#### Pastor Leanne's Message: "150 Years Faithful"

"The essential thing "in heaven and earth" is that there should be long obedience in the same direction; there thereby results, and has always resulted in the long run, something which has made life worth living." Nietzsche as quoted by Eugene Peterson, "A Long Obedience in the Same Direction"

In 1873, a Presbyterian minister named I. O. Sloan followed the train tracks westward, and arrived in Bismarck, ND. Bismarck was a wild town at the time, well-known for its brothels and gambling halls, and Sloan was determined to bring the light of the gospel into this city. Indeed, he did. Not only did he establish First Presbyterian Church, here on the corner of 2<sup>nd</sup> and Thayer, but he continued to found Glencoe Sloan and Mandan First churches, both of which continue to this day. For 150 years, we have been established here, on that same property carrying on the work of Jesus Christ.

That's quite a history. This church was here when Custer led his troops to their disastrous end at Little Bighorn. We were here through two world wars, a deep depression, 9-11, several disastrous droughts and floods, and most recently, a pandemic. One pastor almost single-handedly held the lottery back from this state for years – another led congregation members as they carried a coffin through the streets during the Vietnam War. Three different buildings served us over the years, lots of different pastors, deacons and elders – but now, here we are sliding into 2023, having been an active force for good in Bismarck – 150 years faithful.

And I suppose we could, if we liked, look back to what people call a "hey-day" – you know, a time when we had multiple choirs and bell choirs, two services, big budgets and a public reputation for status. But I, having entered our timeline only recently, don't really look at church life that way. I am not much for nostal-gic romanizations of church – any church. I am more interested in knowing that the church in any era gave its utmost to be faithful in the times in which it is placed. What was faithful for the congregation that began in a wood-framed building in 1873 may well not be what is faithful to our congregation now, in our time. I take it for granted that those who went before us did their best to serve God in their circumstances – but now, it is our shift, our turn – to serve God NOW, it our times and circumstances.

What 2023 will hold for us, I do not know. God knows, many of us have been holding our breath in anxious hope that the current political discourse will be become more civil and that the public conversation about our common well being will become less conflictual. It is my conviction that, given the nature of our culture's pain, it is ever-more important that the church remain dedicated to fulfilling her call to be a pointer to the Kingdom of God. In every era, we should be the people who pull back against destructive trends and philosophies, and remain committed to modeling peace on earth, care of the poor and needy, and love for our neighbors as ourselves. We don't have to be the church we were, we have to be the church that God needs us to be NOW, because that is what we will ultimately answer for.

So, family of God, Happy New Year and Happy Anniversary! In this new year, given us by God, let us seek to please our savior in our times, proving ourselves faithful for what God has next.





## **Hospitality Committee Donation Opportunity**



During January, the Hospitality Committee will again be collecting donations for Ministry on the Margins. Ministry on the Margins (MOTM) is a volunteer-based ecumenical ministry committed to supporting those who fall through the cracks during times of transition. Every week they offer hospitality and coffee, a food pantry, prison-to-society support, an ecumenical Christian worship service, and many other ministries. First Presbyterian has supported MOTM for several years through Thanksgiving Dinners, Tree of Love donations of sleeping bags, and soap collections.

This year MOTM is asking for donations of **hand warmers, warm winter gloves, hats, and scarves** for men and women. The sub-zero temperatures and howling winds of the last few weeks remind us all of the need for appropriate outerwear. Our donations will certainly be welcomed by the clients of the Ministry, many of whom are homeless on the coldest days and nights of the year.

Donations will be gladly accepted at the Church anytime during January.
