All who confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, have been baptized in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, are repentant of their sins and believe the Blessed Sacrament to be the true Body and Blood of Christ are invited to receive the Sacrament of the Altar. We hope that you will enter fully into worship by joining in the prayers, responses and hymns. Because our worship may be unfamiliar to those not raised in the Episcopal Church, feel free to ask the assistance of those around you in following and participating in the liturgy. If you are in search of a church home, we invite you to join us in worship, fellowship and service. Please sign the guest register at the church entrance so we may have a record of your visit.







PRAYER OF HUMBLE ACCESS

COMMUNION - In splendóribus

With an holy worship, the dew of thy birth is of the womb of the morning.

In splendóribus sanctorum, ex útero ante lucíferum génui te.

As soon as the Celebrant has finished distributing Holy Communion to the altar party and choir, the members of the Congregation should approach the altar rail.

All Christians baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost are welcome to receive the Body and Blood of our Lord. Others who instead wish to receive a blessing may also come and kneel at the altar rail. The Celebrant will know to bless those who bow their heads and cross their arms over their chest.

The custom for receiving Holy Communion in this parish is to receive the host (bread) on the outstretched right palm of the hand (supported underneath by the left palm) or directly on the tongue; to receive the chalice, gently guide the base of the chalice with your hand to allow the rim to reach your lips. If you wish to receive by intinction, please offer the Host to the Chalice bearer, who will intinct for you. After receiving the Sacrament or a blessing, please return to your pew and kneel or sit.

Advent Letter, 2021

As I've told you all many times, Christmas is my favorite holy day, but part of why I love Christmas so much is because I love the season of Advent. Out come our gorgeous purple vestments and altar frontal, the Advent wreath (more candles!), and the readings turn to prophecy, signs, and portents, to the advent of the Christ Child and to the second advent, His glorious return. And, of course, Advent calendars!

The calendar in the Rectory, as you might imagine, is an Advent calendar made for cats. Trader Joe's sells one with salmon and dried seaweed flavored cat treats. When I looked online to see if they were going to be selling them this year, I stumbled upon a short history of Advent calendars.

The calendars as we know them came out of a mid-19th Century tradition in Germany, when families would make chalk marks on doors or light candles each day of Advent. A printed version was produced in a German newspaper; eventually it was attached to cardboard and featured the little doors hiding treats or Bible verses.

Then things got a little, well, sinister. The Nazis weren't real big on Jesus being Jewish, and so they attempted to turn Christmas into a holiday celebrating "the fatherland." In 1943, a full-color calendar was produced by the Third Reich for distribution to German mothers; it included, among other things, designs that incorporated swastikas and other Nazi symbols. It's chilling, as you might imagine.

Following the war, with the war on Christmas defeated with the Nazis and the theme returned to Christmas as we know it, Advent calendars made their way stateside thanks to the boom in production and the GIs who sent them home to their families. They got a boost in popularity when Newsweek published a photograph of President Dwight D. Eisenhower's grandchildren with an Advent calendar in 1953.

Advent calendars are part of the great fun that accompanies the great joy of receiving once again the Christ Child at Christmas. No matter if they are filled with chocolate, Bible verses, or are simple chalk marks on a door, they help us mark time, center our hearts and minds on Jesus, and reminds us, even as the darkness encroaches, that the Light of the World has come, and will come again.

I pray that the Lord will bless you as you mark the time this Advent, and grant you His joy and His peace this Christmas.

PROPERTY NEWS: McCabe Electric has installed LED lighting in the two Parish House first floor classrooms, the accessible restroom, and our choir room. The Chapel altar window may now be illuminated from the outside. The lenses have been replaced in the ten parking lot lamps providing more light in the area. Two LED fixtures now give dusk to dawn light to our lychgate creating a safer environment. These projects have been supported in part by a bequest from the estate of Richard P. Knott to Christ Episcopal Church. Mr. Knott, 93, passed away in Florida. Before his retirement, he had worked with Rue Insurance Company in Hamilton, NJ. Mr. Knott attended services during the 1980s and early 1990s and was a friend of Father Benedict. The balance of funding for the LED projects, including some updated lighting in the Rectory, is supported by our non-budget Building Fund. We sincerely appreciate Mr. Knott's generous bequest to Christ Church. We thank our parishioners and friends of Christ Church who contribute to our Building Fund. This is an important way to directly help with the upkeep of our Parish.
