

Broomfield, Colorado News for January, 2021

MONTHLY MEETING SUMMARY

On January 15, fifteen Broomfield Spellbinders storytellers gathered via Zoom for our monthly chapter meeting. **Kay Landers** welcomed all and invited self-introductions that could include (1) responses to the Six-Word Challenge announced in the December newsletter; (2) hopes for storytelling in 2021; or (3) suggestions for stories appropriate for Black History Month (February) and/or Women's History Month (March). Most of the responses took the form of six-word summaries of the effect of stories, which were added to the complete list on page 2 of this newsletter. Other members suggested stories of famous women in history (e.g. Molly Pitcher, Rattlesnake Kate, and Sarah Hale, the "mother" of Thanksgiving). Other suggestions included stories featuring strong women (e.g., Robert Munsch's *The Paper Bag Princess* and "The Woman Who Left No Footprints.") **Julie Toepper** is developing Ruth Bader Ginsburg's story to be presented in the first person. Suggestions for Black History Month included Deborah Wiles' *Freedom Summer* and the legend of John Henry. **Denny Thompson** talked about a recent article about Justina Ford, Denver's first licensed African American female physician as a possible story for either month. **Kathy Daniels** presented a list of several books for both of these special months. That list has been sent to all members with another list of sources for stories about strong women.

Cathy Lichty reported that Spellbinders has developed a 2021 calendar featuring art by school children and story suggestions for each month. It was printed in a very limited edition; she has only ten copies, which cost \$13 apiece. The Spellbinders Board of Trustees is considering developing a 2022 calendar with each chapter taking responsibility for one month. The plan would be to print enough copies that the unit cost would be much lower and chapters could sell them as a source of funds. Cathy and your other chapter leaders would welcome your feedback on this idea.

The rest of the meeting was devoted to stories. **Ellen Klement** shared her original, first-person account of a former slave. Her source was www.enslaved.org. **Kay Landers** then shared her delightful version of Rudyard Kipling's "The Elephant Child," and **Wynn Montgomery** closed with the story he will tell for a Longmont Library Spellbinders meeting featuring three variations of "Goldilocks and the Three Bears." His version is based on Alan MacDonald's *Beware of the Bears*.
