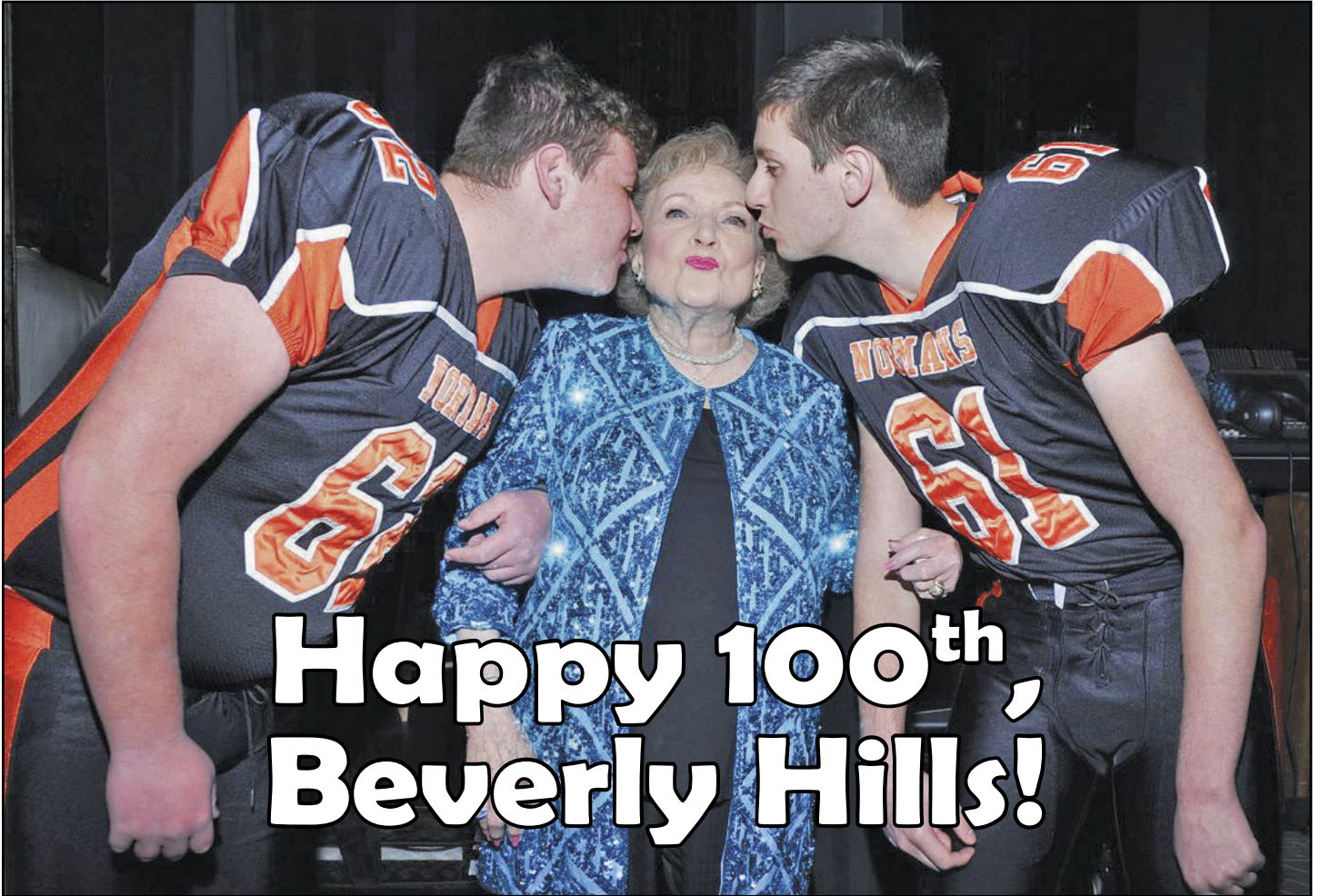

even higher places. So if you enjoy reading your *Alumni Highlights*, please consider making a contribution and sending in a class note today.

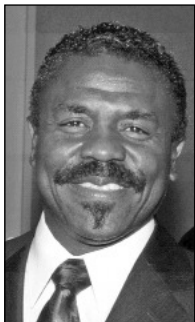

Another busy, productive year in Norman Nation

This year's Performing Arts fall play was a comedy and a huge success. Alfred Hitchcock's *The 39 Steps* was not only funny, but also tremendously entertaining. The performances by our advanced theatre group were outstanding, led by, among others, Anthony Lofaso, Jackson Prince, Roman Zaragoza and Ellie Dubin. The spring musical *The Wiz* featured a number of students in and outside of the Performing Arts department.

Our Academic Decathlon team finished 5th in the state of California for the second year in a row. Doug Wu, Laurie Wang, Orion Fan and Daniel Raban were our high scorers. They each scored well over 8,000 points.

Our Robotics team had a fantastic showing at the Los Angeles competition. They won 2 of their first 3 matches and

finished in the finals.

Austin Mack led our Deca Program in the regional competition with a 2nd place finish in accounting and he is traveling to Atlanta, Georgia for the National competition in May.

Our Culinary program sent four students to the state competition. They were Joel Gabai, Victoria Unzon, Evan Carl and Christine Cedeno.

Over 46% of our student body participated in the Athletics program this year. During the fall and winter seasons, eight of our teams advanced to the CIF-SS playoffs and we're expecting the success to continue with our spring sports. Girls Volleyball, Girls Tennis, Wrestling, Boys Water Polo, Boys and Girls Cross Country, and Boys and Girls Basketball all qualified for the playoffs. Lydia Choi finished 9th in the state in Girls

Golf. Liat Hackman was the Ocean League MVP for Girls Volleyball and Siaviash Yektafar was the Ocean League MVP for Boys Basketball.

Our "College Fair" and our "Career Day" events are considered to be the best of their kind at the high school level. Our College Fair gives our students the opportunity to interface with some of the top universities in the country. Our PTSA does a terrific job of assisting our Counseling Department in facilitating this event. Our Career Day allows for over 100 professionals to come onto our campus and provide our students with insights into a variety of exciting fields.

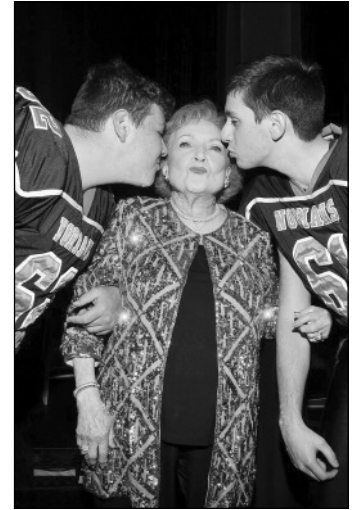
Hawthorne turns 100, too

A new look for Beverly High

The Beverly Hills Unified School District Board of Education is studying construction plans for Beverly High. A new feature called "Norman Walk" would transform Heath Avenue, where vehicle access is currently allowed, into a pedestrian walkway that might include benches, tables and an amphitheater near Salter Theatre. The three existing pedestrian bridges would be removed.

NOTE: Many of the following notes from Class of 1953 were inspired by a group e-mail soliciting "good news."

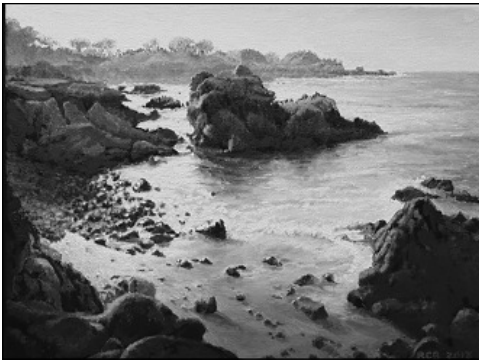

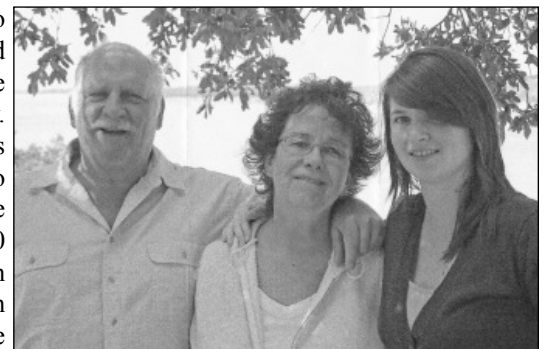

Reflections: Beverly in the movies and life lessons

Some memories from Beverly High in the 1950s:

1. A few years ago my wife and I were having dinner with friends and their then-teenage daughters. The girls were not paying attention to the adults' conversation until something came up where I mentioned having gone to Beverly High. Their ears perked up and they immediately asked me what my zip code had been. (Their favorite TV show at the time was *Beverly Hills 90210* about a fictitious West Beverly High.) I was amused, but informed them that although zip codes had not yet been invented when I was there, it would have been 90210. I then disappointed them by explaining the student behavior at my school didn't quite live up to everything they saw on their show.

Sitting on top of a hill, with a broad expanse of terraced grass leading up to it, Beverly High looks like a small college campus. With its location adjacent to the back lots of 20th Century Fox movie studios during the '50s, it was a natural to have its facade used in motion pictures

depicting stories set in a college and, in fact, it has been.

Another building in the school, the Swim Gym, was also used in movies, most famously the Christmas classic, *It's a Wonderful Life*. It was the site for the dance scene, with the dancers falling into the pool when half the basketball floor was retracted.

The English Department, in particular, had three outstanding teachers who I remembered particularly: Don Davies, Eunice Schmidt and Fred Spellicy. Don was only there for four years before moving on to a distinguished international career in education, management and government, but I was lucky that it was the four years I was there. I learned both English and journalism from him. Schmidt and Spellicy also helped me to appreciate and write poetry and essays.

Fred Spellicy taught Shakespeare so well that our senior year, when the curriculum had been completed and a few weeks remained in the school year, the class voted to study an additional Shakespearean play.

Eunice Schmidt taught *Canterbury Tales*, requiring us to memorize the opening

verses in the original Old English. She did her job so well that 35 years later, when she was invited to a class reunion, she mentioned that she hoped we all still remembered the verses, and was stopped throughout the reunion by former students still able to recite what we had learned. She was beloved by her students. Years later I learned that the 1995 movie, *Mr. Holland's Opus*, starring Richard Dreyfuss '65, about a music teacher adored by all his former students, was partially inspired by her.

2. High school students realize that football games sometimes involve the risk of fights breaking out between students from opposing schools, so faculty in the athletic departments remain vigilant, but such challenges do not normally involve a choir director. Beverly had an award winning *cappella* choir, which participated in a concert at Redlands University along with many other choirs from Southern California. We took a chartered bus to the



university and the concert was wonderful. On the way home, the bus stopped at a drive-in restaurant. It was a Friday night, and the drive-in was filled with students from a nearby high school. When we all returned to the bus, there were four tough looking fellows sitting in the seats, announcing they were going to go to Beverly Hills. The options of trying to force them off the bus or calling the local police could have led to fights and a riot. Choir director Glen Case had a smarter idea. He asked us all to get on the bus, standing where there were no available seats, and told the driver to proceed on our way. After 10 minutes, the intruders began glancing nervously over their shoulders to see if any of their friends were in cars driving behind us. Once having discovered there was a car following, they announced they had decided not to continue the journey. We all warmly wished them a nice evening as they left the bus. No fight occurred, likely injuries to any of the boys and girls in our choir were averted, and we all learned a lesson that night in adult behavior.

'77 grad second in command at Homeland Security

Days before Christmas, the U.S. Senate voted 54-41 to confirm Alejandro Mayorkas '77 as deputy secretary of the Department of Homeland Security, the department's No. 2 job.

Mayorkas, former United States Attorney for Southern California and lawyer and director of the United

States Citizenship and Immigration Services, was one of the first cabinet nominees considered under new Senate rules that permit confirmation with a majority vote. He was confirmed without a single Republican vote.

In a letter to Sen. Thomas R. Carper (D-Del.), the committee chairman, Senators John McCain

(R-Ariz.) and Tom Coburn (R-Okla.) cited their objections on the grounds of an ongoing investigation into allegations that Mayorkas mismanaged the operation of a visa program for wealthy foreign investors. Mayorkas denies the charges.

As deputy secretary, Mayorkas is responsible for managing the day-to-day operations of DHS, which includes the U.S. Border Patrol, Immigration and Customs Enforcement, Transportation

Security Administration and other agencies.

"I believe there is an overwhelming need for leadership at DHS and overwhelming case that Director Mayorkas will be an excellent Deputy Secretary and should be promptly confirmed," Carper wrote in his own letter prior to the confirmation vote on Dec. 20, 2013.

Selwyn '78 relocates gallery to Beverly Hills

The Marc Selwyn Fine Art Gallery opened its new location in Beverly Hills with a private cocktail reception in February.

"Part of the beauty of [the space] is that it's in an early historic building that feels almost like it could be in downtown or an old building in Hollywood," Marc Selwyn '78 said. "It's in such a central location that it's convenient for people all over the Westside and all the way to Hollywood. Usually this type of building doesn't exist here."

The gallery, located in a 1940s brick building at 9953 South Santa Monica Blvd., was renovated by architect Fred Fisher. Previously, the building was an auto shop called Al Grimmet's Garage.

Selwyn worked for Sotheby's on Rodeo Drive for seven years and was a Grant Selwyn Fine Art Gallery West Coast Partner before owning his own gallery, formerly located in the Miracle Mile, in 2003.

"I certainly have a long involvement with Beverly Hills," Selwyn said. "It was a natural place for me to continue my business."

Selwyn began pursuing his interest in art while attending New York University where he obtained his Juris Doctor Degree.

"NYU was in SoHo, which was the center of the art world at that time in New York," Selwyn said. "I started writing art criticism and going to galleries and decided after practicing [law] for a short time, my passion was in art and not so much in real estate law, which was what I was doing."

Selwyn said his parents were strong influences in cultivating his art passion. His father, Paul Selwyn, is the Wallis Annenberg Center for the Performing Arts founding president and a former member of the Planning and Architectural commissions. His mother Joan Selwyn is a former Fine Art commissioner and the Friends of Robinson Gardens founder.

"I just hope that the gallery will become sort of a community center and a place where people come to appreciate art," Selwyn said. "I hope that we'll be able to help educate Beverly Hills residents about contemporary art and expose them to things that they wouldn't otherwise see."

Taste of Broadway celebrates 10th anniversary

Taste of Broadway, the city of Beverly Hills' musical theater program for children, celebrated its 10th anniversary in June 2013 with a special show.

"This [show] is a little different because I wanted to celebrate the last 10 years, so we're actually revamping songs from the past 10 years," said Program Director Jenny Gordon '89, who usually picks 20 to 25 songs from various musicals to align with an overall theme chosen for each show. Narration is included between the songs.

"Every kid has a narration. Every kid is in at least five or six numbers, and basically I've written 26 shows, and that way every single kid has their moment to shine," said Gordon.

The 10th anniversary

show's theme was the Taste of Broadway program, featuring songs that have been fan and performer favorites. The narration reflected the program's accomplishments in its first 10 years.

The landmark show included performances by 10 Taste of Broadway graduates, including some of Gordon's first students, now college seniors. The show also featured songs from *Rent*, *The Addams Family*, *Bye Bye Birdie*, *Les Miserables* and *Fiddler on the Roof*. Larry Cooper, who has been with the program for the last seven years, provided accompaniment.

At Beverly High, Gordon was a part of the Madrigals Singers. She said the late Joel Pressman was her mentor.

"At that time, performing arts was a lot more available

than it is now unfortunately," said Gordon.

Although some Beverly Hills Unified School District K-8 schools have musicals for certain grades, there was not a musical theater program in place when Gordon returned to Beverly Hills 10 years ago.

"I went back to Beverly Vista and saw that the arts were not as prevalent as they were when I was here. They didn't have a musical theater program, per se, so I went to the city to see if they'd be interested in me bringing a musical theater program to the city, and so I wrote a proposal and the rest is history," said Gordon, who attended Beverly Vista.

"The biggest thing for me, and I've seen it over the last 10 years, is that kids really learn a sense of self when they do

this program," said Gordon. "It really gives them self-confidence; it teaches them how to work together with kids of all different ages. It creates something really special and that's the biggest thing that's happened over these years."

'01 grad takes family business to next generation

When Ben Parnassi '01 took over the family business—Beverly Hills-based World of Video and Audio (WOVA)—he said he was excited about the changes in the industry and the opportunities they would bring.

“It’s been an exciting journey so far,” Parnassi told *Beverly Hills Weekly* last November. “Just in the past five years, when I officially took over, we’ve rebranded, launched new websites, hired new staff, remodeled our 5,000-square-foot facility and acquired a new company in 2009. We acquired Betasptodvd.com and rebranded and re-launched it in 2010.”

Parnassi’s father opened the business in 1982 as an electronic superstore and movie rental company.

“I’ve been going to work with my dad since a very young age and technology has always fascinated me,” says Parnassi, who graduated from El Rodeo, Beverly and USC and holds an MBA from Pepperdine. “I’ve enjoyed learning about different

gadgets and being ahead of the curve with technology and the audio/video industry in general.”

WOVA has transformed into a two-division business—WOVA Media and WOVA Events—with clientele including The Beverly Hills Hotel, Sony, CAA, William Morris Endeavor, Paradigm and The Peninsula Beverly Hills. WOVA Media offers post-production services, including transfers, conversions, duplicating and editing. WOVA Events specializes in audio-visual and lighting for special events such as film festivals, corporate events, award shows, galas, presentations, movie premieres and fashion shows.

“What makes us unique is that we’re the only company that exists with those two divisions under one main parent company, and we’re the only company that does what we do in Beverly Hills,” says Parnassi. “We are essentially a one-stop shop where through our media division, we can create and edit a video presentation, and through

our audio/visual rental company, present that video in the most effective way.”

Last fall, WOVA Media launched *transferninjas.com*, an online business that transfers items such as home movies, audiocassettes and photos to digital format, to serve the general public in Beverly Hills and beyond.

“[Clients will] ship [their media] over to us and we process their order and ship it back to them,” says Parnassi. “It’s all done online. Basically, it specializes in converting treasured family memories into digital formats that can be enjoyed anytime and anywhere.”

Betasptodvd.com, the company WOVA re-launched in 2010, provides a similar service for production and post-production professionals.

Parnassi recently donated his services to transfer the late Beverly High choral director Joel Pressman’s videotapes of Beverly High productions to a digital format, creating a permanent video archive at Beverly.

“Five years ago, I didn’t know where this business would take me, but being involved every single day has opened up my eyes to different opportunities,” says Parnassi. “At the end of the day, it’s not what I want in business that’s important, but rather finding out what our clients’ needs are and making them happier by finding a solution.”

Simon '73 honored for T.V. career, philanthropy

When the Beverly Hills Athletic Alumni Association honored *The Simpsons* co-creator Sam Simon '73 for his contributions to the arts last October, that was just one of many accolades the Emmy-winning T.V. writer/producer/director has collected in recent months.

In February, the Writers Guild of America, West (WGAW) awarded him the Valentine Davies Award for his community service and humanitarian efforts. This followed the lifetime achievement honor he received in November, WGAW’s Animation Writers Caucus 16th Annual Animation Writing Award. In addition to

The Simpsons, Simon’s credits include *Taxi*, *Cheers*, *The Tracey Ullman Show* and *The Drew Carey Show*.

“The sort of lifetime achievement stuff that I’m getting now is kind of like Tom Sawyer’s funeral because they all know I’m sick,” Simon told *The Hollywood Reporter*. “I am getting buildings named after me and awards and stuff. The truth is, I have more money than I’m interested in spending. Everyone in my family is taken care of. And I enjoy this.”

Last year, following his colon cancer diagnosis, Simon announced his plans to donate most of his royalties from *The Simpsons* to charity. Simon, who founded The Sam Simon Foundation about a dozen years

ago and has long been involved with PETA, is no newcomer to philanthropy.

Much of his charity work involves helping both animals and humans. The Sam Simon Foundation’s mission is to “save the lives of dogs to enrich the lives of people.” The foundation’s work includes adopting dogs from shelters and training them as certified assistance dogs, operating a mobile spay/neuter clinic, and operating a mobile vegan food bank. He also serves on the national boards of Save the Children and PETA, which recently named its headquarters after him. Global marine conservation organization Sea Shepherd Conservation Society recognized Simon’s contributions

by naming a ship after him.

At Beverly, Simon was a cartoonist for *Highlights* and member of the wrestling and football teams. While attending Stanford, he worked as a newspaper cartoonist and later became the *San Francisco Examiner*’s sports cartoonist.

DJ '00 finds place in Hollywood club scene

During his high school years, Noah Greenwald '00 played guitar constantly—5–6 hours on school days; 8 hours each day on weekends. This spring, the musician, now a DJ known as Noah + The Man, plans to release his debut album, “Landing in LA.”

“I never thought that I was going to end up becoming a DJ,” Greenwald told *Alumni Highlights* last September.

“I have really been very lucky in that I was able to book very consistent gigs over the past couple of years up in Hollywood while playing sets that have been predominantly to entirely my own original music,” he said. “And that is something that to my knowledge I don’t think any other DJ in Los Angeles has done.”

When Greenwald goes onstage, he knows what track to play first but he determines the rest of the set as he goes along. “It’s all about reading the crowd and gauging their reaction,” he said.

Having a club residency helps Noah + The Man build a fan base, which Greenwald said includes a dedicated core of Beverly classmates. After reading an article about Noah + The Man in *Beverly*

Hills Weekly, counselor John Lisowski, who Greenwald identified as an inspiration, attended a show.

“It’s amazing when you’re onstage and you look down and see people that you’ve known for well over a decade,” said Greenwald. “They understand you and they know your full story. ... They love the music and they love the camaraderie with the fans. ... That’s really one of the nicest things about

the shows that I do.”

Greenwald also works as a music producer and ghost producer, which means he produces tracks that other artists and DJs can promote as their own. He also involves himself in the business side of things.

“I just on a personal level want to have the foresight and flexibility to make decisions that will push me forward,” said Greenwald.

“She instilled in me the power of believing in myself, very similar to the message of Hadassah: women bonding together and empowering each other and doing whatever they feel is right in the community,” Bosse said in a phone interview with *Beverly Hills Weekly*.

“It wasn’t until last year

when Jon and I went to visit Poland and we stood on the soil in Auschwitz, that I truly understood her, understood who I am and where I come from,” Bosse said in her speech.

She shared with the audience her humble beginnings.

“I grew up in Queens, New York, the hub of where thousands of European immigrants settled to live after the war,” Bosse said. “My parents had thick accents when they spoke, and it was I who often would write the letters to my school for them, as they always felt somewhat self-conscious that my handwriting was better than theirs. I had no idea then, that Henrietta Szold [founder of Hadassah] was the pioneer who created English as a second language classes for immigrants much like my

parents.”

Bosse expressed her disbelief at how far she has come.

“This little girl from Queens could never have imagined that I would be standing here as vice mayor of Beverly Hills, California, celebrating the Festival of Lights Hanukkah luncheon with the Haifa and Malka Groups of Hadassah!” she said.

Nevertheless, she always remembers her roots.

“Growing up in a Holocaust survivor family, Judaism and Israel and the power of women helping each other

and community is what really helped my family survive. It’s something that was really ingrained in the fiber of my being.”

Waldow '74 chairs Beverly Hills Cultural Heritage Commission

When Richard Waldow '74 became chair of the Beverly Hills Cultural Heritage Commission in 2013, inaugural Chair Noah Furie '77 passed him the torch.

“Starting from scratch in just a little more than a year, we’ve done many things, but the most important accomplishment is that we now have 13 buildings formally listed as landmarks in the city’s register of historic properties,” Waldow told *Beverly Hills Weekly* in July 2013. “That is the product of a lot of work not just by the commission but also the terrific city staff and the [city] council. A lot of the credit goes to our inaugural chair, Noah Furie, who ... really spearheaded our efforts over the past year. He deserves a lot of the credit for this.”

As of March 2014, the city

of Beverly Hills had 19 historic landmarks. Those landmarks include The Beverly Hills Hotel, Beverly Hills Post Office, Beverly Hills City Hall and Waldow’s favorite, Anderton Court on Rodeo Drive, Southern California’s only Frank Lloyd Wright-designed retail building.

“Even though we’re a small city, we can boast of buildings designed by some of the greatest architects in American history including Frank Lloyd Wright and the Greene brothers,” Waldow said. “We also have incredible one-of-a-kind estates like Greystone and we have superb examples of many architectural styles that span the last 100-plus years. What I want to emphasize is that this program is not an elitist program that is only aimed at huge mansions in one part of the city.”

Waldow’s historic preservation efforts in Beverly Hills began more than 15 years ago, following the 1994 Northridge Earthquake. Concerned about the safety of Beverly Vista’s historic buildings, the school district moved teachers and students into temporary bungalows. Around that time, Waldow’s family had moved back to Beverly Hills and his oldest daughter, Jennie '08, was ready to start at Beverly Vista.

“Having gone through Beverly Vista from Kindergarten through eighth grade, I experienced firsthand the power of a really well-designed school to influence how kids feel about being educated in buildings like that. I, along with a lot of other people in the community, was very concerned that Beverly Vista not be knocked down unnecessarily,” said Waldow.

In the end, the school district saved part of Building B, which features the bell tower, but most of the school was demolished. It took great effort to demolish the buildings because they were so solidly built, Waldow said.

“The controversy over Beverly Vista’s demolition galvanized a lot of people in the community, including me, and made us aware of the need

for a workable, reasonable preservation ordinance that would allow our city to preserve its architectural and historic treasures while still meeting our modern day needs.”

With a group of like-minded individuals, Waldow founded the Beverly Hills Architectural Conservancy. Prior to that when he lived in Culver City, he served on its preservation commission.

Waldow’s goals for Beverly Hills’ preservation program include nominating additional landmarks, continuing to survey the city to identify historic and cultural resources, to increase public participation and support of the program, and to build pride and appreciation of the city’s historic properties.

Waldow balances his service on the commission with his career as a supervising deputy attorney general with the State of California Department of Justice. He supervises teams of deputy attorneys general in the Health, Education and Welfare Section in Southern California.

Waldow and his wife Ann Markowitz have two daughters, Jennie and Julia '13, who was *Highlights* editor during her senior year.

Gerшон '80 stars in Versace biopic

Gina Gerшон '80 underwent a dramatic transformation to portray Donatella Versace in the Lifetime original movie, *House of Versace*, which premiered last October. The film focuses on the fashion icon’s mission to carry on the legacy of her brother, Gianni Versace, after his murder in 1997.

“It’s such a compelling story about Donatella getting out from under her brother’s shadow—and, because of that shadow, also finding her own voice,” Gerшон said in an interview with the *New York Post*. “I really have a lot of respect for her, not just because I’m playing her ... but for what she went through, how she got herself out of it and really became her own person and found her own voice.”

International Jewish Sports Hall of Fame inducts four-time Olympian Wally Wolf '47

Former Beverly High and USC watersports phenom, the late Wallace "Wally" Wolf '47, was one of eight sportsmen elected to the International Jewish Sports Hall of Fame for 2014. Wolf, who was honored posthumously, died in 1997.

At the 1948 Olympic Games, the 17-year-old Beverly High sprinter swam the second leg of the USA's world record-setting gold medal 4x200m relay performance (8:46.0). In 1952 at the next Olympics, Wolf and the USA relay swim team repeated the gold medal achievement, with his second heat leg setting a new Olympic record of 2:11.4.

In 1956 and 1960, Wolf was

a member of the U.S. Olympic water polo team. The '56 team finished 5th, and the '60 team 7th.

Wolf was named to the 1964 U.S. Olympic water polo team—his fifth consecutive selection to a United States Olympics team—but did not accept the appointment.

Fellow 2014 inductees include Bud Selig, Al Davis, Shawn Green and Rudy LaRusso. The Hall of Fame museum is located at the Wingate Institute, Netanya, Israel.

Wolf was inducted into the Beverly Hills Athletic Alumni Association Hall of Fame in 2011.

'03 grad's company secures \$22-million investment

Sweetgreen, the restaurant chain co-founded by Jonathan Neman '03, has come a long way since he and co-founders Nicolas Jammet and Nathaniel Ru opened their first Georgetown restaurant in 2007 while they were seniors at Georgetown University.

Today, sweetgreen, known for its healthful menu featuring organic, local ingredients, has 22 East Coast locations, including

10 in Washington, D.C., and a huge investment—\$22 million—from AOL founder and entrepreneur Steve Case's investment fund, Revolution Growth. The young entrepreneurs announced the investment in December 2013 topping off a successful year in which sweetgreen opened several new restaurants in locations including New York, Boston, and Silver Spring, Md.

"After careful consideration and planning, we are incredibly proud to announce that we have secured funding from Revolution that will enable our company to consciously expand into new markets, fuel the growth and enhancement of the sweetgreen culture, and make strategic additions to our team," the co-founders wrote in a company e-mail.

In that e-mail, the young men assured the investment would not change sweetgreen's mission. "We remain dedicated to supporting local farmers, planting roots in communities, and building an outstanding team of individuals like yourselves."

Almost everything sold at sweetgreen is grown locally and/or organically. "The mission of sweetgreen is to create this idea of the sweetlife. It's really to create a world where passion and purpose can come together, so it's providing

these opportunities for people who work for us as well as our customers that you can do what you love and have fun and have it be meaningful at the same time," Neman told *Beverly Hills Weekly*. "You can eat something healthy and still have it be delicious and affordable. It's this idea of unusual combinations that inspire."

Neman attributed sweetgreen's success to its people.

"I think we're really fortunate to have a great team of people who really believe in the vision and the mission that we set forth from [my] two really great partners to the store managers, and really most importantly down to the people working the front lines," said Neman. "We've been really fortunate to have a collective group of people working towards this mission."

3 Questions: “Shark Tank” contestant Morri Chowaiki '90

Morri Chowaiki '90 has been selling popular holiday items with his wife Marina since 2009. They brought their popular product, the Hanukkah tree-topper, to Shark Tank on ABC in December 2013. Chowaiki accepted an offer from Daymond John of \$50,000 for 35 percent of his company.

What was it like being on Shark Tank?

Nerve-wracking, amazing, and incredibly fulfilling at the same time. I didn't know what to expect. They were incredibly professional, nurturing, and—honestly—what you see is what you get. Before you get there there's a lot of prep, and you're kind of waiting behind the doors. It's kind of funny, because when I walked down the hallway and took my mark, it was almost as if, rather than looking into their eyes, I was looking into a television. I'm so

used to that view from seeing the show so many times, that it's very surreal to be standing there.

Other than the actual event of getting on the show, it was really an amazing experience because everyone was so kind, friendly, and professional. Obviously they take these segments that are much longer—in my case it was over an hour—and edit down to eight minutes, but they captured the gist well. It was a tremendous amount of fun.

Are the sharks as imposing in person as they are on TV?

I have to be honest: they were very pleasant. Some people will say, “Kevin O’Leary was so tough on you!” But, you know what, he is a brilliant business man. I could have walked away and said, “Oh, no, he was so mean to me!” but instead I said, “He’s given me some incredible business advice, and I’m going

to take that to heart.” You could probably pay \$1,000 an hour for advice like that. Yeah, they’re pretty hard-core, but I think there’s a mutual respect that develops. It really pays off in the end.

Lapin '74 leads The Maple Counseling Center

When Jeff Lapin '74 took over as The Maple Counseling Center's (TMCC) board president in 2013, he became the third 1974 grad in a row to hold the position.

Most recently, Gail Millan '74 led the Beverly Hills-based nonprofit, which provides low- or no-fee mental health services to people of all ages throughout Los Angeles County. Lapin estimates approximately 20–25% of TMCC's clientele live or work in Beverly Hills.

“TMCC started when I was in high school, many, many years ago,” said Lapin. “Back then it was a facility to help people with substance abuse, and everyone my age knew it. It evolved into something much bigger over the years. Now it’s

one of the largest no-pay, or very low-pay, psychological counseling centers in the city of Los Angeles, and certainly the only one in Beverly Hills.”

Lapin got involved three years ago thanks to his classmate, Mason Sommers '74, who has also served as TMCC president.

“Mason and I were friends in high school and grammar school, and we lost touch,” said Lapin. “Mason got very seriously ill several years ago and I visited him in the hospital. In a conversation in the hospital he said, ‘Why don't you get involved in The Maple Center?’ ... As I got involved, I got more and more passionate.”

As president, Lapin said he aims to expand TMCC's

services, including those offered to local students.

“Currently we provide services to Beverly Hills and one or two schools outside Beverly Hills—peer groups and counseling groups,” said Lapin. “I would like to expand those services to other schools, to help kids who need help early on, so problems don't develop later. The more kids we can give an outlet to, who need some help, the better off everybody's going to be.”

Lapin acknowledged that fundraising for mental health services can be a challenge, but he believes mental health issues are losing their stigma.

“I think although historically there has been a stigma associated with fundraising for mental health, it's becoming

more mainstream. I think people understand that it's a very important place in helping both individuals and our society as a whole.”

Hauptmann '09, Super Bowl champ in rookie year

For the second time in three years, Beverly High was represented at the Super Bowl.

Rookie Caylin Hauptmann '09 was part of the Seattle Seahawks team that dominated the Denver Broncos in a 43-8 victory on Feb. 2.

The Seahawks signed the 6-foot-3, 300-pound offensive tackle, who has yet to play for Seattle, from the Cleveland Browns practice squad Sept. 23, 2013.

Hauptmann was signed by Cleveland April 30, 2013 after being bypassed in the NFL draft following a collegiate career at Florida International. Hauptmann survived the cut to the 53-player regular-season limit Aug. 31, 2013 but was waived the following day as the Browns reduced their

Yousefzadeh '02, dentist, treats 40 patients free of charge

Dr. Chanel Yousefzadeh '02 left behind her own Beverly Hills dental practice for four days last fall to participate in a marathon of drillings, root canals and extractions for Care Harbor, a clinic that provides free health care to the uninsured.

Care Harbor opens once a year and relies on volunteers such as Yousefzadeh to examine, treat and educate the public on a massive scale. Thousands of people lined up outside the Los Angeles Sports Arena on Oct. 31, 2013 for the opportunity to be treated by medical professionals.

Approximately 3,000 patients were treated over four days by the 2,950 medical and general volunteers. Yousefzadeh treated approximately eight to ten people a day.

"The atmosphere was busy, but laid back. It was well organized with enough volunteers to organize people and show them where to go and what to do. They really thought of everything," said Yousefzadeh.

The arena was sectioned off to include medical areas for dentistry, optometry and women's health, among others.

"It's different from how it is with [my] dental practice. You just go in there and do the work that you enjoy. There aren't questions about what treatment you need or the price. You just go in and diagnose the patient," said Yousefzadeh.

One of Yousefzadeh's first jobs was working as an advertising representative at *Beverly Hills Weekly*.

Kirkus Reviews lists '40s grads' books among Best Books of 2013

***Out-of-Style: A Modern Perspective of How, Why and When Vintage Fashions Evolved* — by Betty Kreisel Shubert S'42**



Shubert drew from decades of experience as a costume designer to write her first book, a costume history featuring over 700 of Shubert's own sequential illustrations that reveal the style clues that time-date clothes of the 19th–21st centuries.

“Genealogists can now easily time-date old family photos: Costume designers, vintage collectors and fashionistas can all find inspiration, while theatre and film companies can simplify the research necessary to dress actors in time-appropriate attire,” Shubert wrote to *Alumni Highlights*. “I tell you all this, because I learned to do what I do by the wonderful Beverly Hills school system where they treasure talent and help it to

flourish.”

Shubert said her career began at age 13 when she sold her first design to a manufacturer in 1938. That was the year she graduated from Horace Mann and entered Beverly High, where she said she took all the art, sewing and design classes she could manage and made costumes for school productions.

Shubert said classmate Rod Gorney S'42's father, Jay Gorney, the producer/songwriter who discovered Shirley Temple, saw her costumes when he watched his son perform. As Roddy's prom date, Shubert wore a gown she made herself.

“After admiring my evening gown, Jay Gorney said, ‘The next time I do a show I will let you do the costumes,’” Shubert wrote. Soon, Shubert had two hit Hollywood shows to her credit, *Meet The People*, produced by Gorney, and *Ken Murray's Blackouts*, which starred Marie Wilson and had a record-breaking 6½-year run playing at the original El Capitan Theatre at Hollywood and Vine.

During her career, Shubert designed for stage, screen, TV

specials, Ready-to-Wear, Las Vegas musicals, Disneyland and more. Later, she became a columnist-illustrator for *Ancestry Magazine*.

She also designed uniform programs for major cruise lines, race tracks, theme parks, hotels, restaurants and casinos around the world. These were manufactured by Kathryn Gale of Beverly Hills, a uniform company owned by Shubert's daughter, Kathy Kreisel '66, who played Marian The Librarian in Beverly's production of *The Music Man*, directed by the late John Ingle. Today, Kathy is a realtor in Irvine, utilizing her creative talent as an interior designer, staging homes for sale.

Shubert said her son Ken Kreisel '69, a member of the BHHS Hall of Fame, also gained valuable skills at Beverly, where he produced the first Norman Newsreel with stereophonic sound and was the sports movie photographer. In his early 20s, Ken invented the self-powered sub-woofer and other audio inventions. His sound equipment has been used by major film and recording studios.

'44 grad publishes first novel at age 88

The Luger's Vision, Eugene M. Gold's first book, tells the story of three high-school friends, beginning in Southern California just prior to America's entry into World War II.

Although the historical novel features fictional characters, Gold, a 1944 graduate, wove some of his personal experiences, as well as actual historical events and figures, into the narrative. Father and son surgeons operate in Guatemala

When Beverly Hills surgeon Gary H. Hoffman '70 and his son Jordan Hoffman '02 traveled to Guatemala in April 2013 for a week-long medical mission, Gary approached it as an opportunity to watch his son, a surgical resident at Emory University, operate and teach him things his father, also a surgeon, had taught him.

"It took a very left turn and ended up somewhere so different," said Hoffman. "It ended up to be nothing about me and nothing about bonding with my son and everything about using what I've done in 30 years of practicing surgery to help other people in a totally different way than we're used to doing in the United States."

That meant diagnosing and treating patients immediately, without a barrage of tests, scans and paperwork.

"There was absolutely nothing between me and the patient," said Hoffman, who practices general and colorectal surgery. "There was just me and 10 minutes later, a patient on the operating table and two hours later, a cured patient. It was the most amazing thing and it's something that's so easy to forget in the way we practice medicine here, which is not to say we practice it wrong, but it's

just evolved into something that puts great distance between the doctor and the patient and it's a struggle every day to maintain that connection."

During the week, Hoffman estimates the team from Los Angeles, which was coordinated by the nonprofit HELPS International, did 100 to 120 procedures. The first day lasted from 7 a.m. to 2:30 a.m.

"Plus we saw untold numbers of kids and adults for check-ups and medical problems and the lines just kept coming until the last day and the army just cut them off," Hoffman said.

The team included 16 doctors, nurses, pharmacists, translators, runners and support personnel the team called "MacGyvers" because

they "could fix anything at all that we needed."

This came in handy, as Hoffman said the hospital did not meet U.S. standards.

"Their medical facility is pretty basic and a little frightening but our challenges were bringing our own water, our own food, staying healthy, taking care of each other," he said.

Although they were just 60 miles north of Guatemala City in Joyabaj, Hoffman said it took six hours to traverse the mountainous, windy roads to get there.

During the whirlwind of procedures and check-ups, Hoffman had the opportunity to watch his son Jordan and another resident operate.

"I'd be happy to be taken care

of by them," he said. "If [they] are any indication of the doctors of the future of this country, we're actually in pretty good hands."

Reflecting on the mission, Hoffman, who is working on forming a second Los Angeles area team, said it made him remember his humanity.

"I remembered how wonderful it is to take care of people and I owe the Guatemalan people a debt of thanks for that. It's going around like a song in my head and far from forgetting it, it's driving me forward. ... A surgical career can be divided in thirds: 20, 20 and 20. I've done the first two: the learning, the practicing and now I'm in the giving back and it has totally energized me."

Joel Pressman, legendary choral teacher, passes

A member of the Beverly High performing arts faculty for 38 years, Joel Pressman '67 passed away Nov. 18, 2013. He had been battling cancer.

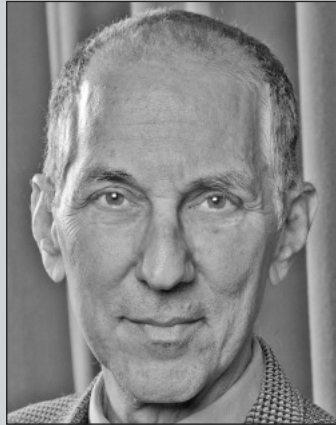
The legendary choral teacher oversaw a nationally recognized choral program, which included the Madrigal Singers.

"There are choirs who sing with better pitch, better tone, better phrasing than my choirs ever do, but after 30 seconds, you go, OK, now what? And it is a rare choir who really takes each piece and makes a small drama out of it and finds that hook to give that audience something that they can connect with," Pressman told *Beverly Hills Weekly* following his June 2013 retirement.

Pressman was the first and only K-12 educator admitted into the Beverly Hills High School Alumni Hall of Fame. He was a graduate of Beverly Vista and Beverly High and held Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees from USC. He went on to teach choral music and performing arts at Beverly, and for many years was chairman of the Performing Arts Department.

Many of his former students went on to great success in the entertainment industry, as well as other fields. Despite that success, Pressman at times had to defend the department.

"A number of years ago we had a board member who didn't much care for the arts. He said, 'Frankly, I'm not impressed if our graduate can correctly identify Beethoven on the music while he's cleaning the toilets at Burger King. Our students need to be able to support a family. They need to be able to program on the computer and build a

website," Pressman said.

Pressman called then-drama teacher John Ingle, who passed away in 2012, and together they came up with a list of 250 grads with careers in the arts who were supporting their families.

"Everything from the people that you've heard of like Richard Dreyfuss and David Schwimmer and Nicolas Cage to people that you haven't heard of, who are doing props for Spielberg, who are writing, who are directing, who are doing Broadway theater and composing—there's just so many people out there. Michael Lembeck, who is an actor/director, said in an interview once: He can hardly ever walk on to a set where he's directing and not find some connection to Beverly High performing arts."

Pressman was also known to speak his mind at Board of Education meetings.

"There are plenty of people who have not gotten the kind of attention I've gotten for retirement, and I think it's because what I do is much more public, so I've always tried to take the opportunity of a bully pulpit to speak up on behalf of all the teachers because not everybody gets the chance to spout off like I do," Pressman said.

In a tribute to Pressman

published last fall in the *Weekly*, more than 20 former students and colleagues shared favorite memories. Many reflected on lessons and inspirations that stretched far beyond the arts.

"... Performing arts was the only thing that kept me alive and going throughout high school," Michelle Deco '08 wrote. "Being a teenager was absolute hell, but being in your class made it bearable. Music kept me alive, and it still keeps me alive to this day. You taught me so many lessons that I know I had to learn the hard way. You wrote in my senior yearbook that I should set expectations for myself, but not to be discouraged if they're not met, and that one small step forward each day is a sign of progress. And even to this day, it means a lot to me, more than you'll ever know."

Judi Domroy '93 said Pressman taught her patience on the first day they met. "I said, 'I hope to be in Madrigals' and you said, 'Let's just wait and see.' I hadn't even sung for you yet. I just saw you in the hallway outside your office. And there we began with life lesson No. 1: Patience. You aren't just a teacher of music or theatre. You have been teaching me life lessons since that first minute," she wrote.

Several former students said Pressman inspired them to become teachers or, in 1983 grad Melanie Fine's case, a cantor. "You touched my life at a time in high school when it felt like I didn't fit in anywhere, and you helped me feel good about myself, about my voice and taught me how to stand strong on my own two feet," Fine wrote. "... If I could touch my students' lives even half as much as you've touched mine, I will have been a success."

Pressman also spent many summers at ISOMATA (Idyllwild School of Music and the Arts), in Idyllwild, Calif., first as a student and then as a teacher. That was where former Beverly English and photography teacher Alice Kuo Shippee first met him.

"I wasn't in the musical theatre program [at Idyllwild]; I was a dancer, but everyone knew Mr. Pressman," Shippee wrote. "Mr. Pressman was an icon—the epiphany of passion, excellence and high expectations. ... I started teaching at Beverly High in 1995. I was only 24, but you always treated me, joked with me like I was your equal. ... You have a way of making people feel very special. I have never ceased to be inspired by your wit and wicked intelligence, your ability to be part of a system yet not of it, constantly rebelling against mediocrity through true, good teaching, pushing against the glacial pace of educational reform through the subversive act of just doing a great job with every student, every song, every show."

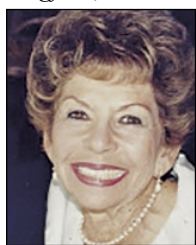
At the time of his retirement, the *Weekly* asked Pressman how he would like to be remembered.

"I want to be remembered as somebody who really cared—sometimes, too much—and who made a difference, whatever that is," he said.

Survivors include his children, Aviva Pressman '04 and Elijah Pressman '01; his parents, Rabbi Jacob Pressman, Rabbi emeritus at Temple Beth Am, and Marjorie Pressman; and siblings, Rabbi Daniel Pressman '64 and Judith Pressman '66.

Marilyn Hersh '34 passed away Dec. 22, 2013. Born in New York City, Marilyn was the daughter of famed dance director Seymour Felix, who staged Florenz Ziegfeld's Broadway musicals and won an Academy Award in 1939 for his work on the movie, *The Great Ziegfeld*, which chronicled



the life of the great showman. Ziegfeld brought the family to California in 1930

when he began producing films in Hollywood. Marilyn and her family settled into the Chateau Marmont for a year before settling into Beverly Hills. During the 1940s, Marilyn danced professionally, appearing in several Mickey Rooney/Judy Garland films and other Hollywood musicals. Marilyn was married for 58 years to Robert Hersh '34, who predeceased her in 1998. Bob and Marilyn met at John Burroughs Junior High, also attending Beverly and USC together. They married in Taft, Calif. at Gardner Field in 1942, prior to Bob going overseas to fly P-38s in the South Pacific. After the war, the family founded the Westward Ho Markets, which thrived for nearly 50 years. Marilyn was a tireless volunteer throughout her life. She worked at St. John's Hospital in the ICU for nearly 22 years followed by nearly 25 years at the Venice Family Clinic. She served on the board of the St. John's Guild, Les Maraines, Soujourn Center and the City of Hope. Bob and Marilyn were 35-year members of the California Yacht Club, where they enjoyed many years of friendship and fun on their beloved boat, *Bobilyn*. Marilyn was well-

known for staging many CYC events including theatrical performances. Marilyn loved animals. Her beloved Bichons brought her much joy during her struggle with Alzheimer's. Marilyn is survived by her

two daughters, Judi (Thomas) Welch and Dr. Pamela Harmell; five grandchildren; and 10 great-grandchildren.

Revered Superintendent Kenneth Peters

Retired BHUSD Superintendent Kenneth L. Peters passed away Nov. 25, 2013. He was 98.

Peters served as superintendent from 1959 to 1982 and as Beverly High principal from 1950 to 1959. Prior to that, he was Montebello Senior High principal from 1945 to 1950.

Peters was revered by faculty and staff not just as a visionary educational leader, but also as the larger-than-life face of the BHUSD in the 1960s and 1970s.

Upon Peters' retirement, the BHUSD Board of Education renamed the high school's auditorium in his honor.

Former Mayor Vicki Reynolds '53, who served on the Board of Education from 1975 to 1983, remembered Peters as an icon in the education community. Peters was principal when Reynolds was a student at Beverly High, and later superintendent when she served on the Board of Education.

"The Beverly Hills Unified School District became synonymous with quality education because of Ken Peters," Reynolds said. "His leadership and innovation set the standard for education policy and practice statewide and nationally."

In a letter published in *Beverly Hills Weekly*, Mel Spitz, who served on the Board of Education in the 1970s, said he was privileged to work with Peters.

"BHUSD thrived under Mr. Peters' 'partnering' relationship with his school boards, wherein they set policy with his advice and guidance, and they evaluated the effectiveness of his management of the schools," Spitz wrote. "As a leader he was steady and firm, good humored, and open-minded. He was able to accomplish so much because he was deeply respected and trusted by all the various elements with whom he dealt, including school boards, district employees, PTA leaders, parents and students."

Retired Beverly High languages teacher and counselor Sanford Jacquard called his 42 years of teaching the happiest in his life, "thanks to Mr. Peters."

"I am glad that Mr. Peters had a long life during which he left an important mark on countless people just as he did in my case," Jacquard wrote in a letter to *Beverly Hills Weekly*.

As Beverly High principal, Peters introduced the first driver's training program in California and foreign language curriculum to the elementary schools.

Following his retirement, Peters served on the California State Board of Education for eight years. He was also an adjunct professor/guest lecturer at notable institutions including Harvard and Stanford universities.

Earlier in life, Peters was captain of the 1936 championship baseball team and recipient of the Trojan Diamond Medal at USC, where he earned his B.S. in business

administration and his M.S. in school administration.

He was drafted by the St. Louis Cardinals and played professional baseball until 1938. During World War II, he was a carrier commander in the U.S. Navy. His wartime duties included serving on the *USS Kasaan Bay* in both the Pacific and Atlantic theaters.

As an actor, he appeared in a number of films including *Mutiny on the Bounty* and *Death on the Diamond*.

He also received a number of awards including the USC Rossier Alumni Lifetime Achievement Award for his contributions to the field of education; the Trojan Baseball Alumni Association Lifetime Achievement Award; and the Maple Center Man of the Year and City of Beverly Hills Man of the Year awards.

A memorial was held Feb. 2 in the Beverly High auditorium that bears his name.

Leslie was a woman of charm, wit and human understanding.

Dr. Nolan Frizzelle '39, former Orange County assemblyman, died Jan. 31, 2013. Frizzelle, an optometrist who practiced in Newport Beach, served in the Assembly from 1980 until 1992, representing a Huntington Beach district.

He backed Barry Goldwater in 1964, and later became president of the California Republican Assembly. Frizzelle attended UCLA and Stanford and served in the U.S. Marines during World War II. He is survived by his wife, Ina, and six children.

Robert Sontag '40 passed away on April 30, 2013. After serving in the Army during World War II, Bob completed his education at Stanford, majoring in journalism. He worked for the Hearst Newspaper in San Francisco. He returned to Beverly Hills in 1954 and opened Robert Sontag Real Estate Office with the slogan, "Come in for Income." In 1980, he moved to Orange County. He is survived by his wife of 57 years, Marian, his daughter Kate (David Seligman), his stepsons David Roberts (Sharon), Rick Roberts (Heather Sergeant), five grandchildren, 11 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

Stan Bowen S'41 passed away on Christmas Day, 2013 at age 90. He was a three-year letterman in track and was fortunate to have met his future bride, Marge McCann Bowen S'41, at BHHS. As WWII broke out, he joined the Navy, attached to the Marines, as a corpsman. He fought and

saved lives in the Pacific for the duration of the war. Stan was decorated for bravery under fire for his actions on Tarawa. He married Marge two weeks after returning home from the Pacific. They were happily married for 68 years and have a son Stan, daughter Judi and three grandchildren. Outgoing and always full of fun and high spirits, Stan loved life, his family and his country.

Peter Duffy S'41 passed away suddenly on Jan. 12, 2014. After graduating from BHHS, Peter went to UCLA where he played on the baseball team. After the war, he completed his studies at UCLA. He went on to earn a master's degree at University of Vermont, where he met his future wife, Ann Schremly. They moved to the Bay Area, where Peter earned his J.D. at Stanford. They started a family, settling in Sonoma. He worked for a local attorney for a few years before opening his own law practice in the late 1950s. In the 1970s, he and Ron Preston partnered to form Duffy & Preston, Attorneys at Law. International tennis champ Louise Brough Clapp W'40

Louise Brough Clapp W'40, an international tennis star who won 35 major titles in the 1940s and 1950s, passed away on Feb. 3 at age 90.

Clapp, who ranked No. 1 in the world in 1955, was particularly dominant at the U.S. Championships, winning 17 titles, and Wimbledon, where she appeared in 21 of the 30 finals between 1946 and 1955 in singles, women's doubles and mixed doubles. Over the years, she took home 13 Wimbledon titles, including all three in 1950: singles, women's doubles and mixed doubles. In addition, she won three titles at the French Championships and two titles at the Australian Championships.

Clapp is a member of the International Tennis Hall of Fame, the BHHS Hall of Fame and BHAAA Hall of Fame. The tennis star got her start playing on the public courts at Roxbury Park. As a teenager,

“Dr. Feldman was renowned as a teacher in Beverly Hills and as a vice principal of Horace Mann and as a principal of Horace Mann. Her reputation was impeccable, exceedingly intelligent, caring and loving,” said current Horace Mann Principal Steve Kessler ’71.

When Kessler began teaching in 1976, Feldman became BHUSD assistant superintendent.

Feldman, a New York City native, became principal after the suicide of David Haserot.

In an interview with *Beverly Hills Weekly* in 2006, Feldman said despite the tragedy, the transition had gone smoothly because she had been acting principal while he had previously been away on sabbatical.

Feldman moved to California in 1959 and received her master’s and Ph.D. in educational psychology. After her time at BHUSD, Feldman worked as a clinical psychologist and taught third-year medical students at UCLA. She kept a private practice in her Beverly Hills home.

“I was always taken by the way she was so personable with the students that she would walk around the hallways and the kids would know her and she would

know their names,” said Kessler. “And I always felt when I became principal, I did not want to become a slave to the computer and my desk, but rather, I’ve always [had] that more old school thought of get out with the kids.”

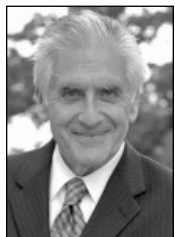

In my past two plus years on the Board of Education I have discovered over and over one

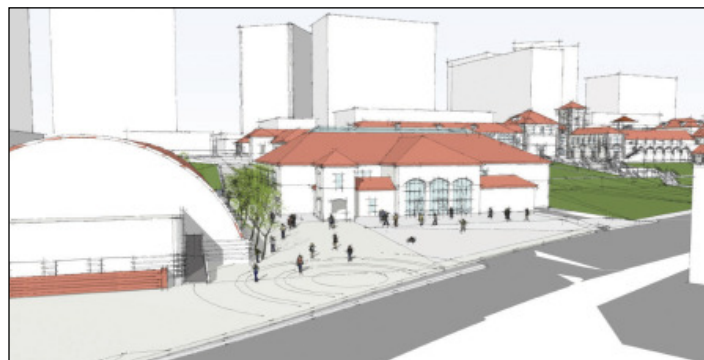
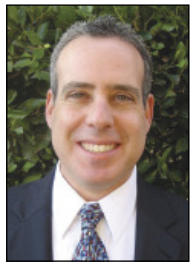
