"Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord." Luke 2:10-11 KJV

hose were the words of the angel to the shepherds. It was Good News that Jesus was born. As we know, the shepherds went and saw the baby Jesus, and "they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child" (Luke 2:17 KJV). They were happy. They were thrilled.

But the shepherds were not all that excited when the angel first appeared to them. Luke tells us about the angels appearing to the shepherds:

And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. Luke 2:9 KJV

Of course they were afraid! It was a normal night when, all of a sudden, an angel appeared. And what did the angel say? "Fear

not!" Do not be afraid!

"Fear not" is a familiar phrase in the Christmas story. The angel says this to Zechariah before telling him the good news that he and Elizabeth would have a son, the forerunner to the Messiah. Mary heard "fear not" before she learned the good news that she was to be the mother of Jesus. Even Joseph was told by the angel to "fear not" and take Mary as his wife.

We should also not be afraid. We should believe the words of the angel. Fear not! Have faith!

Fear, however, is a reality. People live in fear. People fear because of their failing health or that of a loved one. They fear financial stresses, job loss and concerns about raising their children or taking care of their parents. Many react by not eating, losing sleep or taking it out on those around them.

Rev. Dr. R. Reed Lessing wrote a book titled *Overcoming Life's Sorrows* (CPH). It is about the prophet Jeremiah and what we can learn from him. The answer to overcoming fear, according to Dr. Lessing? "What do we do when things look like a total loss? Renounce fear (False Evidence Appearing Real) and embrace faith. Faith? (Forsaking All I Take Him.) Him? That would be Jesus, whose perfect love casts out fear (1 John 4:18)" (p. 264).

We hold on to passages that we have learned and possibly memorized.

And we know that for those who love God all things work together for

We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our bodies. 2 Cor. 4:8-10
