JUST AS GOD NEVER GIVES UP ON US, WE SHOULD NEVER GIVE UP ON GOD

In 1995 Lena Paahlsson lost her wedding ring. The woman who lives with her family on a farm in Sweden had designed the ring herself, a white-gold band, set with seven small diamonds. She had taken the ring off to do some baking, but it disappeared from the work surface where she had left it.

The family searched everywhere, and years later even took up the tiling on the kitchen floor during renovations, in hope of finding the ring.

Then one day in 2013 when Lena was pulling up carrots in her garden, she noticed a carrot with a hard object fastened tightly around it. It was her ring. It was on a carrot so small she had been about to throw it

"The carrot was sprouting in the middle of the ring. It is guite incredible," her husband said.

The couple believes the ring fell into a sink back in 1995 and was lost in vegetable peelings that were turned into compost or fed to their sheep.

"I had given up hope," Lens said. "I thought I would never find it again."

KEEP ON HOPING

It's easy to imagine the relief, the excitement in the Paahlsson household when the lost ring was found. It's easy for us to identify with Lena Paahlsson. We all lose things. We misplace things. Stuff goes missing. We search, we might even pray to St Anthony. Most of the time we are lucky. We find our wallet, or the car keys, or the piece of jewellery. But other times we are not. We search and we search, and the lost object is never found. We lose all hope of finding it. We give up.

We can lose non-material things, too. A relationship that has come apart, a career or job or home we have

had to give up or that was taken from us; a loved one lost to dementia or Alzheimer's disease; a family member we have lost track of; a soul mate who has gone to the grave. Losses like these are harder to cope with because they are final. Reunion is impossible this side of eternal life.

And there is another kind of loss – the loss of trust in the church, the loss of faith in God. Giving up on the church might be understandable. The revelations of abuse and misuse of power by priests and religious have been scandalising. The church lost respect; it deserved to. But losing faith in God is more serious, because while the church can let us down, God never lets us down, and we will need God for help and hope when the difficult times come.

IMAGE OF GOD

oday's Gospel reminds us that God never lets us down, never gives up on us, never wants to lose us. We may lose faith in God but God never loses faith in us.

Often, the focus of this Gospel is on the son – how he lost his way and then comes to his senses and returns home. But the story is really about the father, the parent, who longs for the lost to return, who spends every day waiting for the lost to return, and who then rejoices when the lost finally comes home.

It tells us that ours is a God who hates seeing anyone lost, who longs for the return of all who go astray, who never gives up on anyone. Even when we throw in the towel, God doesn't throw in the towel on us. When our faith crumbles, God is there for us; when our relationships flounder or life goes belly up, God is there for us; when all seems bleak and we don't know where to turn, God is there for us – always there for us.

Like Lena Paahlsson, like the prodigal father, God never, ever quits. Neither must we.

Today's readings

The story of the Lost Son is the best known parable from the Gospel of Luke. Its meaning is so obvious and it requires little explanation. It is the final in a series of three parables about things lost and found — a lost sheep, a lost coin and most importantly of all, a lost child. Today's reading preserves the introduction to the whole chapter, but omits the shorter parables. Jesus told these parables because

the professionally religious people of his time, especially the scribes and the Pharisees, were aghast that a man, who claimed to be speaking in God's name, was welcoming all sorts of people without demanding that they first perform the religious rites needed to bring them back into good standing in the community.
