- The only acceptable accountability would be an indictment, and probably a conviction.
- Accountability wasn't achieved, according to Bouie.
- Our society doesn't give dignity and respect to people like Michael Brown.
- If there is no conviction, self-flagellation by Wilson would be required! (I made that up!)



I emphatically add:

- Officer Wilson's actions during this event were extensively examined by the Grand Jury.
- Wilson offered (unrequired) testimony to the Grand Jury.
- This investigation easily fits the definition of "holding someone accountable."

Regarding Michael Brown:

• He was an unarmed black teenager shot by a white policeman.

That's where most reports stop! I must add:

- Immediately before his death, Brown robbed a convenience store.
- After the officer recognized and confronted him, Brown attempted to take the officer's pistol.
- This resulted in two close-range shots inside the police cruiser.
- Brown ran away and then, burdened by the judgment impairing affects of marijuana, charged Wilson aggressively, thereby provoking the fatal shot.

In spite of the complete review of witnesses and evidence, many claim there still hasn't been accountability regarding Officer Wilson.
