Mr. Eric M. Lopez Border Patrol Agent—Canine Instructor





For all that attended the February meeting, you were in for a great presentation.

Mr. Lopez and his canine companion, Rossi, delighted us with interesting and entertaining maneuvers.

Eric enlightened us with the Border Patrols extensive training for its agents and their dogs. There are 140 canine teams.

Training consists of 4 weeks pre-training and in week 5 the handler comes in.

Graduation takes place

in 8 weeks.

Usually the dog is in service 7 to 10 years and the dogs stay with the handler at their home.

Commands are in foreign languages.

Certain breeds are targeted and the dogs come from breeders in Europe which cost \$10,000 each.

They have a warranty of 3 months to 1 year. If they do not work out, they are returned to the breeder.



American Airlines seeks approval on LAX-Beijing route



American Airlines is awaiting approval from the Civil Aviation Administration of China to begin service between Los Angeles and Beijing. "American has been in regular contact with Chinese authorities concerning the availability of slots, and has made plans to send one of its senior executives to China to discuss the issue in-person," American said in a regulatory filing, noting that the airline "fully expects that its continued efforts will eventually prove successful."

Airline, airport collaborating on terminal revamp at DFW

American Airlines and Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport officials are considering their options to ensure terminal renovations are best suited to address needs. The airport is considering building a new Terminal F and the airline could decide to move some operations there. "We have to think about what's going to happen on the F site and what we and the airport agree should be built on the F site and then roll that all together," said American executive Tim Skipworth.

Report supports separating air traffic control from FAA

A new report from the Eno Center for Transportation supports shifting air traffic control responsibilities from the Federal Aviation Administration to another entity, such as a government corporation or an independent nonprofit organization. "Without significant changes, the American air traffic control system will not be able to cope with expected traffic growth, new complexities in the global air space, or critical upgrades," said Eno Center executive Robert Puentes.

AIRPORT UNVEILS NEW, IMPROVED WEBSITE

The Tucson Airport Authority launched a newly designed website, www.flytucson.com, including separate portals for the airport authority, Tucson International Airport and Ryan Airfield.

The updated site is now mobile responsive and includes improvements to navigation to all formats, the airport said.

Among the new features is a new and improved cost calculator to allow passengers to compare local travel costs, including parking rates, travel time and airfare; an improved destinations page, with links to airline websites to purchase tickets; a new interactive map of the airport; and constantly updated information on available parking at each airport parking lot.

The new website was designed with the help of local company Creative Slice and founder Tim Bowen, the airport said.
