### Patriot Biography: My Ancestor George Brokaw by John Thorne

#### George Brokaw, my Revolutionary War Ancestor

George Brokaw, Sr. was born 29 Mar 1755 at Somerset Co., NJ. He was baptized 27 Apr 1777 at the New Brunswick Dutch Church, NJ. He died 27 Jun 1842 at New Athens, Harrison Co., OH and is buried at Crabapple Cemetery, Wheeling Twp., Belmont Co., OH. He married 10 Jun 1777 at Sussex Co., NJ., Janetje "Jane" Custard, the daughter of William Custard and Sarah Swartwout.

"In Memory of George Brokaw, 1755-1842, great grandson of Bourgone Broucard: 1645 Huguenot migration arrived New York 1675. Soldier in the Revolutionary War from New Jersey. This memorial erected 1955 on his 200th anniversary in Recognition of a Rich Heritage."

George Brokaw was a Pvt. in Capt. Peter Vroom's Co., Col. Abraham Quick's Regt., 2nd Bln. Somerset Co., NJ Militia. His record is summarized as that he "lived in Sussex Cty., NJ at enlistment and later

moved to Somerset Cty., NJ and enlisted there and had been born there 29 Mar 1755. After the war soldier moved back to Sussex Cty, NJ for 7 years then to Beavertown in Fayette Cty., PA for 5 years, then to Washington Cty., PA for 3 years, then to Jefferson Cty., OH for 6 years, then to Harrison Cty., OH. He died 10 Aug 1842 leaving a wife Jane who died 8 Sep 1850 leaving children." George Brokaw received a pension of \$26.67 per year, #R1232, for his military service. On 13 Oct 1832 he was living at Harrison Co., OH when he made his pension affidavit in which he states that he "enlisted Nov. 19, 1776, that he served five months in "the Flying Camp" under First Lieut. Rosegrant, in Capt. Chambers' Co., Col. Ephraim Martin's Regt., and that he marched from Sussex County, NJ, to New York City. On arriving at the Hudson River the British man-of-war Asa (Asia) was seen sailing up the river; the troops fired on it, whereupon one of its cannon burst and killed seven men. The company went to Long Island, to New York City, to Fort Washington, and to White Plains. He then crossed the North River to Fort Lee, NJ, and from there he was marched under George Washington "to a large field" and left in Col. Martin's Regt., which encountered the British Light Horse in a marsh. The regiment then "wheeled and rejoined the main army under Washington" who marched them to Elizabethtown, NJ."

Suon to and interitied in open court the day & years expression Tingly block of George Brokan

Records of the U. S. War Department show that he served as Private in Capt. Peter D. Vroom's Co., Col. Abraham Quick's Regt. of Somerset Co., NJ. He was discharged in the spring of 1777 at New Brunswick, N. J., but was drafted again in December of that year and served for one month at Woodbridge, NJ, under Lieut. Henry Hoover. Later, in 1781, he was again drafted for a fortnight. The New Jersey records state that he enlisted in 1776, aged twenty years, as a Private in Capt. Abraham Shimer's Co., Col Ephraim Martin's Regt. of State Troops, for five

months and that he was a participant in the Battle of Long Island Aug. 27, 1776.

George Brokaw received a land grant in Jefferson Co., OH on 12 Oct 1808. He appears on the 1810 tax list of Cadiz Twp., Jefferson Co., OH. In 1814 he was listed on the voting poll records of Cadiz Twp. 1, Harrison Co., OH. He appears in the 1820 census, Cadiz Twp., Harrison Co., OH. He appears on the 1830 and 1840 census records at Flushing Twp., Belmont Co., OH.

**Jane Custard** was born 1 May 1752 at Walpack, Sussex Co., NJ. She died 7 Oct 1850 at New Athens, Harrison Co., OH and is buried at Crabapple Cemetery, Wheeling Twp., Belmont Co., OH next to her husband. A verse on her gravestone states:


"Soon shall I pass the gloomy vale, Soon all my mortal powers must fail, O may my departing breath, His loving kindness sing in death"

### "Jane, wife of George, died Oct 7, 1850, 98 yr 2 mo 6 da. He was a Revolutioner"

There are many DAR and SAR approved applications based on Revolutionary War soldier George Brokaw; he had a large progeny including two members of the SAR Prescott Chapter, and also Tom Brokaw, the newscaster.

President Wayne Hood called the meeting to order with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Jim Cates led the Pledge to the Sons of the American Revolution. Tim Prater offered the invocation.

VP Jim Cates asked that we go over our dates for next year. Meetings will be the 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday of each month except August (no meeting) and December, the 1<sup>st</sup> Saturday. Appears that the Rodeo/4<sup>th</sup> July Parade could be Saturday July 6<sup>th</sup>. If so, some could have a conflict with the National Meeting/Congress. He added that Dec Birthdays will be recognized at the luncheon. We also decided that in the future, Board members birthdays will be recognized at the Board Meetings with no cards prepared for them. General George Washington Crosses the Delaware on Christmas eve 1776 and captures Trenton NJ
