# HAVE FAITH AND BRING THAT FAITH TO THE WOUNDS OF YOUR NEIGHBORS

John wrote that the first thing Jesus did after greeting the apostles



was show them His hands and His side. He showed them His wounds. Not only did that prove that He really was the Lord, it also showed them that the wounds had a real and lasting effect on His body. His body was not restored to an unblemished state. It was Jesus' wounded body that was raised from the dead, that was taken to heaven, and that remains there now. The wounds on Christ's body are not symbolic or superficial.

Similarly, the body of Christ - the Church - is wounded, and those wounds are real.

We have the opportunity to see Christ's risen body as well, just not in the same way that the apostles did. With the eyes of faith through Thomas's eyes, if you will - we can perceive His risen

body, wounds and all, in the Church, in the world, in our community, in our parish, in each other. That faith-filled vision allowed the early Christian community to live and thrive despite the persecution they endured, even eating



their daily meals "with exhaustion and sincerity of heart, praising God and enjoying favor with all the people" (Acts 2:46-47). They saw Christ's risen body in their community: in the wounds they suffered and in the fellowship they shared.

Significantly, Jesus' first words to His disciples after His resurrection were, "Peace be with you" (John 20:19). This simple greeting, which may sound ordinary or even trite, meant a lot to the disciples, for they had all abandoned him as He suffered and died on the cross. But when Jesus returned, He came not only with the gift of the Holy Spirit, but also with the gift of reconciliation, restoring the bond between Him and them. When He showed them His hands and His sides, He was not reminding them of what they had let Him go through alone. He was giving them a share in His triumph over sin and death.

The Divine Mercy Chaplet is a relatively recent but very popular devotion revealed by Our Lord to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun. On Good Friday, 1937 Christ appeared to St. Faustina and asked her to recite this chaplet



for nine days, starting on Good Friday and ending on the Octave of Easter (the Sunday after Easter Sunday) and is now known as Divine Mercy Sunday. This chaplet is often recited during those nine days, but it can be prayed at any time of the year, and St. Faustina recited it almost unceasingly. A standard rosary can be used to recite the chaplet.

- Make the Sign of the Cross
- Pray the Opening Prayers: "You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us." "O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fount of mercy for us, I trust in You." (3 times).
- Pray the Our Father
- Pray the Hail Mary
- Say the Apostles Creed
- Pray the Prayer "Eternal Father" on the Our Father bead: "Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world. Amen."
- Pray the Prayer "For the Sake of His Sorrowful Passion" Ten Times on the Hail Mary Beads: "For the sake of His Sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."
- Repeat Steps 6 and 7: On each of the next four decades of the Chaplet, repeat Steps 6 and 7 (pray the Eternal Father, followed by ten "For the Sakes of His Sorrowful Passion.")
- Pray the Concluding Doxology Three Times after all five decades: "Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world." (three times)
- Pray the Closing Prayer: "Eternal God, in Whom mercy is endless, and the treasury of compassion inexhaustible, look kindly upon us, and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments, we might not despair, nor become despondent, but with great confidence, submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself. Amen."
- End with the Sign of the Cross

Sometimes the story is just so unbelievable: celebrities who gained two hundred pounds in a month, women having babies who were never pregnant, or people actually being seen who are dead! Like

The apostle Thomas found the news that Jesus was alive just too far-fetched to believe. But he didn't first hear the news on the Internet or read it standing in the grocery store checkout line. His friends told him. His fellow apostles told him they had actually seen the Lord with their own eyes. Their testimony was not enough. He needed proof.

The resurrection of Jesus gives us not only hope, but also a reason to be His disciples. We have not seen with our own eyes but, like Thomas, we have a community, the Church, that has relayed the truth to us. This same Jesus now calls us to go forth to spread the Gospel. More unbelievable than that, we have, through the gifts we have been given, a chance to change and even save lives. 
