VICTORY THROUGH GRACE

"For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God." Eph. 2:8.

As we see the "time of trouble" nearing let us not be of the "fearful" or the "unbelieving" ones but "stablish our hearts in the faith of the Lord Jesus," that we may have a closer walk with God.

His promises are sure, but they are only to the obedient, for we read, "If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love; even as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in His love." John 15:10.

David thus speaks of his fidelity to God—"Therefore I love thy commandments above gold, yea above fine gold." "Therefore I esteem all Thy precepts concerning all things to be right and I hate every false way." Ps. 119:127, 128.

Though His righteousness is imputed unto us through faith, it is wrought out in the life though obedience to His Word.

We are told to "Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life." Again we read, "Be not afraid nor dismayed by reason of this great multitude; for the battle is not your's but God's." II Chron. 20:15. We cannot use carnal weapons, "For the Egyptians shall help in vain, and to no purpose; therefore have I cried concerning this, "Their strength is to sit still," for "In returning and rest shall ye be saved; in quietness and in confidence shall be your strength." Isa. 30:7, 15. It may not always be to go forward, perhaps it is the time of waiting in the barracks. "Be still and know that I am God." Ps. 46:10. We need the strength of His abiding presence in quietness, and to hear anew His gracious promises, for without a personal victory in our own lives, we shall fail in our service for others.

Though we may have the love and sympathy of our friends, no human power can help us against the evil forces of darkness. We must meet our Gethsemane alone in the garden, if we would be like Him.

Have we made the consecration and received the cleansing, sanctifying power from the carnal nature, or the sin principle? Have we received the "Mind of Christ?" Are we "dying daily" to the self-life? The command is given, "Put on the whole armor of God that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil."

"For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places." Eph. 6:11, 12. Only one weapon of destruction is mentioned, the "Sword of the Spirit," which both killeth and maketh alive; "the Word of God." We may have been using the Sword very faithfully but it must have the annointing of the Holy Spirit to bless others.. Have we grieved the Holy Spirit and lost the "Oil of Gladness" from our lives?

Are we teaching for doctrines the commandments of men, or Christ and Him crucified? Is the heart covered by His righteousness, or do we seek to establish our own? Are we girded, made strong by the "Truth?" Are we carrying the Gospel Message of Peace, or bringing division, contention and strife?

Are we fully protected from fear or failure by the "Shield of Faith?" Do we know the power of His healing touch?

Then surely dear ones, "We are more than conquerors, through Him that loved us and gave Himself for us." Rom. 8:37.

Human strength and wisdom is inefficient. Christ has bruised the serpent's head and in Him only is victory over the enemy.

The Law is fulfilled in the Two commandments given by the Savior.

If we really love God we will earnestly seek to know and do His will, not seeking our own selfish desires, and will treat others as we would like them to treat us.

"For love shall cover the multitude of sins." But there is also a false friendship. "Faithful are the wounds of a friend." Prov. 27:6.

It may be possible for us to change the lives of others through prayer or personal influence; if this be true He will so direct, if we listen to the "Still small voice of the Spirit."

Fretting and worrying or personal abuse should have no place in the heart of God's children.

A great burden is lifted when we hear and heed the Master's voice, "What is that to thee, follow thou me," and again, "Fret not thyself because of evil-doers, neither be thou envious against the worker's of iniquity."

Why should we look on the enemy's side?

"Rest in the Lord and wait patiently for Him: fret not thyself because of Him who prospereth in his way, because of the man who bringeth wicked devices to pass."

"Cease from anger, and forsake wrath; fret not thyself in any wise to do evil."

"For evil-doers shall be cut off; but those that wait upon the Lord, they shall inherit the earth." Ps. 37, 7, 8, 9.

David tells us that the Lord will "order" our "steps," but we must "trust in Him" "delight in in Him" and "commit our way" unto Him, if we would have it said of us, "The law of his God is in his heart; none of his steps shall slide." "But the salvation of the righteous is of the Lord; He is their strength in time of trouble." Ps. 37-39.

Truly the arm of flesh is vain, as the house built upon the sand, but they that build upon the Rock, Christ Jesus, shall abide forever.

JOHN WESLEY ON DIVINE HEALING As recorded in his Diary.

Under 1738, May 19th. His brother Charles, who had second return of pleurisy, seemed to be seeking spiritual light and blessing. John hears that "he found rest to his soul, and his bodily strength returned from that hour."

1739, February 4th. Visited many sick, and among them J. W., who was in grievous pain of body and mind. Prayed with her and left her; but her pain was gone, her soul being in full peace, and her body also strengthened that she immediately arose and the next day went abroad.

1741, April 17th. Sick; voice and strength returned at once.

1741, May 10th. Sunday, pain in back and head, with fever; had to lie down most of day; only ease in one position. At night tried to preach; pain, and seized with cough, etc. There came to mind strongly "These signs shall follow them that believe." Prayed: "calling on Jesus aloud to increase my faith and to confirm the Word of His grace. While I was speaking my pain vanished away, the fever left me, my bodily strength returned and for many weeks I felt neither sickness nor pain. Unto Thee, O Lord, do I give thanks!"

1745, January 14th. On way to Bristol. "We earnestly desired to turn aside and call at the house of a poor man, William Shalwood. I found him and his wife sick in one bed, and with small hopes of recovery of either. Yet (after prayer) I believed they would not die, but live and declare the loving kindness of the Lord. The next time I called he was sitting below stairs, and his wife able to go abroad."

1746, November 12th. In evening, as coming from chapel, "teeth pained me much. Mr. Speer gave me an account of a rupture he had had for some years, which after the most eminent physicians had pronounced incurable was perfectly cured in a moment. I prayed with submission to the will of God. My pain ceased and returned no more.

1750, August 15th. After reading a book, comments: "The grand reason why the miraculous gifts were so soon withdrawn was not only that faith and holiness were well-nigh lost but that dry, formal, orthodox men began even then to ridicule gifts they had not themselves, and to decry them all as either madness or im-

posture."

1754, October 12th. Gives account of one healed by the Lord. He returned to the world after three years; now life despaired of.

1756, April 6th. Gives experience of one healed at once from badly sprained ankle.

1756, October 3rd. "My disorder returned more violently than ever." Preached at Snowfield and Spitsfiend. Finally a thought came into my mind: "Why do I not apply to God at the beginning, rather than at the end of an illness?" I did so, and found immediate relief, so that I needed no further medicines."

1762, October 19th. Prayed for James Oddie (preacher), pleuritic fever, healed that hour.

EXTRACT FROM THE LIFE OF WESLEY

"In one journey his horse became so exceedingly lame that it could scarcely set its feet to the ground. We ley could not discover what was amiss. He rode thus seven miles till he was thoroughly tired, and his head ached more than it had done for months. He says, "What I here aver is the naked fact. Let every man account for it as he deems good. I then thought, "Cannot God heal man or beast by any means, or without any? Immediately my weariness and headache ceased, and my horse's lameness in the same instant. Nor did he halt any more that day or the next. A very odd accident this also!"
