

Why singing is bad for you (and 7 reasons why you shouldn't stop doing it)

People don't often talk about the downsides of singing. We constantly bang on about the health benefits, social aspects, etc. but seldom mention the bad bits.

Here are seven (7) terrible things that might happen to you if you start singing.

- 1. Singing can become addictive once you start singing, it's very hard to stop. It's such an enjoyable activity that you will start noticing it everywhere and begin to take every opportunity you can to sing.
- 2. Singing takes up valuable time you start by joining a choir once a week, then you do concerts at the weekends, then all those social events, and that great weekend workshop ... before you know it, it's taken over your whole life.
- 3. You will abandon your friends and family and spend more time with your new singing chums and on the tour bus and in the pub after the concert (and after weekly rehearsals). You'll also be listening to more CDs on your own, checking out YouTube videos, learning lyrics, etc. No time left for family and friends at all.
- 4. You will become unbearable to live with singing makes you so happy that you will wear a constant smile and be humming along all day long in a state of bliss, much to the annoyance of everyone you live with (who will be insanely jealous).
- 5. Singing stops you sleeping after rehearsal or performance you will be so buoyed up with enthusiasm and joy that you will find it hard to come down off Cloud 9. Not only that, but you'll have all those wonderful tunes bouncing around inside your head. Sleep who needs it??!!
- 6. You will spend more money nice new costume for the next gig, more CDs, songbooks, weekend workshops, maybe even a musical instrument.

You might lose your job — for some people singing takes over their lives entirely and they end up singing the whole time. They turn professional or start leading a choir of their own, and before they know it, they have a new career.

PRESS RELEASE: Organ Concert at Augustus May 8, 2015

Thomas Herzer, organist at the Castle Church, Wittenberg, Germany, will tour the United States this spring, to help raise funds for a 'new' chancel organ. He will make a local stop at historic <u>Augustus Lutheran</u> <u>Church in Trappe on Friday May 8, 7:00pm.</u>

The Castle Church in Wittenberg is the historic place where the Lutheran Reformation started almost 500 years ago. On October 31st 1517 Dr. Martin Luther nailed his famous 95 theses at the door of the Castle Church. The chancel organ is an important part of the preparations for the 500th anniversary celebration: only a few feet from the famous Theses Door, an organ will find its new place and new task in 2016.

In 1965 the organ builder Schuke from Potsdam built an instrument in the auditorium of the seminary in Wittenberg. This organ of sixteen ranks has two manuals and pedal. As part of the great building projects for 2017 the seminary will move into the castle next to the Castle Church. Therefore the organ needs a new place. Instead of putting the organ in the relatively small new auditorium of the seminary, the organ will be put in the chancel of the Castle Church next to the choir stalls. There, in the front of the church, many more people will be able to hear and appreciate the organ.

The Castle Church has become an important pilgrimage place, not only for Lutherans but others from all over the world. Many choirs and organists from America have shared their musical talents in the Castle Church. The new chancel organ will help many people from all over the world who come to sing the most famous hymn by Dr. Martin Luther, "A Mighty Fortress is Our God."

Thomas Herzer has been the music director of the Castle Church in Wittenberg since 2003. He shares this position with his wife Sarah. As an important part of their work, they teach church music and liturgy at the seminary.

Thomas studied at the Church Music Conservatory in Halle where he earned his Master Degree in 2003. As part of these studies he spent two semesters as a guest student at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln where he studied Organ Performance with Dr. Quentin Faulkner.

Augustus Lutheran Church is located at 717 W Main St, Trappe, PA 19426. It is fitting that Mr. Herzer will make a stop here, since this is the place where Henry Melchior Muhlenberg arrived from Germany in 1742 and settled. In 1742, the congregation built a church that still stands today, and remains the oldest unchanged Lutheran church building in the US.

Plan to join us for the concert on <u>Friday, May 8, 7:00pm</u>. There will be a free-will offering to help raise funds for the new chancel organ at the Castle Church.



The Athanasian Creed

Birthday

What is the history and use of the Athanasian Creed?

More properly known from its opening words as the *Quicunque Vult*, this statement of the catholic faith was almost certainly not by St. Athanasius (296-373) since it concerns itself with theological issues and employs terminology not used during his lifetime. Much debate still exists about the origin and authorship of the creed, although the leading modern hypothesis suggests that it originated in southern Gaul (France) or northern Spain sometime between 435 and 535, and perhaps at the direction of St. Caesarius a celebrated preacher and theologian who lived from 470-542 and was abbot of Arles in Gaul from 502.

Differing greatly in form and structures from either the Apostles' or Nicene Creeds, the original character and object of the Athanasian Creed was to serve as a summary of orthodox teaching for clergy to memorize and use as the basis for their pastoral instructions. A unique feature of this creed is the damnatory clauses which open, divide, and conclude the text. However unpalatable these may be to modern Christians, there can be no doubt these clauses must be given their full and natural meaning: anyone wishing to be saved must be orthodox in his/her thinking about the Trinity and the Incarnation!

With its clear explication of the doctrine of the Trinity and the Person and work of Christ, the Athanasian creed was highly valued by Luther, who suggested that it should be sung each evening at Vespers. The creed is included in the *Book of Concord* as one of the "Three Catholic and Ecumenical Symbols". Not formally accepted by the Eastern Church, it is used in the West principally by the Roman, Lutheran and Anglican churches. In modern American Lutheran usage, it is appointed for use at worship only once, on Trinity Sunday.

Sharing God's Bounty

Keeping Our Eyes on the Prize

If a runner in a race takes his eyes off his goal for even a fleeting moment, he risks losing his focus and, along with that, the race. So it is with the Christian who must be diligent to keep his focus on his stewardship. If he takes his eyes off his heavenly goal and directs them toward his possessions, his worldly aspirations, or his temporal difficulties, he loses his focus and risks losing the race. The words of Paul provide encouragement for us: "Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:13). Focusing on our Earthly circumstances can lead us in two directions ... both of them deadly! We may either find things

of the world to be so attractive, they become the prize toward which we strain, or we find things to be so dismal that we despair.

Our Chief Steward, Jesus, our Savior, focused on the prize. We are exhorted to follow his example: "Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God" (Hebrews 12:2). Talk about keeping focus! "Consider him who endured such opposition from sinful men, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart" (Hebrews 12:3). Talk about running a race! And he did it for us, "so that [we] will not grow weary and lose heart."

And look at the prize he won! He ascended into Heaven and now sits "at the right hand of the throne of God." Heaven is our prize, too ... a prize beyond compare. Christ's promise is this: "Be faithful, even to the point of death, and I will



give you the crown of life" (Revelation 2:10b). Should we falter, as we are certain to do, we claim another of his promises: "The one who calls you is faithful and he will do it" (1 Thessalonians 5:24).



There are only two sure things in life: death and taxes. We talk about taxes, but many of us avoid talking, or even thinking, about death. Yet, death is inevitable. We need to talk about death with our children. The most natural time to do this is when a death occurs.

Encourage your child to talk about it and to remember the times he or she spent with the one who died. Invite him or her to draw a picture or create a song that expresses his or her feelings. Older children might want to write a story or compose a prayer. Children have lots of questions about death. When you don't have an answer, admit it, but take time to explore the question with them. You might want to bring your unanswered question to your pastor. Assure your child that Jesus promises us eternal life when our earthly life has ended. Underline Bible verses such as John 3:16 that promise eternal life. In faith we can believe God's promise of eternal life. And trusting in God's promise of eternal life helps our faith to grow.



If you typically spend all of your income on your wants and desires, you will find it difficult to live within your means. Spending is easy, whereas giving and saving require self-discipline. Your ability to give and save is made possible by your willingness to control your spending. Improper spending habits are the biggest hindrances to living successfully within your income.





of what you can afford, but rather on what you need. You must ask, "Do I need this certain thing or does God have need of my money to help others and the church?"

What lifestyle does the Bible suggest? Living comfortably is not a sin. God does not condemn being rich, but speaks against the self-centered attitude wealth can cause. Living in opulence without any regard for others does not please the Lord. However, if you love the Lord and serve him and others with your money and time, you are free to live in comfort. Jesus said "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:33). Certainly, there is a tremendous amount of diversity among Christians and what they own, but your lifestyle should reflect your relationship with Jesus.

According to Russ Crosson in his book A Life Well Spent, we have increased our standard of living at the expense of our lifestyles. He points out:

"We have increased our lifestyles, but in the process haven't we also lost our ability to really live?

- We have amassed wealth, not wisdom.
- ♦ We have given our children toys, not time.
- We have children who have been taught to consume rather than work.
- We have fathers who don't know their children, and marriages that do not work or last.
- ♦ We have been in a rush to run a race without understanding the finish line.

Could it be that we are being robbed of our very lives because we are not thinking correctly about why we have money and what we are to do with it?"

Our culture promotes monetary wealth. We need to spend wisely, save and give proportionally to our income and be careful not to become a victim of the foolish desires money can create.
