

New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

WHO ARE YOU?

There was a Catholic priest, who was very respected. People would drive for hours to hear him preach at missions and on retreats. He was sure he was touching the lives of the people in an exceptional way until some chance encounters with families and individuals made him realize how hard it was to get people to change their ways. People were not taking to heart his words. Disappointed, he decided to organize a three day retreat. The people enthusiastically attended. The first day he simply said, "WHO ARE YOU?" and sent them home. On the second day the priest stood before the crowd and said, "WHO ARE YOOOUUU?" The people were not too impressed, wondered what the priest meant, but kept faith and returned the third day. Again, the priest stood before the people and said, "WHOOO ARRREEE YOOOOUU?" The priest wanted the people to seriously evaluate themselves, hear his words, and apply them to their lives. It was a call to change for the better.

The experience of the priest in the above story brings to mind that of Jesus Christ and the prophet Amos in our readings of this Sunday. People are shrewd. Our lower nature resists positive growth, preferring to remain as we are: fighting, cheating, gossiping, disobedient, judgmental, selfish, manipulating, unforgiving, mocking, etc. Changing for the good rather than the bad is the goal of our salvation. If we keep on going to Church and listening to beautiful homilies and songs and they have no impact on our lives, of what use is bearing the name CHRISTIAN? WHO ARE YOU? Since change is ongoing, we need to focus on being a better person day by day.

What is it you want from God and the Church that you have not been given? Why are you the same person that you were last year? What change for good are you bringing into your life and that of your family? Why are you still the same arrogant child whose parent's words and directions are ignored or barely respected? Why do you have a lazy attitude towards prayer, family and responsibility? Why are you not pursuing the good Christian life with the same vigor you employ to seek the material and finite things that only bring temporary satisfaction? If others continually comment on your unhealthy attitude, then you should ask yourself "WHO AM I?"

Changing for the better in Christ Jesus does not stifle the pursuit of material wealth and happiness, instead it enhances your chances of living life with a greater fulfillment. Let's us end this reflection with a prayer:

Heavenly Father, we come before You today to ask for Your forgiveness and to seek Your direction and guidance. We know Your Word says. "Woe to those who call evil good," but that is exactly what we have done. We have lost our spiritual equilibrium and reversed our values. We have rewarded laziness and called it welfare. We have killed our unborn and called it choice. We have neglected to discipline our children and called it building self-esteem. We have abused power and called it politics. We have polluted the air with profanity and pornography and called it freedom of expression. We have ridiculed the time-honored values of our forefathers and called it enlightenment. Search us, Oh God, and know our hearts today; cleanse us from sin and set us free. Please, come back and rule our nation, be number one in our nation. AMEN.



PIO OF PIATRELCINA PRIEST (1887 ~ 1968) SEPTEMBER 23RD



According to one estimate, over 325 people since the time of Francis of Assisi have received the stigmata, that is, all or some of the wounds of Christ's passion. Few of those stigmata have had a more difficult life than Padre Pio.

Francesco Forgione joined the Capuchin Franciscans at age fifteen, taking the name Pio. Ordained in 1910, he served for a short time in the Italian army during World War I. In 1917 he was assigned to the friary in San Giovanni Rotondo, seventy-five miles from Bari on Italy's Adriatic coast.

A year later, while making his thanksgiving after Mass, he had a vision of Jesus and when it was over Padre Pio had the stigmata on his hands, feet and side.

After undergoing various medical and church investigations, for a short time he was not permitted to celebrate Mass publicly or hear confessions. Although he wrote nothing after 1924, unscrupulous people sometimes presented him as the author of prophecies they wrote.

In time, busloads of men and women came to his 5:00 A.M. Mass and to his confessional, which he occupied up to ten hours a day. During his mid-morning break, he blessed the sick.

Faith must lead to action, to works of compassion. In 1946, ground was broken on nearby Mount Gargano for the "House for the Alleviation of Suffering," a 350 bed facility financed by Padre Pio's benefactors.

COMMENT: At Padre Pio's canonization Mass in 2002, Pope John Paul II referred to that day's Gospel (Matthew11:25-30) and said: "The Gospel image of 'yoke' evokes the many trials that the humble Capuchin of San Giovanni Rotondo endured. Today we contemplate in him how sweet is the 'yoke' of Christ and indeed how light the burden are whenever someone carries these with faithful love. The life and mission of Padre Pio testify that the difficulties and sorrows, if accepted with love, transform themselves into a privileged journey of holiness, which opens the person toward a greater good, known only to the Lord."

QUOTE: "The life of a Christian is nothing but a perpetual struggle against self; there is no flowering of the soul to the beauty of its perfection except at the price of pain" (saying of Padre Pio).
