The State of The City of Tucker

On May 11, two years and 70 days after Tucker became a city, Mayor Frank Auman gave the second State of the City of Tucker Address. You can watch the whole address online at www. tuckerga.gov and click on the Mayor's address. The speech is a little more than 40 minutes and well worth the time.

There are "moments in time that determine the future and the path for the future," said the Mayor. "Already, but not yet moments... where the course of action has been decided, but is not yet." The formation of Tucker was like that. The determination of many gave rise to the city of Tucker. But it was only a prelude... that is, until May 1, 2018 at the stroke of midnight. That was when Tucker became a fully functioning city, "subject to the laws of the state of Georgia."

Full cityhood means that three areas are now fully our own: Code Enforcement, Zoning and Planning, and Parks and Recreation. Additionally, Inter-Governmental Agreements (IGA's) are now in place to facilitate communication and cooperation with other areas vital to Tucker, such as Police Services, managing the new SPLOST, and turnover of the above services to Tucker.

Specifically: The Code Enforcement Department now has code policies in place, staff and a court system to enforce code violations. Zoning and Planning now has a Board of Appeals and a Construction Board of Appeals comprised of 20 members of the community of Tucker.


Tucker's cooperation with DeKalb County resulted in peaceful negotiations to take over Park Services using an innovative plan that let DeKalb County keep the waterways in Tucker's parks as part of its storm water management system. This means the county will keep the liability if any of the dams in three of Tucker's parks fail, while the city will hande oversight and management of the rest of the park. All of this was accomplished peacefully, without threats, finger pointing or lawsuits.

Other Parks and Recreation improvements: Cofer Park swim pool repair and new splash pad; Henderson Park resurfacing of the tennis courts and improving trails; Tucker Recreation Center; Main Street Theater and many new improved programs for all ages. Also, the city signed a contract with the YMCA to provide services including transportation.

The hundreds of volunteers through Friends of the Parks are an important part of Tucker's improvements! Thanks guys!

District 1 Update by Pat Soltys

Your council has been hard at work. April was very busy as we worked to meet the May 1 deadline for a fully functioning city. This means we worked on approving the budget, reviewing road work projects, approving the comprehensive plan with development requests and proposals for zoning changes, and approving staff to meet the city's needs.



In other big news, April 1, the City of Tucker took over all of our parks and began work with a bigger plan to come. We have many who have volunteered to work on District 1 parks with a high emphasis on the Smoke Rise Lord Property. There has also been a lot of input with a great deal from the Mom's groups. Soon you will see police cars that are marked "Tucker" as a part of our agreement with DeKalb. It means that there will be specific resources dedicated to Tucker.

Several District 1 streets were deemed among the worst - by scoring - and will be repaved soon. All streets in the city were graded. The council approved additional funds carried over from the 2017 fiscal year budget to cover the work that needs to be done. Potholes will still be the responsibility of DeKalb County. If you have potholes to report, our newly hired Citizen Responder, Camille Taylor is your lady to help you get action. She can be reached through ctaylor@tuckerga.gov or (678) 597-9040.

We also held and supported a week of events leading up to Tucker Day. It was very successful, with events held each day of the week and a huge street party at the end.

On Saturday, May 19 a work day in the Elmdale/Peters Park area is the result of community proactive leadership and the city coming together as well as Keep DeKalb Beautiful. This


Music, Drum Circles, Ukulele, Dulcimers, Dance, stage, art, explore the pipe organ and its chambers, and more.

Smoke Rise Baptist Weekday School has been serving the families of our community since 1973. Leaders of Smoke Rise Baptist Church started the school as a way to care for children and their families, nurturing and teaching them in a safe, loving and creative environment.





There is great pride across the generations for a school that adapts to the changing needs of the Smoke Rise community. There was a time when the community we serve was full of young families, and parents lined up to register their children for the upcoming school year. We are proud of that history. Today, our classes are smaller and more diverse as we also serve members of our neighboring communities. Smoke Rise Baptist Weekday School embraces the challenge of serving the needs of an ever-changing community.

Our school now operates five days a week. We offer classes for toddlers to Kindergartners. Each class emphasizes learning through play. Three special weekly activities include chapel, music and storytelling by a guest reader. Each child is enrolled in "1000 Books Before Kindergarten," a program in partnership with Georgia Public Library that encourages interactive reading. We are a member of the Georgia Preschool Association.

We are pleased to announce lower monthly tuition rates for our 2018/2019 school year. We are enrolling babies as young as six months old for Parents' Morning Out on Thursdays this fall at an incredibly low monthly rate.

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

Georgia Trust Seeks Nominations for 2019 Places in Peril SRCA Annual Shredding Event

The Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation is seeking nominations for its 2019 list of "Places in Peril," an annual accounting of the state's 10 most endangered historic places. The list is designed to raise




awareness about Georgia's significant historic, archaeological and cultural resources, including buildings, structures, districts, archaeological sites and cultural landscapes that are threatened by demolition, neglect, lack of maintenance, inappropriate development or insensitive public policy.

The submission deadline is Monday, June 11; the list will be announced in November.

Criteria

Historic properties are selected for listing based on several criteria:

- Sites must be listed or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places or the Georgia Register of Historic Places.
- Sites must be subject to a serious threat to their existence or historical, architectural and/ or archaeological integrity.
- There must be a demonstrable level of community commitment and support for the preservation of listed sites.



How to Nominate a Site

Visit GeorgiaTrust.org for a nomination form. Additional information about past "Places in Peril" sites can also be found on the website. Nominations must be postmarked or emailed no later than Monday, June 11.

Sites on previous years' lists include: Lexington Presbyterian Manse in Lexington, which was recently awarded a Georgia Trust Callahan Incentive Grant for the insulation, minor carpentry and weatherization of the first floor; Lyon Farm in Lithonia, which was given funding from DeKalb County to stabilize one of the oldest homesteads in the county; Harrington School, a historic African American school on St. Simons Island, which

was recently restored; and Hancock County Courthouse in Sparta, which was rebuilt after a fire destroyed much of the interior in 2014.

About the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation

Founded in 1973, the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation works for the preservation and revitalization of Georgia's diverse historic resources and advocates their appreciation, protection and use.





The annual Smoke Rise Community Association Shredding Event held April 21 on the grounds of the elementary school, with partner EagleShred, was unprecedented in scale. There were around 20 cars in line at the time the truck arrived at 9:50 a.m. and a robust stream of vehicles that continued pretty much unabated until

the truck filled two hours and 25 minutes later. The total served was estimated at 130, exceeding the previous high of about 80 last year. The destruction of the equivalent of 350 banker's boxes of documents was done at a cost



to SRCA of \$300.00, but had a value of \$1,655.00. It seems likely, especially with the power of sharing information via social media, that this event has morphed from a small, manageable neighborhood service to something grander. SRCA believes the shredding event will require greater organization and more volunteers, than the historical one, to sustain it in future years. 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More City of Tucker Updates

The Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST) passed by 70% in the November 2017 election. That approval means a one cent sales tax began in April and will continue for six years throughout DeKalb County. (The sales tax does not apply to unprepared food or prescription medicine.)

Cities in DeKalb County and the county passed what is called an Inter-Governmental Agreement (IGA) which created a distribution formula for SPLOST funds, based on the population of each city. The tax is expected to generate \$636 million dollars in DeKalb during the next six years. It is estimated Tucker will receive more than \$31 million dollars from SPLOST generated funds during that time.

The IGA for SPLOST worked with Tucker to decide who is responsible for what. DeKalb County will remain responsible for maintenance and repairs of roadways, (like potholes). Tucker will be responsible for resurfacing and capital projects on roadways and drainage. This will be done in a very cooperative format, so that Tucker can actually track cost, successes, failures and work flow. For more SPLOST information, visit dekalbsplost.com.

Tucker's Communication Department has its own Help Desk! The new "Citizen Responder" is a liaison between Tucker and DeKalb County to help answer questions and connect residents with services especially related to transportation, roads, drainage and waterways, and police and fire.

The IGA to help manage Police Services has put the entire city into one precinct. Also a police liaison, Lt. Shoppner, briefs the Mayor every two weeks on crime and prevention.

A Comprehensive Plan: This plan is a comprehensive summary of Tucker's aspirations for the future, and a work plan to get it done. This took a citywide input process and 18 months of work with the company CH2M to develop a final plan.

Five Goals that came out of the Comprehensive Plan:


- 1. Enhance Downtown Tucker: This will include considering parking, the vision of property owners, and attempting to increase the desirability of downtown. Training and developing a new Downtown Development Authority will be a part of the process.
- 2. Improve Transportation: An assessment of every road in Tucker was completed. Six million dollars worth of work will begin on our roads starting in the fall of 2018. There will also be an assessment of trails and connectivity.
- 3. Preserve and Improve Neighborhoods: The zoning commission approved modern apartments for working adults and seniors to replace worn out ones near Northlake and singe family dwellings elsewhere in Tucker. Five hundred land development inspections were done, most not requiring any zoning change.
- 4. Strengthen Recreation and Community Resources: Several years' worth of progress have been made. The county has held up its end, completing some "heritage projects" even though the city now has the full responsibility for Parks. A culture of mutual trust and respect are behind this.
- 5. Bolster Economic Basis: More than 300 new business licenses in the city of Tucker were granted last year. There were also new investments through relocation from other counties and by voluntary annexations by areas like Briarcliff Village and the entire Stone Mountain CID.

These goals will develop and change over time, but will be decided upon by us as a city, not by the county. After the Comprehensive Plan, there will be new research on roads and connectivity, parks and the trails connecting them, the development of a downtown corridor and road safety. The Mayor anticipates that this research will include input from 50-75 Tucker residents.

The Facts on Age Related Cataracts



A cataract is a condition that affects the lens of the eye. In its healthy state, the lens which is composed mainly of water and protein, is transparent. When the crystalline protein in the lens begins to break down and clump, light refracts and diffuses instead of passing straight through to the retina. This means the image is less focused and may be cloudy. Cataracts develop very slowly, often over decades, and vision decreases slowly. During the early stages of a cataract, most people don't notice much change in their vision, because only a tiny area of the lens is affected. They might begin to see halos or starbursts around lights or headlights or need brighter light to read. Eventually, depth perception is off and color perception is distorted or yellowed. Driving in low light conditions or at night becomes difficult and dangerous. Finally, if the cataracts are allowed to progress, the entire lens becomes cloudy and blindness can result.

No one knows what causes cataracts. Many physicians consider them to be an almost "normal" process of aging- more than half of adults have them by age 80. Almost 95% of cataracts are due to aging. There is no sure way to prevent cataracts, although one study did show that those who had a high dietary intake of fruits and vegetables had fewer cataracts. Dietary supplements did not have the same effect. In fact, no vitamin or supplement, including castor oil, prevents or treats cataracts. Avoiding risk factors for cataract development may translate into prevention, though. These risk factors are worth avoiding: smoking, high blood pressure, diabetes, obesity, overuse of alcohol, and sunlight exposure (wear sunglasses with 100% UVA and UVB protection!).

Other than age related cataracts—trauma to the eye (like a BB to the eye), radiation to the head and neck and chronic steroid use can cause cataracts. You can also be born with cataracts.

Initially, treatment of cataracts means using eyeglasses, a magnifying lens, and brighter light for close work and avoiding driving in dim light conditions. Later in the process, as vision declines and begins to affect daily activities, treatment of cataracts is surgical.

In the old days, surgery for cataracts meant removing the lens of the eye and then the patient wearing "coke bottle" glasses in order to see. Cataract surgery has improved drastically since that time! Now, during the minutes-long surgery, the lens is removed and an artificial lens is put in its place, usually without the need for stitches. The majority (90% or more) of patients achieve near 20/20 vision- sometimes hours after surgery! Most patients recover quickly. Patients cannot drive for 24 hours, and are instructed not to do heavy lifting or bending for a few weeks. Antibiotic and steroid drops are prescribed to prevent swelling and infection. The eye heals rapidly, and most patients are back to normal with much improved vision in two to four weeks.

Something to chew on: An interesting research study was published in 2015. In the study (on dogs and rabbits), Lanosterol, a naturally occurring steroid that seems to be missing in some patients with congenital cataracts actually dissolved cataracts. Preliminary studies in humans have not shown a similar effect with the doses used in animals. More human studies are needed. And a note: the original study was very small--- only seven dogs received Lanosterol drops. AND, the study only lasted a few months, so one knows if the cataracts reoccurred when the drops were stopped.

Kathy leads tours for children's groups and volunteers for events such as the concerts, festivals, Holiday Nights, and Garden Lights. She teaches children's classes and catalogues books in the botanical library.

Not only does Kathy volunteer at the Garden, but she is serving as First Vice President of GFWC Stone Mountain Woman's Club in charge of all special program committees for the next two years. Congratulations to a very busy lady.

Barbara Delong and "The Sunshine Girls" By Barbara Bruschi

In early April, there was an article in the Atlanta Journal Constitution describing a group of amazing girls who attended the Decatur Girls High School class of 1951 and maintained their friendships for more than 70 years. Our own Barbara DeLong is fortunate to be a member of this unique group of the original 14 ladies. The AJC article of April 11, 2018 went on to describe this group who met at the Capitol City Club to celebrate the completion of a booklet which describes the stories, photos, meetings and travels of this group of ladies dating back to their school years at DGHS.(Decatur Girls High School).

These ladies were known as "The Sunshine Girls" (TSG). They met at the Capital Club for a luncheon where one of their members had conscientiously been recording the events of their many travels and adventures over the decades. She presented each member with a booklet which included a brief biography of each girl, along with a description and photos of their monthly gatherings and travels. Some of the stories of this group of girls go back to their kindergarten days, grade school, and high school events, as well as present day activities.

The story of TSG is not a work of fiction but rather a re-creation of the lives and times of these friends. It all started around 1951 at graduation time, when this group started out in the world with their careers, weddings, and life experiences. The group meets monthly (today eight members are still actively engaged). Those who remained in the area formed a bridge group for regular meetings. Early activities included weddings, baby showers, birthday celebrations, holiday and Christmas parties. A Sweetheart Dinner was introduced to include the husbands on a regular basis.

In 1974, one of the members invited the ladies to her beach house in Fernandina Beach, FL. This was the start of regular beach holidays that continued for more than 35 years. TSG would leave each year for this beach holiday for fun in the sun, bridge sessions, cook outs and long beach walks. Biking on the Plantation, shopping and having a drink in the bar of the Ritz Carlton, swimming and crabbing, as well as visits to the cinema were cherished activities. Each trip and event was chronologically recorded in detail for each member to recall fun events and fond memories of the past years. The travels included trips to Richmond, VA, Dallas TX, Wilmington, NC, Thomasville, GA Selma, AL, Hilton Head, SC, Ashville, NC Fort Collins,

CO Lookout Mountain, TN, New York City, Callaway Gardens, GA just to mention a few.

bought a lovely triplex on Lake Chatuge in Hiawassee, GA which became a regular visit starting in 1988 and continuing until 2002. How lucky are these sunshine girls to have each other in the eve of life? Looking back and going forward together is a golden treasure to behold till the end of times.











Distracted Driving Law to Start July 1

Georgia governor Nathan Deal signed a hands-free distracted driving bill into law last month. House Bill 673 requires drivers to use hands-free technology when using cell phones, and other electronic devices, while driving in the state of Georgia.

The law begins July 1, when it will be illegal to hold a phone in your hand while driving in Georgia. The governor signed the bill in Statesboro, GA. It's where Georgia Southern University is located. You might remember, five nursing students from GS were killed in a highway crash near Savannah in April 2015. The truck driver found responsible for that deadly crash, John Wayne, is serving a five-year prison sentence for vehicular homicide.

As with all laws, there are particular measures - regulating behavior - which are spelled out in detail. But, also keep in mind, the law is intended to stop senseless traffic accidents and deaths – so use your common sense.

Here's a recap of specifics found in House Bill 673:

Actions that are prohibited

- * Holding or supporting, with any part of the body, a wireless telecommunications device or stand-alone electronic device (for example, a phone, tablet or MP3 music player).
- Writing, sending or reading any text-based communication, including a text message, instant message, email or internet data while holding your device.
- Watching a video or movie (watching data related to the navigation of your vehicle is ok, for example a navigation app or GPS screen).
- Recording a video.

Actions that are allowed:

- * Using hands-free technology to speak to or send a text to someone.
- * Using a GPS system or mapping app.
- * Wearing and using a smart watch.
- Using an earpiece to speak with someone on the phone.
- * Using radios, CB radios, CB radio hybrids, commercial two-way radios, subscription-based emergency communication devices, prescribed medical devices, amateur or ham radios and "in-vehicle security, navigation or remote diagnostics" systems.

Again, the law goes into effect July 1, 2018, and offenders will face stiff fines for violating the law.


Mountain Shadow Garden Club Features New Book on Georgia's Historic Gardens

"Seeking Eden: A Collection of Georgia's Historic Gardens" is the title of a new book published by University of Georgia Press which tells the stories of nearly 30 historic designed land-scapes in the state. The authors are Staci L. Catron and Mary Ann Eaddy, with photography by James R. Lockhart.

On Monday evening, June 11, Ms. Catron will present a program at Mountain Shadow Garden Club (MSGC) discussing the book and the gardens it features. She is Director of the Cherokee Garden Library, Kenan Research Center at the Atlanta History Center. Co-author Mary Ann Eaddy is retired from the Historic Preservation Center of the Georgia Department of Natural Resources.

The book promotes awareness and appreciation of Georgia's rich garden history. It updates and expands information on gardens first identified in the early twentieth century publication Garden History of Georgia, 1733-1933. These publicly



and privately owned gardens include nineteenth century parterres, Colonial Revival Gardens, Country Place era landscapes, rock gardens, historic town squares, college campuses, and an urban conservation garden. Seeking Eden explores the significant impact of the women who envisioned and nurtured many of these now special places and the role of well-known profes-

sional designers. It also notes the influence of the Garden Club Movement in Georgia in the early twentieth century.

Ms. Catron holds degrees from Agnes Scott College and Georgia State University and is a past president of the Southern Garden History Society. She manages the development, care, preservation, interpretation, and use of the collection comprised of more than 32,000 items currently in the Cherokee Garden Library. Her articles and essays have been published in many magazines, newsletters, journals, and books.

Copies of the new book, Seeking Eden, will be available for purchase at the MSGC program. Book proceeds will go toward the Garden Club of Georgia's Historic Landscape Preservation Grant program.

MSGC is open to men and women of all ages who enjoy learning about a diverse range of topics related to home land-scapes, plants, and gardens. The meeting and program begin at 7:30 p.m. in Founders Hall, Eastminster Presbyterian Church, 5801 Hugh Howell Road, Stone Mountain. Free. Refreshments follow.

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
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Smoke Rise Morning Glories Veg Out!

Well, not exactly! Our May meeting was an interesting change of pace. We visited Hall's Flower Shop and Garden Center on Memorial Drive and enjoyed a lecture and demonstration with Amy Hegwood, Horticulturist and Landscape Designer. Amy provided a number of excellent pointers on planting vegetables in containers to be enjoyed and harvested from our sunny patios and courtyards. As she noted, the key to success with this type of gardening is to use the correct soil, the right size container, regular fertilization, consistent watering, and lots of sunshine.

One key tip was to line the container with old cardboard along the sides and plant in a plastic bag with holes cut for drainage. It helps retain moisture but still allows for the water to pass through. She suggested planting tomatoes, beans, okra, peppers, and even cucumbers with this method. Amy noted that she uses trellises to support the growing plants. She advised us to use companion herbs



for extra flavor and enjoyment in cooking and to aid in pollination of the plants. One fun suggestion was to use sweet gum balls as mulch under your plants in the containers to deter the squirrels!

Planting in containers placed in a sunny place near your home will also be a deer deterrent, as they are less likely to graze so close to your home. As we know, deer are always an issue with vegetable gardening in our community. Amy demonstrated a wide variety of tomatoes to try with this method. She recommended cutting off half the lower branches of the tomato and planting it deep within the container or even sideways in the container, covering the cut portions of the stem with soil. The cut portions will become a new and stronger root system to support the plant and its fruit

President Bonnie Pennington noted that the Morning Glories won a variety of awards at the DeKalb Federation Awards ceremony, including First Place for members' Year Book and for the Community Service Award. Additional awards were won at the Garden Club of GA, Inc. convention in Macon this April.

Now that the weather is heating up, everyone and his brother wants to go on a picnic. This month, while Jenny Busch takes a break, the Smoke Signal Staff decided to send their favorite picnic recipes in to help you out!

Instead of plain ole watermelon slices, how about something just as refreshing, and a little more guest friendly? You can add blueberries and arugula and basil instead of mint if you want to vary the recipe.

Watermelon Mint Feta Salad

12 cups cubed seedless watermelon

1 ½ cups crumbled feta cheese

1 cup of fresh mint leaves/chopped

3 limes, juiced and strained

1/4 c olive oil

1 ½ tsp salt, 1 tsp black pepper

Mix olive oil, lime juice, salt and pepper together. Toss with watermelon, mint leaves and blueberries if you like. Add feta and toss when you guests arrive. This salad should not be made too far ahead as the salty ingredients makes the watermelon "sweat."

This is super easy and different than coleslaw with mayo.

Asian Cole Slaw

6 large scallions, trimmed and sliced

½ cup soy sauce

2 bags of coleslaw w or without carrots

1/4 cup rice wine vinegar or lemon juice

1 small red onion, sliced thin

1/4 cup canola oil plus 1 Tbsp. sesame oil

2 Tbsp. Grated fresh ginger

Chow Mein noodles (optional)

Sliced almonds (optional)

Mix coleslaw, onion and scallions with tongs. Mix soy sauce, vinegar, oil and ginger together. Pour over slaw and toss. Add Chow Mein noodles and almonds before serving. Many people like the crunch of the almonds and noodles.

This BBQ Sauce is awesome! It goes well on pork, beef, chicken or salmon, so use your imagination!! Most of the time you can marinade the meat 30 min before grilling and brush on the extras during cooking. Make extra and freeze for a rainy day.

BBQ Sauce

1 ½ cups brown sugar

1 ½ cups ketchup

½ cup red wine vinegar

½ cup water

1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce

2 ½ Tbsp. dry mustard

2 tsp paprika

2 tsp salt

1 ½ tsp black pepper

2 dashes hot pepper sauce (or more if you like it "hot")

In a blender, combine brown sugar, ketchup, vinegar, water and Worcestershire sauce. Season with mustard, paprika, salt, pepper, and hot pepper sauce. Blend until smooth. This should fill a 32 ounce ketchup bottle exactly. Reduce the brown sugar to make it less sweet, or add more Worcestershire for more "steak sauce" appeal.

For those watching calories! This dessert is a great one to take to a picnic! It is cool, chocolaty and can be as sugar free as you like! This is very forgiving!

Graham Cracker Boston Crème Pie Dessert

2 small pkgs. instant regular or sugar free vanilla cream pudding 1 carton (8 oz.) cool whip, can be fat free or regular, or even home made

3 cups cold milk (skim)

1 box honey graham crackers

1 can pre-made chocolate or fudge frosting

Begin recipe by mixing pudding and milk on low with beaters. Fold cool whip in until incorporated. Line a 13x9 pan with graham crackers. Break a few if you need to make it fit. Spread half of the pudding mix with a spatula. Put another layer of graham crackers over the pudding. Spread the second half of the pudding over this layer of graham crackers. Finish with another layer of graham crackers. Take the chocolate frosting and heat in the microwave for 30 seconds at a time until it is runny. Pour over the final cracker layer. Cover. Put the dessert in the fridge for 3 or more hours or overnight. Take to the picnic in the pan.
