The troop endured rainy weather conditions with temperatures in the 50s as high-end automobiles, mini-vans, and buses made their best attempts to park in the horse pastures in order to watch brave jockey's race their horses on to victory.

Many first-time and many long-time scouts from the troop turned out to help with directing cars into the correct parking areas. Four-wheel drive vehicles were the most successful in getting to their preferred parking spaces. School buses, catering trucks, and minivans struggled and sometimes got fantastically stuck in several inches of mud. Caterers and guests ended up moving some of their supplies on foot or by golf cart from less ideal parking spaces once they realized that the mud had won.

Troop 78 Scouts built muscles and good will with pushing cars out of the mud, selling programs, directing cars with bright orange flags, and splashing in the mud to add some extra excitement.

Despite the challenging weather conditions, many owners still raced their horses. The rider's and horse's stamina were matched by Troop 78 scouts, family members, and friends who turned out to support the race which raised funds to conserve open space in Chester County.

Mr. Schallack volunteered to drive the large tractor and help pull cars out of their muddy predicaments. Even the tow truck needed a tow out of the mud at one point after getting stuck! Many of the patrons at the event rolled down their windows or waved to thank the troop for their service.

On the Sunday after the race, Troop 78 cleaned up the grounds to ensure that horses would not be eating water bottles, cell phones, and left-behind food.

All participants slept very well at night having done a good deed for our community which helped to continue the tradition of 28 years of serving the Brandywine Conservancy.

Update Youth Protection Training (YPT)

All Adult Leaders Need to Update Youth Protection Training Deadline September 30, 2018

The BSA has recently introduced newly updated youth protection training that is **required for all registered adults** and volunteers by September 30th, 2018. Anyone who took the old training prior to the February 2018 rollout is required to be re-certified again.

The updated training includes three modules and a test that takes a little over an hour to complete. Once completed, this training will cover Chester County Council volunteers through the end of 2019.

To get started, go to http://my.scouting.org and sign in using your Username and Password. Click on the 'Begins with Youth Protection' symbol or click on 'Menu' in upper left corner and select 'My Dashboard'. I recommend you read the 'How to Guide for Taking Youth Protection Training' PDF for detailed instructions. There seems to be a delay between 'Add Plan' and the 'Launch Course' button appearing. Based on my experience with the new training you should plan on at least 90 minutes to complete the training.

The goal of the evening's program was to lead the scouts in a discussion which would cover the nature requirements from Scout to First Class. The scouts need to identify poisonous plants, native plants and invasive plants and animals.

Ranger Gary walked the group around the park and led an active discussion of the surrounding plants and animals. At one point he asked the group to stop and be as silent as possible (pretty difficult for this group). Then he identified 5 different birds just by listening to their calls/song.

We finished up with a display of feathers and plaster casts of foot / paw prints he has gathered over the years. Then we loaded everybody back on the bus for the ride back to the cabin and we had a snack along the way.

We did it all in the usual Troop meeting time slot! We would like to try to do a few of these Field Trip Troop Meetings a year. So we are looking for ideas for the next field trip in the fall. Please let us know if you have an idea for a field trip we could do from 7 - 9PM on a Friday night. Troop 78 Builds New Tent Platforms for Dan Beard

Tent Platform Update

Over the last two weeks the platform project for the Dan Beard Camp Site became a reality. Because of the generosity of those who chipped in for the fundraising part of this well needed endeavor, we were able to raise the exact amount needed to purchase the lumber. After a 13% discount by Home Depot and our tax-free status, this nicely covered our costs which were \$6300 and change.

Our building began with the creation of some jigs and fixtures to speed up and simplify the lumber cutting operation. We needed 830 pieces cut to a required size. This turned out to be a back-breaking operation. Next was the assembling and nailing together of 7 pieces of 2X4s and decking them with 9 pieces of pressure-treated planking. This was accomplished using nail guns and over 7000 nails. The team worked 3 days on this part of the operation.

Fifty-two half platforms slid out the door of our bus barn resulting in 4 stacks of 13 platforms. Each platform weighed more than 100 pounds and proved to be the most strenuous part of the build.

The delivery team, aided by Mark Siegle, his forklift loader and his two trailers, made short work of getting the platforms to Camp Horseshoe. Miles Stevens furnished the second truck to pull the second trailer. The platforms are spread around the Dan Beard campsite and are awaiting final assembly on the June Order of the Arrow weekend, June 8 - June 10.

Thank you to the 11 members of Troop 78's A team who put in the many hours of hard work resulting in 26 magnificent new tent platforms for our campsite this summer!
