INNER ATTITUDE OF HUMILITY!

(Zeph. 2:3; 3:12-13; Ps. 146:6-10; 1Cor. 1:26-31; Matt. 5:1-12a)

Many nations, in times of poverty or of moderate means of living, have existed as godly (or Christian) nations. Unfortunately, after drinking from the chalice of capitalism and becoming wealthy, they turned away from God and became disinterested in religion and instead pursued their godless ways. Some individuals who served God devotedly in their moments of want and desperation have, unfortunately, turned away from Him in their riches and comfort. A woman once shared with me the painful experience she had and why she had to divorce her husband of ten years: "When we first met, he was the sweetest person you would ever want to be with. He was very loving and cooperative. But he was uneducated, poor and humble." On the other hand, she was very educated and wealthy. "I put him through school, but sadly, a few years after we got married, he won a lottery and became super-rich." His attitude changed. He became proud, selfish, and was rude to her. She added, "He started playing pranks and became greedy." With some bitterness in her tone, she cautioned, "Father, don't trust the humility of a poor person, because when they get rich they become proud, mean and selfish. True humility comes from the one who is rich but humble."

On this fourth Sunday, the Lord Jesus teaches us about humility in His Great Sermon through the Beatitudes. In the Gospel of Matthew, this Great Sermon is known as "The Sermon on the Mount", while Luke on the other hand calls it "Sermon on the Plains." Matthew is a devoted Jew from the priestly clan (a Levi), hence his reason for choosing this location is that he understands the teaching of the "Sermon on the Mount" as the 'New Law', corresponding to the 'Old Law' given by the Lord God to Moses on Mount Sinai. For Matthew, Jesus is the second Moses, the giver of the 'New Law.'

For us who read or listen to the *Beatitudes* today, it may seem very discordant as they did to the apostles who listened to them many years ago. You may wonder how the poor, the meek, the merciful, the pure in heart and even the persecuted could consider themselves happy. One would naturally recoil from such a description. This is precisely why Jesus is presenting the Beatitudes to us because he wants to give us a road map to help find not just the emotional happiness, but the blessing and grace of God in our lives. He wants us to find true joy, real fulfillment and contentment even in our poverty (or riches), hence, He says, "Blessed are the poor in spirit..."

Accordingly, true humility, is not an emotion of pretence, but an attitude of love and compassion. It is a virtue! Christian "meekness" or humility is the strength that comes from nonviolent commitment to a just cause – accepting the "daily persecutions" for the sake of "the Kingdom of God." As priests, parents, teachers and leaders of the community, Prophet Zephaniah exhorts us to "seek justice and humility" in our resolve to "pasture and couch the flocks" the Lord has entrusted to our care. In today's second reading, St Paul exhorts you and me to be conscious of the fact that our Christian calling is "a call to humility, holiness and selfsacrifice." Above all, it is a call to service! We are not called to brag how rich or how powerful we are, nor are we called to boast of our position or intelligence and achievements. Instead, if you and I must boast, "We should boast in the Lord". Boasting in the Lord entails the realization that all we are and have are gifts from the Lord. *Poverty of spirit* is, in fact, an inner attitude of humility!





PRESENTATION OF THE LORD



The Presentation of the Lord pulls many favorite mementos from the Catholic cupboard: candles, blessings, Christmas and church. The Mass of February 2nd begins with a blessing of lighted candles held by the faithful, who glow with the memory of the birth of Jesus.

The origins of the feast lie in ancient Jewish custom. On the 40th day after childbirth, parents brought their infant to the Temple to present him/her to the Lord and to purify the mother. St. Luke tells us that Joseph and Mary sacrificed two birds for the occasion after the birth of Jesus. Count up 40 days after Christmas and you'll come to February 2nd. Until the 1960s, we used to call this day "The Purification of Mary." The title changed for several reasons. We no longer believe that women who give birth need purification, and the true significance of the feast concerns Jesus coming to the Temple. He is the Promised One, Whose light will shine, beaming rays of hope to all the world. Also on the old calendar, this feast closed the Christmas season. Now we end the Christmas season with the Baptism of the Lord. So, even though the date for the Presentation still depends on Christmas, it has become a feast of ordinary time. Since it is a feast of the Lord, it takes precedence even when it falls on Sunday.

The candles you hold for the blessing come from your own home. If you like to use blessed candles for household prayer throughout the year, here is your chance to get them. On the day following this feast, our calendar permits the option of commemorating St. Blaise, a bishop and martyr of the early church. Legend has it that he once freed a child from choking, and while imprisoned under persecution he received light from friends who visited his cell with candles. Our church still uses candles from the Presentation of the Lord in the blessing of the faithful's throats on St. Blaise's Day. Blessed candles in our churches and homes signify the living presence of Christ in our community. With Christ as our light we warm a lost and wintry world.
