THE STORY OF THE HYMN

out of My Saviour' is a verse translation of a Latin prayer that is usually known from its opening words as Anima Christi ("Soul of Christ"). Its exact origins are uncertain. We do know that an indulgence was attached to its recitation by Pope John XXII in 1330, so it is older than that. Copies of it, either in Latin or in the language of the people, have been discovered throughout Europe.

It acquired a new popularity when St Ignatius Loyola included it in his Spiritual Exercises and recommended that it be prayed by those making a retreat. He suggested it as an example of his 'second method of prayer in which a person takes up a familiar prayer and prays each word or phrase of it with special attention, repeating them for as long as they find spiritual nourishment in them. The rhythms and repetitions of the Anima Christi make it ideal for this type of prayer.

The translator who has given us the verse form of the hymn is uncertain. It is sometime ascribed to Edward Caswall (1814-1878). He was originally an Anglican priest who was influenced by the Oxford Movement to become a Catholic. On the death of his wife from cholera, he joined the Oratory under St John Henry Newman and was ordained to the priesthood. Fr Caswall was a prolific writer of hymns, many of which are still sung. It was set to music about 1963 by an English Jesuit, Fr William J Maher, It was a popular benediction and communion hymn.

THE MEANING OF THE HYMN

he hymn has three verses, each of four lines, in a series of petitions addressed to Jesus in his -Passion. The first verse is clearly eucharistic. It

addresses the soul, body, blood and water from the side of Jesus which was opened with the lance during his Passion, it prays that our reception of the body of Christ. will lead us to greater sanctification:

"Soul of my Saviour, sanctify my breast, body of Christ, be thou my saving guest, blood of my Saviour, bathe me in thy tide, wash me with water flowing from thy side."

The second verse deepens our mediation on the Passion of the Lord, it prays that we be strengthened by his Passion, and also that we be hidden from danger, sheltered within his five wounds, and that we never be separated from him by sin:

"Strength and protection may thy Passion be, O blessed Jesus, hear and answer me. Deep in thy wounds, Lord, hide and shelter me, so shall I never, never part from thee."

The third verse grays for protection from the Evil One, "the foe malign" (wicked), it looks especially towards the last moments of our earthly life and grays with confidence that in death, we will hear the welcome of God as the good thief heard it, and that we shall be with him in paradise:

"Guard and defend me from the toe malign, in death's dread moments make me only thing; call me and bid me come to thee on high where I may praise thee with thy saints for ay [for ever]." =


Today's readings

Capernaum was the hometown of Jesus' first four disciples. Through them, it became Jesus' base and second home. It was on the edge of the Sea of Galilee. and not far from one of the great ancient roads of the Middle East that connected Egypt and Mesopotamia. Jesus' ministry combines preaching the Word, healing and exorcism. At that time, many forms of illness, particularly disturbances of personality or montal illness, were believed to be caused by unclean, or evil,

spirits. Exercism is often presented in the Gospel as a contest between Jesus and the demoniac powers that threaten human well-being. Jesus mosts the challenge of the evil one calmly, but without finishing. His ability to calm the passessed person is proof of his authority, and the story causes his fame to be known around the lakeside towns and villages.

ike many Catholic hymns in English, 'Soul of My Savigur' dates in its present form to what might be called the Catholic Revival in the middle of the 19th century. As Catholic churches and their congregations got larger, they were able to make better arrangements for music, such as the provision of organs. This hymn, however, has a longer history as a prayer that was widely known throughout Europe.
