Requests for volunteers to chair committees, or to work on a committee, seem to have the turtle reaction, pull your neck into the shell, or the ostrich action, bury your head in the sand. Yes, we clam up.

Our DDA has relied upon the help of members in association operations but there seems to be an atmosphere of complacency. There is a bit of hesitancy in responses for volunteers. Thus, the load falls upon the leadership group to make the necessary preparations for association functions. You are not giving your leadership group a fair shake.

The success of your DDA has fallen on the shoulders of the same few people year in and year out. You can talk all you want about the quality of our own DDA, but I put before you the course of the DDA in the last ten years compared to other viable dart organizations and there is no room for bragging.

Until the membership makes available their services, input, and support, we will remain floundering. A cooperative membership will need no second request for committee chairpersons or volunteers when asked.

The main responsibility will then fall upon the leadership group to properly plan, well in advance, the course the DDA will take; establish the necessary committees, chairpersons and members; and assure that the necessary funds are, and will be, available to complete each planned function.

An enthusiastic volunteer group will provide the machinery to execute. A progressive leadership group will steer the DDA to higher state and national stature.

KEVIN RYAN, and TRACY HERRON who broke the 4-4 tie to enable the Southsiders to place third. Final standings:



DISTRACTIONS

Have there been occasions when on a match night you have left the house not caring much whether you play or not? This is not to be confused with loss of interest in the game, it is more a question of whether the standard of play, the personalities of darters present, or harassment, make it worthwhile turning out.

On this score, it is my opinion that unless you have for some good reason given up on local league darts, and it is commonly known, that you owe local players, and the game in general, your appearance.

Local players, despite the occasional catcalls we probably experienced from time to time, do like to see the better players in the area perform, and eat it up to see a lower rated darter play a close match, or even win. Let's face it, unless that strained victory comes your way, you are just another intimidated darter.

Be mentally pumped up to overcome undesirable circumstances and distracting game conditions, and be determined to win over inconsiderate local players. The practice of self restraint by merely ignoring all contact, physical, visual, verbal, or just casual, with unreasonable or objectionable competitors can be irritating to some questionable darters. Exercise just enough restraint to offset any distracting mental

thoughts or to disrupt the concentration pattern. Oh, yes, there can be some noticeable and upsetting results. Try it, you may find the solution to all your problems.

Patience is a virtue which any darter can develop to endure those seemingly timeless, irritating situations.

Darting is a typical competitive sport and on the lower levels you will encounter distractions. The development of good darting manners and courtesies are demonstrated in your upper eschelon darting circles. Manners and etiquette at the darting "oche" is as much a requirement as proper manners around the home. Let's see if we can be courteous to each other and take a win with humility and a loss with a smile (though at times it may hurt); and when you lose, can you crack a smile, just a little one?

Every sword has, of course, two edges. It may be that when you lose to an inferior or harassing player it has disastrous effect on your morale. This will annoy any darter, but it is good psychology to go out of your way to make a big deal of the win by your opponent. It may be hard but this false sense of superiority may lead to overconfidence and losing the match.







- o KEN WEBB pounded out three T80s and lost a tough one to DAVE SMITH, leaving him in the Top 8 in the Open Singles.

DART TIPS (Reprinted from DART NEWS)

Players often complain that whenever they buy new darts, for the first few days they have them they get a lot more "bounce outs" than they are used to. They get very frustrated even to the degree that they go back to their old darts. These actions can well be corrected with very little effort.

New darts bounce out of the board because of two reasons: 1) the dart is overly sharp; 2) the sides of the point are very smooth and shiny. What happens with a sharp point is this. The dart actually sticks into the wire spider on the board and then bounces out. With a blunter dart it will slide around the wire and enter the board. With reason 2) the sides are so slippery that the fibers in the board have nothing to grip when the dart hits them so it just rebounds out. Luckily the cure for both problems is simple. Just burr over the points of new darts very, very slightly. Roughen up the sides with emery paper or a brick wall.

Bob McLeod of Darts Unlimited strongly opposes the practice of continually sharpening darts. "If you keep them to a needle point you are going to get a lot more bounce outs and on top of this you stand in danger of either getting a hook on the point or breaking it off altogether," Bob reports. "You are better off just sharpening them enough just to keep the point semi-sharp."

DARTS FOR THE BEGINNER

It seems a bit of confusion was encountered during the start of the darting season when the Novice teams, and even some of the teams in other divisions, were bewildered or stymied when certain situations presented themselves. From time to time we will try to publish darting hints, descriptions, darting language, explanations, or even answers to your questions or problems. The bulk of this will be elementary to the older darters, but some of you may be surprised to find a fact here or there unknown to you.

I hope this will enable all the newer darters to become more knowledgeable about darts a little faster and that these darting tidbits will be of value in developing your game.

DARTS - THE GAME

There are three contests, or legs, in a full game, and the best of three contests wins. The aim of a contest is to score an exact number of points, and the first player or team to do so wins.

The number of points involved should be agreed upon before the start. There is no standard total, but these are the most popular:

In a Singles game the total is 301, each player starting on a double and finishing on a double—that is, his first and last darts must be in the doubles ring or the bull's eye (double 25). We call this double in, double out (DI/DO). In some individual championships the rules of the competition stipulate that the legs will be 501, not starting on a double but finishing on one. This is called straight start, double out (SS/DO).

In pairs games the usual total is 501 starting and finishing on a double. In some parts of the North of England a game is played in which both players must get a double before the side can start scoring. This is highly unusual and one off, both off, is the normally accepted method of play. We play 501 SS,DO.

With four, six, or eight players each side, it is usual to play for 1001, starting on any number but finishing on a double.

The bull's eye counts as a double in any game. It is common in friendly games* in many pubs for a player to be given the game, if during a single throw, he places his three darts in the same doubles, or

if he scores a Shanghai—a single, double and treble of the same number. This is purely a private arrangement, however, and is not considered a winning shot among serious dart players.

In competition matches the right to throw first is decided by a toss of a coin. The winner throws first in the first leg, second in the second leg. The right to throw first in the final leg is again decided by the toss of a coin.

In friendly games the right to throw first is decided by each player, or the captain of each side throwing a dart at the center of the board. This is called a middle for diddle, a diddle, or a cork (the throw for the middle or bull's eye to see who starts first). The nearest to the bull's eye throws first. In the event of a deciding leg, the bull's eye is thrown for again.

The players on each side throw three darts alternately, and continue to do so until the game is finished. In team games the order of throwing should remain the same throughout. Once a match has started, no player on either team may be changed. It is permissible, however, if one team is a player short when the game begins, to include that player in the following leg.

*Friendlies, or friendly games is common dart terminology in England for pickup games in the English Pub. When you visit your local watering hole and shoot a game or two with a local darter or a friend, you are engaging in a game of friendlies.

So you never heard of "Foot" Anakin. Well, this is an authentic incident and is documented in the annals of DARTING HISTORY.

By the way, no one even came close to supplying the correct story. 'here it tis, Matey.

Before the way, darts had had to surmount a serious obstacle--that of legitimization under the law. This occurred in 1908, in what must be called a landmark decision in British jurisprudence. The case had everything but sex, and it didn't need that. What happened was that the law. in the form of the Leeds Magistrate's Court, took its first interest in darts since the Middle Ages, and that interest was not beneign. The unfortunate upon whom the law's attention fell was one "Foot" Anakin, a publican who possessed, among other distinctions, enormous feet. Foot was accused of presiding over a game of chance on his licensed premises, and hauled into court to answer for his sins. Foot, however, was a man of courage and principle and he had his answer ready. He requested the court's permission to show that darts, far from being a game of chance or luck, was a game of considerable skill, and that playing it for a drink or two in a public house was not gambling at all. The court told Foot to proceed.

Foot got to his feet and galumphed back to his pub, took down his dartboard and three darts, galumphed back, and set up the board in court. Then he stood back eight feet and fired three darts into the triple 20. The triple 20--three of them. Foot invited the learned and bewigged gentlemen of the court to take a crack at it. They declined, but the magistrate ordered a junior clerk to try. Stepping boldly to the hockey, the clerk pitched two darts quite past the board and into the woodwork, and the third a country mile from the 20. Foot stepped forward and tossed three double 20s. "Could you do that again, Mr. Anakin?" the magistrate asked. "Aye," said Foot, and threw three more double 20s--Foot was hot.

The magistrate pondered briefly and threw out the case. Every darts player since then has owned Foot Anakin a debt of gratitude, and it is a pity the man is not better known. Once, just before closing time in a dart pub, a toast was proposed to Foot but not a soul in the place knew his name.

Each group has a responsible job to do. Each must be able to rely on each other to perform the planning and execution of the tasks required to do the job.

I would be remiss in not mentioning some misgivings of the leadership groups such as the lack of establishing committees, appointing chairpersons and delegating the job load to volunteer members. The lack of volunteers, willing members, or procrastinating helpers result in the leadership group, mainly the president, doing the work. This uncalled workload can be eliminated by a well-developed volunteer group. Give your leadership group a fair shake.

You will be electing a new leadership group May 20, pledge your help and cooperation when assistance and volunteers are requested.
