recommends.

On Saturday night, clocks are set back one hour. That means we get an extra hour of sleep and the sun will rise a little earlier.

Residents who had street trees planted in front of their homes last November are reminded that they are required to provide their newly planted tree with at least 20 gallons of water per week through the fall season.

Adding a bag of clean hardwood mulch at a depth of 2 inches around the base of the tree will keep the tender roots warm during the winter and prevent weeds and grasses from competing with the tree roots for water and nutrients.

Most importantly, keep the mulch at least 6 inches away from the tree trunk so it can breathe. Mulching too close to the stem of the tree can cause the bark to soften, can push out roots above the root flare, and cause fungus or attract insects.

Mulch 6 inches away from the trunk in a donut shape out to the drip line. NEVER pile a cone of much around the trunk of the tree!

Trees should not be pruned until they are at least 2 years old.

Early winter is the best time to control spotted lanterfly population

Whenever we change the clocks back or forward is a good time to ensure your home is safe:

- Replace your smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries
- Replace outdoor lightbulbs with LEDs
- Have your furnace inspected and filter changed to ensure efficient operation
- Check your emergency kit or 'Go Bag'
- Update your list of medications
- Reset timers for outdoor lighting and security systems.

The dreaded spotted lanternfly, an invasive species that is working its way across the country after first appearing in Berks County, Pennsylvania in 2014, lays its eggs in late September and early October, so early winter is the best time to control the population by removing egg masses from trees.

It's still warm enough in late November, early December to spend an hour or so outdoors checking for egg masses on the bark of trees, around decks and on rocks and garden ornaments.

To eliminate the proliferation of the beauteous by annoying spotted red lanternfly, crush egg masses to kill them before scraping them into a sealable plastic bag filled with a hand sanitizer and disposing the sealed bag in the trash.

SustainableEHC has provided spotted lanternfly crush cards with instructions, both in English and Spanish, on the counter at the information center at Egg Harbor City Hall.

Currently, all New Jersey counties are under quarantine, which means residents should check their vehicles for spotted lanternflies before traveling in or out of the state.

The pesky bug is harmless to humans but can devour certain garden plants, fruit and hardwood trees and grapevines.

The Tree of Heaven (*Ailanthus altissima*), which is also a rapidly growing invasive species brought to the U.S. from China as a specimen tree in the 1700s, is the host plant for the spotted lanternfly. The Tree of Heaven, which is a highly invasive, gigantic tree found growing in yards and even through cracks in foundations and sidewalks, becomes even more aggressive when it is cut down.

According to the Penn State Extension, to effectively remove a Tree of Heaven, it should be chemically treated in summer to kill the tree before it is removed, or the roots will send out new shoots.

One of the best ways to control the proliferation of the invasive tree, it's best to remove sprouts when they first appear by digging them out before the taproot develops.

Road construction starts at dangerous Galloway Twp. intersection



Motorists traveling Route 30 in Galloway Township will experience lane and shoulder closures in both directions this week as intersection improvements start at Route 30 and Cologne Avenue (CR 614).

The improvements, which many people in the Egg Harbor City/Germania area believe are much needed at the dangerous intersection, are being funded with a \$4.1 million allotment of funds reserved for road improvements in five South Jersey towns.

From 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Wednesday through Friday, Nov. 1-3, the right lane on Rt. 30 will be closed in one direction at a time to accommodate the installation of traffic signal poles.

Planned improvements call for the reconfiguration of the roadway to establish a left turn lane from Rt. 30 onto Cologne Avenue. New traffic signals will control the intersection.

After the left-turn lanes are designated, Rt. 30 eastbound will be restriped to three lanes at the intersection: one lane will be for left turns only, and the other two lanes will take motorists straight through the intersection. The westbound side will have two lanes, with one for left-hand turns and the other straight through. The corners will be improved to have ADA-compliant curb ramps, pedestrian push buttons and countdown crossing signals.

The work is subject to weather conditions.

Time is ticking to get your ANCHOR property tax rebate



If you haven't already received your ANCHOR property tax rebate there's still time to register to receive up to \$1,750 from the State of New Jersey Division of Taxation.

The Affordable New Jersey Communities for Homeowners and Renters (ANCHOR) property tax relief program was approved by the governor and legislature last year to update and expand the former Homestead Benefit program and extend eligibility to renters for the first time. It also increased the threshold for eligible homeowners to qualify.

Renters are eligible to receive \$450 to \$1,500, while seniors can qualify for \$700 to \$1,750.

The state has already sent direct deposits for property tax year 2020 to 700,000 New Jersey taxpayers who filed to receive their payment by direct deposit. Those who requested reimbursement via a paper check should receive their rebate in the mail by Nov. 1.

Payments will continue to be rolled out as eligible residents apply.

The goal of the rebate program is to make living in New Jersey more affordable.
