Choose two people or characters from two different books who you would think would be great friends, explaining why.	Choose a character and imagine you walked into his/her room. List parts of the text that appeal to each of the five senses.
Record at least 7 vocabulary words that you found interesting. Note the definition of the words and why you chose those words.	Draw a diagram of something that was described in the book and label the parts.	Explain how the text presents information that all students should know.	Describe how nature played a role in events from the text.
Write a short story about what the characters would be doing one year later.	Use a graphic organizer to compare/contrast two characters in the text.	Critique the motives/ actions of the characters in the text.	Choose a character and imagine he had to pack a suitcase for a trip. What would you find in it and why?
