BY LAWS OF THE APOSTOLIC FAITH BIBLE COLLEGE, INC.

Article VII Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed


that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic

Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- * Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- * Creation and Formation
- * Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation
- * Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life
- * Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul, and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ
- * Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.
- * Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit
- * Sacrament of the Lord's Supper
- * Washing of feet
- * Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers
- * Do not condone divorce and remarriage
- * Destruction of the wicked
- * Conditional Immortality
- * Rapture of the Man Child Class
- * Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly
- * A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above listed basic doctrines.

Time To Clean House

I'm becoming increasingly convinced that I need to follow the truth of the admonition of David when he said in Psalm 34 " I will bless the Lord at all times, His praise shall continually be in my mouth." For one thing, to bless the Lord means to speak well of Him, I sometimes wonder how well I do in speaking to others about Him. I don't mean just verbally. I mean with my actions (which I have heard 'speak' louder than words anyway.) Do I praise Him continually, which of course includes but is not limited to singing and raising

our voices or hands in 'worship'? How do I praise Him? How do I exalt His name?

I've thought much on this. It should be our highest desire to please Him. Are the words of our mouth and the meditation of our heart acceptable unto Him? Are we doing what's right because of our motive to find approval of Him? Jesus said that He did always the things that please God? The Word says that Jesus learned obedience by the things which He suffered. It would seem that God places a great deal of emphasis on obedience. We all know this (however this doesn't mean we always do it though). So is there a connection with obedience and praise?

Let's consider the popular verse that we enjoy hearing the promise of in II Chronicles 7:14 is that He will heal our land, yet look at the conditions for Him doing so. If those people... will humble themselves....and turn...(although this word has many different definitions, the one I thought most interesting was to slide back!) Look what they were to 'slide back' from, not to-their wicked ways. Then He will do as He said, but not until. Can it be that a turning from; a forsaking (abandonment) of sin is something that we've forsaken? Is this part of the reason we pray and sing our songs and go to church and read our Bibles but still lack such power a should be employed by the believer in God-still fail to 'see' His workings?

Why are we so reluctant to forsake sin? Could it be that we enjoy it? No, that wouldn't be it. Have we-have I become insensitive to sin? Does the thought of displeasing God bother us, bother me less and less as iniquity abounds? Are we repulsed? Disgusted? Offended by sin as much as we preach God is? Do we abstain from the very appearance of evil? Maybe that's the problem. Sin doesn't appear as sinful as it once did. Maybe we enjoy flirting with it, thinking we can take fire into our bosoms without getting burned?

Now as we examine II Chronicles there are three things that need to be noted. First is the direction of the Priests and Levites were given to sanctify themselves. Secondly they were to sanctify the house of the Lord and thirdly (and this is the one we want to consecrate on) is the phrase in verse 5..."and carry forth (to come out of) the filthiness (among other definite ns are impurity, immorality, idolatry) out of the Holy Place. The first two could be discussed at length as separate issue but all these tie into one another. Verse 6 & 7 explain why what they had done to 'earn' the result of verses 8 & 9. They have the Word declares trespassed (acted unfaithfully) and done evil and forsaken (to leave, depart. Abandon) God. Those who supposed to be God's chosen had turned their faces from Him-the One who was to be their habitation(Psalm 91:9). They had abandon Him and because of that the wrath of the Lord was upon Judah and Jerusalem. The Lord delivered them to trouble (maltreatment, agitation), astonishment (ruin, desolation) and to hissing(I like the first four words of Verse 9, "then the Levites arose (remember He is speaking to this group in verse 5). Now this is the action—the consecration in reality that we teach. Verse 16. the Priests went into the inner part of the house of the Lord, to cleanse it and brought out all the uncleanness (defilement) that they found in the temple.... And the Levites took it to carry it out. Simple. Direct. The foreign objects things that should not have been in the temple, the trash and the stuff that was in a place that was supposed to be used for a place of worship.

Now in John 3 Jesus had gone to the feast and finds in the temple (sound familiar?) those things that displeased His Father; those things that weren't conducive to the true purpose of Hid Father's house (that it should be called a house of prayer)/ Verse 15 says that "He drove them all out (carry forth the filthiness) and said take these things hence. Jesus detested the abuse-the irreverence of what He had found (to discern, get knowledge of).

Of course we know from scriptures that He knows what is in the heart of man; that His 'find' in the temple wasn't anything He didn't know about. Yet His driving out of those things that didn't belong was a visual aid to four groups; His disciples (they remembered Psalm 69), the money changers, the rulers and priests of the temple and the ones that had come to truly worship God.

Now, the lesson should be obvious. We as believers in Jesus the Son of man and God are to be a dedication-consecrated "house". I know that as such, He expects and demands that we (yes, we) be involved in the cleaning process. II Corinthians 7:1 has the incredible versus that says we ought to cleanse ourselves from all (guess what-filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfection holiness in the fear of God.


Time to Clean House-con't

What a great passage! Remember in Chronicles it said they found uncleanness when they went in. Does this mean they were unaware of it but with a renewed commitment to God, did actually find things that were wrong? Or does it mean that they knew about the uncleanness but just decided to 'Let it lay' because it's a hard job to clean something up?

What would Jesus 'Find' in our lives that shouldn't be there? Perhaps we could ask what would He discover to us—make us aware of it—if we weren't so calloused and open to conviction. What have we not seen or is it that maybe we just don't want to see? And after we 'find' the filthiness, are we willing to bring it out? Is our house His house—s place where we say that He can reign supreme in but still have our 'stuff' in the way? Are we willing to surrender it all? God, help us to clean house.

Who Will Pick Up MY Sword?

Through the years, generations take on special characteristics. In our family, the legacy of ministry has come full circle. My

father, the late Jacob C. Regier, was born prematurely in 1913 and was set aside to die. His Godly mother knew in her heart, he would live. She also believed he was destined for God's service. Her faith and tender care brought him to maturity.

My father was called into ministry at a young age. He was apprehensive to tell his mother about God's call. She had known since his infancy that he was to be a minister. He was relieved to learn she had been waiting and praying for his declaration of service since his birth,

More than a half century of ministry, my father died from a fall on the ice. The poem, Who Will Take Up My Sword, written so expressively for my dad, was presented at his memorial service. His nephew, Fred Huff, artfully penned words declaring my dad's faithfulness in carrying God's sword. Now, the question was presented. Who Will Take Up My Sword?

The importance of living for God had been implanted in my heart from the beginning. The day I was born in the back seat of the family Ford sedan, I'm certain my parents dedicated me to God's service. God has always called me to be a witness. As a student at the Apostolic Faith Bible College in Baxter Springs, Kansas, I laid out a fleece to God. If asked to present a devotional at morning chapel, I would know God was calling me into ministry. The opportunity never came. Consequently, my fleece was answered. However, I was ordained as a gospel worker.

College, family and a teaching career was in my future. Along the route, God called me to numerous positions of Christian leadership. Although I've served in many capacities, I never felt the need to be ordained into the ministry. Shortly after retiring from an art and English teaching career, a call came from out of the blue. Steve Arnall, Midwest Youth Camp Director, invited me to be the evening speaker. My quick first response was, "I can't do that, I'm not a preacher." Before we finished our initial conversation, God began preparing my heart for a very blessed time at camp.

Still, no thought of ordination crossed my mind until cousin Saundra Huff said, "Joye, you need to be ordained." Again, my response mirrored the one I gave Steve Arnall. "I'm not a preacher."

That camp experience created a fire storm in my spiritual life. God has given me many opportunities to minister all over the country especially to women's weekend retreats. My art background has proven beneficial as I often illustrate my presentations as I speak. Devotionals for the Singing Women of Texas provide excellent times to witness. It is my pleasure to paint a two-and-half-minute watercolor picture to illustrate one of our spiritual choral selections. Still, no thought of ordination. But God had been preparing me to be ordained for some time although I didn't recognize the call.

Over the years, I had numerous invitations to become a hospice volunteer. Our family had been through so much sorrow in losing loved ones, hospice volunteerism seemed to be an aspiration to ponder for another day. But, eventually.

the appropriate became apparent, and I joined as a hospice volunteer. I quickly found joy and personal reward in serving patients and their families in final stages of life.

Enter God's clear voice saying, "You are called to be a volunteer hospice chaplain." All the many years of God's service flashed across my mind. I had been carrying God's sword since childhood. With God's help, Hospice chaplaincy would sharpen my sword.

The hospice chaplaincy title requires one to be a counselor or an ordained minister. God's timing is always perfect. My desire to become a hospice chaplain was the divine motivation to be ordained into ministry.



We had a blessed and fruitful spring and summer holding revivals and helping in Youth Camps. That fall at AFBC was an incredible time of absorbing the Word and growing in my relationship with the Holy Spirit.

I decided to go back to college at WTSU and found my niche as the student center minister, working with many wonderful Christian students and sharing Christ on campus. During this time I discovered the love of my life, Charlene Spicer, who consented to be my lifelong partner in the summer of 1970. I'm sure she had no idea what that would mean, or she would have said "no way". That fall Ted Barker asked us to come be on staff at AFBC. I taught music theory and Charlene tried to keep Ted organized in the office.

In the spring, with both of us having 1 1/2 years left of college, we went back to WTSU where we worked in the student center, traveled with the choir and enjoyed making memories and life-long friendships. We graduated together in 1972, not knowing where the Lord would take us next.

We soon received an invitation to move to Wichita, KS to be the Youth Pastor for Charlene's home church, Faith Chapel. This was a new and exciting ministry opportunity and I enjoyed working alongside a senior pastor. Our son, Chris, was born and it was a wonderful time of growing in my faith and feeling used of God.

However, I felt an overwhelming desire to go back to graduate school to get a Master's degree, which would allow me to teach college approved Bible classes at WTSU. I chose Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and we arrived there for the spring semester of 1974, not knowing anyone in the area except some good friends of my parents, Alan "Shorty" Broyles and his wife Pauline (Clanton). They invited us to attend a Nazarene church with them and we soon fell in love with the people and the church. I was asked to be their music minister and we certainly made some more life-ling friends. I transferred after a year there to Bethany Nazarene College. While there we worked with Barry Methvin in his church and celebrated the birth of our daughter, Shannon.

My intention was to finish my degree there, but in the summer of 1976 we received a call to become the pastor of our church in Pampa, TX. After much prayer seeking the Lord's will, we decided to make the move. We were there for 3 years and I learned so much about myself and about "shepherding a flock". God used that time to teach me so many valuable lessons and took me all through the highs and lows of a pastor experiences. I wouldn't trade the time for anything, but I also learned that pastoring was definitely not my calling. One of the many bright spots, was the birth of our daughter, Mindy Brooke.

While seeking to know God's direction and will for me, I received an invitation from Edwin Modrick to move to Amarillo, TX and help in establishing a brand new church. I soon was working a full time job and enjoyed watching a beginner church grow through the efforts of some very dedicated Christian friends, Unexpectedly, my job transferred us to Fort Worth, and we became reunited with the Nazarene church there. Working with the music and youth there I began seeking God for His will for me back into full time ministry. I was transferred again to Houston, and we decided to live in my home town, Katy, and work with Jim and LaMoyne Fox. Once again we were blessed to serve alongside a dedicated and Spirit filled pastor.


Then, out of the blue, I received a call from our Nazarene pastor, asking me if I would consider becoming the Camp Administrator of Camp Arrowhood, a 60 acre, 350 bed Nazarene camp on the banks of the Brazos River in Glen Rose, TX. This seemed to be too large of a "leap of faith", but God knew my heart and my desire to be in full time ministry. We moved there in 1984 and cannot begin to tell all the ways our lives were enriched and blessed. Our children grew up there and learned the meaning of working hard, serving others and relying on God for strength and commitment. While at the camp we watched a production called The Promise come together. It's a live musical-drama of the life of Christ portrayed in a large outdoor amphitheater and we were privileged to be in the cast in 1993. In the fall of 1994 we went with the cast and crew to Moscow, Russia and had the life changing experience of performing in the Kremlin State Palace. We have continued being a part of the cast for 15 seasons. We consider our involvement in it to be one of God's "surprises of joy" that He loves to pour out on His children, We were at the camp until 1996 and stayed in the area until Mindy graduated from high school.

Since then, we have moved to the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex area where Charlene has taught school and I work. We have been serving in a Baptist church for the last 18 years, where we both sing in the choir and often get opportunities to sing duets. We also teach Sunday School and volunteer in several other area of the church. Our 3 children, wonderful daughter in law, and 3 beautiful grandkids all know Christ as their Savior. The past 50 years of our journey with God has been both exciting and challenging, but through it all, God has been good, and God has been faithful, and we have been so blessed.

From my first year of Bible School 'til now, my life verse has been Proverbs 3:5-6- "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not to your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will direct your paths."

For the Lord is great and He will protect and provide for us. He is always by our side and He will be forever. He is the Most High God. He created you and I so He could have someone to talk to. He sacrificed His Son for us. We ought to love Him more and more each day The Lord loves you more than anything and hopes you love Him too!


60th Wedding Anniversary



They expressed his ideas about failure in war. I knew he was talking about his experiences serving in the United States Army during wartime. History records him as being a very great general.

I was reminded that we too are in war time, only we do not fight against flesh and blood but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places (Ephesians 6:12). We cannot lose this war and so I used what Gen. McArthur had observed and learned in the time he served the United States and I turned to the Word of God for guidance from our Commander in Chief and for His guidance as we serve Him.

A Soldiers Creed

by Gen. Douglas McArthur (1940)

The history of failure in war can almost be summed up in two words: TOO LATE

TOO LATE in comprehending the deadly purpose of a potential enemy.

(The thief cometh not but for to steal and to kill and to destroy. I am come that they might have life and that more abundantly. John 10:10)

TOO LATE in realizing the mortal danger.

(For to be carnally minded is death but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Romans 8:6)

TOO LATE in preparedness.

(Therefore be ye also ready for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh. Matthew 24:44)

TOO LATE in uniting all possible forces for resistance

(Wherefore take unto you the whole armor of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand. Ephesians 6:13)

TOO LATE in standing with one's friends.

(But if we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus cleanses us from all sin. I John 1:7)

VICTORY in war results from no mysterious alchemy (any seemingly magical power) or wizardry but depends entirely upon the concentration of superior force at the critical point of combat.

(The Lord shall cause thine enemies that rise up against thee to be smitten before thy face; they shall come out against thee one way and flee before thee seven ways. Deuteronomy 28:7)

Today and in the days ahead may we all be vigilant and not <u>TOO LATE</u> in any and all of our service to Him. May we always recognize the enemy and may our thoughts be always on God and His ways. We must be completely outfitted with the Armor of God, always prepared for battle. We need to stand together and hold each other up to the Throne of God as we face the battles of this life. There is power in prayer as we join together. And above all, we must realize that as we fight a battle that it is God who will fight for us and we will be victorious because of Him.


Jeremiah John Hawley 1976-2016


