6. Manager's Report:

Town invoices were sent to member town offices via email and certified mail on January 10. We've had a couple of calls/questions, but no one seems outraged by the increase. Freedom called to see if they were going to get a second invoice because they expected it be higher!

- Mike has been teaching me (Leigh) to do lots of fun stuff ME/Fed 941 and unemployment tax, W2/W3, payroll.
- We've had 239 visitors in the first two weeks of January.

We are open on Tuesdays again.

I did a ZOOM training session with Maine DEP on Tuesday. According to the DEP, we don't have to recycle alkaline batteries. There is so little to be recovered and they recommend tossing those into the trash. They have more trainings scheduled, which I plan to attend, along with Casey. With Jeff retiring in the next year, we'll need to have someone certified to take hazardous waste.

Jeff estimates we've given away 200-300 pounds of crushed glass during January. Most are

using it for weight and one person is specifically using it for sandblasting.

What does it take to make a bale?

- 75-90 bags of film
  9-10 boxes of OCC
  100-110 bags of #2 natural plastic
  4.5-5.5 boxes of mixed paper or newspaper
  4 cages/bins of tin/steel/aluminum
  4 barrels of bottles/jars = 3/4 barrel crushed glass
  Typically, 34-38 bales will fit in a tractor trailer

Eleanor & Ross both made comments

Ross looked at regional markets for films - "depressing".

Last moved at -40 a ton - used to be 1,000 a ton (dollars)

1 sliver of promising news - a manufacturing facility is opening up making composite materials. If they get off the ground - could open up a market.

If we keep taking it - storage is an issue/negative price to get rid of it/sorting

Some 'big-box' stores backhaul to a recovery mill; could reach out to see if there is a possibility there.

Committee (and entire Board) have a 3 month window to look at films. A decision to keep taking them or rejecting them will be made in April.

10. Agenda Adjustments:

Eleanor spoke of reaching out to educational facilities for education opportunities. Also spoke of recycled materials used as art/creative mediums.

Phil spoke of renewing the Center's credit cards. He will take care of it at the bank. Michael distributed info from revision Energy having to do with our solar panels.
