# **Advent Candle Lighting**

- 1 Light one candle to watch for Messiah: let the light banish darkness. He shall bring salvation to Israel, God fulfills the promise.
- 2 Light two candles to watch for Messiah: let the light banish darkness. He shall feed the flock like a shepherd, gently lead them homeward.

## **Prayer of the Day**

Stir up our hearts, Lord God, to prepare the way of your only Son. By his coming strengthen us to serve you with purified lives; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.** 

#### First Reading: Isaiah 40:1-11

In grand, flowing, poetic lines, the prophet announces that the exile of God's people in Babylon is over. God will deliver Israel and will care for her as a shepherd cares for the sheep. This word can be trusted, because the only enduring reality in life is the word of God.

<sup>1</sup>Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God.

<sup>2</sup>Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the LORD's hand double for all her sins.

<sup>3</sup>A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD, make straight in the desert a highway for our God.

<sup>4</sup>Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain.

<sup>5</sup>Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken."

<sup>6</sup>A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field.

<sup>7</sup>The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the LORD blows upon it; surely the people are grass. <sup>8</sup>The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever.

<sup>9</sup>Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!"

<sup>10</sup>See, the Lord GoD comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him.

<sup>11</sup>He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

# Psalm 85:1-2, 8-13

<sup>1</sup>You have been gracious to your land, O LORD; you have restored the good fortune of Jacob.

<sup>2</sup>You have forgiven the iniquity of your people and blotted out all their sins.

<sup>8</sup>I will listen to what the LORD God is saying; for you speak peace to your faithful people and to those who turn their hearts to you.

<sup>9</sup>Truly, your salvation is very near to those who fear you, that your glory may dwell in our land.

<sup>10</sup>Steadfast love and faithfulness have met together; righteousness and peace have kissed each other.

<sup>11</sup>Faithfulness shall spring up from the earth, and righteousness shall look down from heaven.

<sup>12</sup>The LORD will indeed grant prosperity, and our land will yield its increase.

<sup>13</sup>Righteousness shall go before the LORD and shall prepare for God a pathway.

#### Second Reading: 2 Peter 3:8-15a

This short letter deals with pressing concerns regarding the final advent of Jesus, especially concerns that could arise over its apparent delay. The author of the letter calls on Christians to anticipate the promised coming of the Lord through conduct dedicated to God.

<sup>8</sup>Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. <sup>9</sup>The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. <sup>10</sup>But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed. <sup>11</sup>Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be in leading lives of holiness and godliness, <sup>12</sup>waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? <sup>13</sup>But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home. <sup>14</sup>Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish; <sup>15a</sup>and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation.

#### The Holy Gospel according to Mark 1:1-8 Glory to you O Lord

The Gospel of Mark does not begin with a story of Jesus' birth but with the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord.

<sup>1</sup>The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

<sup>2</sup>As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way;

<sup>3</sup>the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,'"

<sup>4</sup>John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

<sup>5</sup>And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

<sup>6</sup>Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey.

<sup>7</sup>He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals.

<sup>8</sup>I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

The word of the Lord...... Praise to you O Christ

#### Sermon

There is no nativity or birth announcement in the book of Mark. No angels, no Holy Family, no baby in swaddling clothes. Mark is in a hurry for us to know and understand who Jesus is. Instead of Bethlehem story, Mark introduces John the Baptist to make the introduction of who Jesus is. His appearance is reminiscent of Elijah. Mark quotes the prophetic writing of Isaiah 40: "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'"

Isaiah 40 is a very important writing. Isaiah speaks of the Babylonian Exile in which Jerusalem us destroyed and the people have lost their security because of sin. It is a perfect sermon. Isaiah begins with the words "Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God." Isaiah reflects the "crying out in pain" of God's people. <sup>6</sup>A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. <sup>7</sup>The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the LORD blows upon it; surely the people are grass. <sup>8</sup>The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever." This text is often spoken at funerals. It is a lament. We lament when we feel withered and faded and fragile especially during this time of the pandemic. Isaiah knows how the Babylonians felt. We also have those feelings today as we face our insecurities. Many people in our nation and the world are facing poverty, despair, possibly being evicted from their homes and nervous about the future due to this pandemic.

The most important words in Isaiah and echoed in Mark are: See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'" This is the hope in Jesus coming to baptize us with the Holy Spirit.

John the Baptist like Isaiah was also a model preacher. He preached law, calling for repentance, and gospel, pointing to Christ. What was most important about John was his message. He did not ask others to live in the unusual lifestyle that he chose; he preached the coming Christ. John knew that he was not worthy even to untie the thong of Christ's sandals—and yet he also knew that his calling was to be the messenger, sent to preach Christ and thereby prepare the way.

John's choice of location may seem odd. You might think he would go to the city where there is a larger population and yet he appeared in the wilderness. The wilderness may sound scary to us today but in the time of John, the wilderness was an uplifting place of the spirit and strengthening of religious life. In the wilderness, John drew them to confession and to baptism. His message was inspiring yet he always realized "the one who is more powerful than I is

coming after me." The announcement of that coming one had a power that overcame many obstacles, that drew people out of their comfort zones into a new place, and that created a movement thought impossible. Do we hear those words of comfort today? We need the comfort of these scriptures today.

Isaiah gives us good news in verse 11 "He will feed his flock like a shepherd, he will gather the lambs in his arms. He will "carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep. He will "carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep." The God announced by Isaiah is both powerful and gentle, able to comfort as well as defend. This God is a shepherd.

Usually this time of year the Sunday school is preparing their pageant and the worship team is preparing to highlight the Bethlehem nativity story also. Mark doesn't think it's a necessary story to know who Jesus is. Because we are not having the traditional story this year, Mark can remind us that God uses many people like John, to pave the way to bring Jesus into our minds and hearts. The grass, the field and the flowers will bloom again.

In these texts, we hear and see the value of those who pave the way – the way to Jesus and the way to liberation in this present life. This is the gospel of comfort and joy according to Isaiah and Mark. Amen.

## **Prayers of Intercession**

Tender God, you know sorrow and joy alike. We pray for those in our families and congregation who are not joyful in this holiday season. Comfort those who grieve, be a companion to all who are lonely, tend those who are sick or struggling with depression, and gather all people in your healing embrace. Be with all in need of healing especially Karla Gipe and Brad Shippert. We pray for the families suffering with the coronavirus and we pray for an end to the virus with safe vaccinations and treatments. We pray for those in care facilities: Sibyl, Barb, Tammy, Trudy, Jessica, Hazel, Jeanne and Linda. We pray for those in military service: Logan, JJ, Bryan, Dustin, Brad and Travis).

Hear us, O God. Your mercy is great.

Eternal God, we give thanks for the saints who have prepared your way in the wilderness and taught us to continue their faithful work. Make their generous lives an example for all.

Hear us, O God. Your mercy is great.

Draw near to us, O God, and receive our prayers for the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**
