"Having had a spiritual awakening, as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs."

He said: In preparing for this article I did a guick Internet search of "12 Step History" and found this:

From the Original Manuscript - Step 12. Having had a spiritual experience as the result of this course of action, we tried to carry this message to others, especially alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

By the second printing of the Big Book, the phrase "spiritual experience" had been replaced with "spiritual awaking".

In "Bill's Story", Bill Wilson describes his spiritual awaking as "sudden and profound". personal experience was not like that. My story more closely matches the description found in the second appendix of the Big Book entitled "Spiritual Experience". But I did experience, what I now refer to as a 'turning point', which I described in last month's Eleventh Step article.

The point is, whether the experience is sudden and profound, or more of the "educational variety", if we have been diligent in our approach to the other 11 steps, it does come.

**So, what do we do** with our new spiritual outlook? I've often heard it said that "in order to keep it, you have to give it away". And, in the Book of James (in the BIG Book) it says "Faith without works is dead". Fortunately the chapter "Working with Others" clearly describes the process of working with another alcoholic one-on-one. But remember that Alcoholics Anonymous is a program of 'attraction rather than promotion'. We can easy turn-off potential members by trying to force the AA message upon someone who isn't ready to hear it. Some of my most profound spiritual experiences have started with the question "I hear you've quit drinking... How did you (continued on page 2)

**She said:** something fundamental inside of us changes when we do these 12 Steps. A deep desire to stop drinking brings us to the thresh-

hold of transformation and then the willingness to let go of our old ways of thinking opens the door to a new freedom and happiness.

Consciously or unconsciously I have always been looking for a way to be useful in this world. I have struggled toward happiness and a spiritual awakening countless times, yet my fundamental reactions to life stayed much the same. What was I missing?

To tell the truth, I could never figure that out. Not on my own. Still, I stubbornly held onto the idea that I, "I' could find the answer.

**Inside of me** there was a complex set of conclusions I had drawn about how to deal with the world. They were based mainly on fear and the debilitating constructs of my own imagination. Even so, my own mind was a mystery to me. I was powerless to change my thinking. Alcohol medicated my suffering for as long as it worked. Unfortunately it stopped working.

There were two things on the walls of my first AA meeting place that I read every day. One was on twin posters listing the 12 Steps of the program and the other was a small sign that said 'Expect a Miracle'.

I didn't see how these 12 Steps could possibly result in a spiritual awakening. It seemed too simple. But I was ready to try anything. I decided to expect that miracle.

What I found out was that I was going to have to have to toss out a lot of garbage, replace fear with faith and turn my attention toward helping others. None of this is easy to do but the 12 Steps have an inspired design toward this purpose. Guiding me to discover, disclose and discard my old ways of thinking is part of their purpose and ongoing result.

**He Said:** (cont) do it?" But, carrying the message can take on many forms, and I have found that service to others keeps me aligned with, what I believe to be my Higher Power's will for my life. Lastly, we need to practice these principles in all our affairs.

When my life is running smoothly, it's easy for me to trust God, clean house, and serve others. However, I'm human, and at times my self-will tries to take charge. Of course, this is where the AA program matters most. The 12 Steps are specifically designed for me to get along with others and; in fact, consider their needs before my own.

The spiritual awakening has revealed a relationship and an understanding of my Higher Power that can and will do for me what I cannot do for myself. As long as I maintain contact with my Higher Power, I am granted a daily reprieve.

Willingness is the gift that alcoholism gave me. Only by suffering its ravages did I become entirely willing to let go. For an alcoholic the energy of life becomes an alarming downward spiral. It is fueled by a deathly obsession with alcohol that no one but a fellow alcoholic can understand. In helping each other we help ourselves. In a surprising way this affliction can become our salvation by the grace of a God who turns all things to good, for those who turn to God.

### **Some Significant Dates In Our Timeline:**

**October 1883:** A book is published – "The Greatest Thing in the World', by Henry Drummond. It is one of eleven books (including the Bible) that influenced how the Big Book was written.

Drummond describes 'Love" as being the greatest power in the world and goes on to describe the spectrum of love as having 9 elements; Patience – Kindness – Generosity – Humility – Courtesy – Guiltlessness - Unselfishness – Good Temper & Sincerity. To these 9 aspects the early alcoholics added Gratitude and Tolerance.

**October 1939:** The first national magazine to do an article on AA was 'Liberty magazine', with a two page article titled "Alcoholics and God." This article brought in over 1000 inquiries and sold 100 copies of our newly published book.

## **Concepts for World Service**

**CONCEPT XII**: General Warranties of the Conference: in all its proceedings, the General Service Conference shall observe the spirit of the A.A. Tradition, taking great care that the conference never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus an ample reserve, be its prudent financial principle; that none of the Conference Members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others: that all important decisions be reached by discussion vote and whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that no Conference action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and action.

... The Warranties of Article 12 are as follows: Warranty One: "The Conference shall never become the seat of perilous wealth or power." Warranty Two: "Sufficient operating funds, plus an ample Reserve, should be its prudent financial principle."

Warranty Three: "None of the Conference members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others."

**Warranty Four:** "That all important decisions be reached by discussion, vote, and, whenever possible, by substantial unanimity."

Warranty Five: "That no Conference action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy."

Warranty Six: "Though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in action and in spirit." ...

The sum of these several attitudes and practices is, in our view, the very essence of democracy—in action and spirit. Freedom under God to grow in His likeness and image will ever be the quest of the Alcoholics Anonymous. May our General Service Conference be always seen as a chief symbol of this cherished liberty. To a man, we of A.A. believe that our freedom to serve is truly the freedom by which we live—the freedom in which we have our being.
