

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

HOW DO I OVERCOME DOUBT AND **DISAPPOINTMENT?**

An epiphany is an unexpected manifestation. In the case of this feast, it is the manifestation of the Messiah to the magi.



These foreigners, who did not even believe in the God we do, who were not Jewish, so were not awaiting the Messiah (the Christ), recognized in this tiny baby lying in a wooden trough the newborn king of the Jews. We are those magi today. We are called to make the effort to see Christ made manifest in today's world. We can see Christ made manifest in the Eucharist, in fact affirming His

presence when we respond "Amen" to "The Body of Christ." We can see Christ made manifest in our assembly, for He told His disciples that where two or three are gathered in His name, He too is present. We can see Christ in the person in need, for He also said that whatever we do for one of these least ones, we do for Him. We can see Christ in the priest who presides at Mass, in the word of God and in the sacraments. But perhaps most memorably we see Christ in a true epiphany, when He reveals Himself unexpectedly, as He did as a newborn in a stable, or much later to the fishermen whom He told to drop their nets on the other side, or as the risen Lord on the road to Emmaus.

Bethlehem is only about five miles from Jerusalem. The magi, after a journey of a thousand miles or more. probably assumed the newborn king would be found in Jerusalem. Bethlehem was unexpected. It took a consul-



tation with the chief priests and scribes to learn their true destination. Science and faith, working together, allowed them to find the Christ, the truth.

Do you wonder if the magi, for at least a moment doubted themselves when they ended up at a forlorn stable looking at a baby in a feeding trough.? Or at least disappointed? Perhaps this was their true epiphany, finding the newborn king in a most unexpected place. For us too, doubts and disappointment may be precursors to an epiphany.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

The song "We Three Kings" details the gifts of the Magi, but do you know what you're singing? "Born a king on Bethlehem's plan, gold I bring to crown Him again." This one is the most



straightforward gold symbolizes the Kingship Christ. "Myrrh bitter perfume breathes a life gathering gloom." Myrrh

is an embalming spice. Already at Christ's birth, we have the symbolic reminder of his death. "Frankincense to offer have I. Incense owns a deity nigh." In many religious traditions, incense symbolizes prayers rising to heaven. In some pagan traditions, it is thought to help "call down" the deity. The gift of frankincense symbolizes Jesus' role as the Great High Priest, sanctifying the world through his sacrifice.

The Light of the Moon

If you own a television that has been turned on at any point in the last month or so, chances are you've caught at least a scene or two of the 1946 classic film "It's a Wonderful Life."

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?"

That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it.

The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. It is God that makes our ordinary lives extraordinary.

In the end of the movie, George Bailey realizes that he had a far greater life because, instead of being the hero of his own story, he allowed himself to reflect goodness onto others.

Remember — the magi didn't chart their own course. They merely followed the star.
