Hello TAIA members:

It's been a fast and furious time this first quarter of 2014. WATER is the topic on top of every group's list, and it is prime time for associations such as TAIA to make a difference in the state of Texas. Through the offering of four scholarships, we can make a difference with Texas leadership in the future. The scholarship that is to be awarded this spring has had over 70 applicants. Good luck to the scholarship committee.

Two billion dollars has been set aside out of the Texas rainy-day fund to conserve and find new sources of water for the state. States, counties, municipalities, and even individuals are stretching to stay friends with each other in the fight for water rights. Most cities, towns, and farms have reduced their consumption by 30% or more in the last four years. Appliance manufacturers are offering appliances that use less water to do the same tasks. Individuals have either installed equipment, or are looking to install equipment, to capture rainwater to water trees and shrubs. Others are changing their landscaping to low, or no, water consumption. Farmers are working with scientists, labs, and research facilities to use less water in order to raise the same produce that has required more water in the past. Many cities are recycling waste-water and desalinating water from the ocean. Irrigation equipment manufacturers constantly redesign new and more conservative ways to apply water to crops. Agronomists design greater drought-tolerant seeds and plants. I can go on and on and on.

The point I'm trying to make is that people from every walk need water, and we are getting low. Yes, we have begun to do something about it, but why has it taken so long to get started? DSI - Precision Agricultural Irrigation is Here to Stay!

With aspirations to be a crop duster, DSI owner, Rusty Houston, spent his summers working for his uncle in the agricultural business. In 1994 he went to Arizona to work for a local company installing drip irrigation systems. After seeing the importance of water management and the benefits of increased crop production he returned to the Texas High Plains and started DSI,

installing about 800 acres of sub-surface drip in the first year.

Since then the company has continued to grow, designing and installing about 5,000 acres per year with a current total of approximately 90,000 acres. DSI provides a full range of services from design and installation to management and service for the producer. Using the principles of precision agriculture, installations are designed using GPS coordinates to meet the maximum uniformity and required application rate needed to meet peak performance. Using state of the art controllers, the systems can





be monitored and managed remotely via computer, iPad, or iPhone.

The company has expanded from its principal location on the Slaton Highway in Lubbock, TX to Littlefield and Dimmit in Texas, as well as Minden, NE. All four of these locations provide a fully stocked service center for drip irrigation in their respective areas. The success of the business is

based not only on providing a quality product but also establishing a long term relationship with clients. This has resulted in tripling in size the last four years and becoming the second largest drip irrigation dealer in the area. For those do-it-yourself growers a self-install package is also available.

Rusty has been a member of TAIA for many years. He served as Secretary-Treasurer in 2003, but then had to refrain from moving up through the chain of officers because of time constraints, but still maintains active membership. He served on the Scholarship Selection Committee in 2013. Rusty states his fellow TAIA members have provided him with much appreciated help and support over the years. TAIA commends Rusty and DSI for their contributions to improving irri-

gated agriculture.
