# WORKING ON THE SHOP - courtesy of Jim Stottlemyer

It sometimes seems that I spend as much time working on the shop as working in it. Mechanical wear and breakdowns are to be expected, or so I tell myself. A few weeks ago I helped Rod find a new home for his old dust collector. Rod is setting up a new shop and had decided to replace the dust collector. It was one exactly like the one in my shop so I could vouch for its quality. Only a few days after delivering the collector to its new home mine began to make a funny noise. Maybe odd noise is a better description since I was not amused. It sounded like bearings and I immediately regretted not grabbing the other collector to keep for parts. Even so, the collector was 25 years old and had run flawlessly for the entire period. Of course I didn't replace the bearings immediately. The noise came and went then came and stayed and finally got so bad I couldn't bring myself to turn it on. I have a unique system that provides back up, albeit weaker, vacuum. I used this for a while until the day I finally decided to repair it.

It was a simple job. Disconnect the power, remove the duct, empty the bags, lift the collector off its stand, remove the impeller cover, remove the impeller blade, and finally remove the motor. It probably took an hour and a half. While carrying the motor to the bench there was a sound of loose parts inside. Three screws later I saw the culprit, a loose cooling fan. I only spent an hour searching for the setscrew before giving up and heading to the hardware store. They didn't have one that fit either so I made do with one slightly bigger.

Everything is now back together and running smooth. I only spent about three hours of wasted time on a job that should have taken 10 minutes. Such is life. With that complete I can move on to the next repair – band saw guide bearings.
