New rum distillery to begin operations in PR

Will operate in old Glaxo, Smith, Kline plant

new rum distillery will start operating next year in the facilities of the old Glaxo, Smith, Kline pharmaceutical plant in Cidra.

Club Caribe Distillers, LLC is expected to invest more than \$10 million in machinery and new equipment in the conversion of the already existing facility in Cidra, abandoned in 2009 after Glaxo Pharmaceuticals closed shop.

"We have identified the opportunity to revitalize a pharmaceutical plant with significant infrastructure compatible with the distilling of rum. That is why we say already have a \$30 million investment in the site," Club Caribe Distillers vice president and chief financial officer Alberto Rivera, said of the 87 acre, 500,000-squarefoot facility in Cidra.

Puerto Rico Industrial Development Co. Executive Director José Pérez announced Club Caribe Distillers will benefit from Law 178, which now allow reimbursement of up to 25 percent to local rum distillers from the federal rum tax reimbursement program to Puerto Rico.

The commonwealth gets \$13.25 of the \$13.50 federal tax per gallon of Puerto Rican rum sold in the U.S.

"We are going to produce private rum brands, beside our own, and we are going to produce rum in bulk, which is used by our clients in the U.S. to manufacture their own products," explained Rivera, who emphasized marketing of Club Caribe brands and products will be mainly in

"We consider there is a great opportunity to increase demand for Puerto Rican rum in the U.S.," Rivera added.

Club Caribe brands include Ron Car-

los (gold rum), Black Roberts (spiced rum) and Club Caribe (silver rum), among

The new distillery is expected to create 25 new direct jobs, with a gross payroll of \$1 million.

This collaboration with Club Caribe Distillers is necessary to protect Puerto Rico's rum industry, while promoting at the same time other areas of the economy, such as competitive business environment and job creation," said Pérez.
In 2008 Puerto Rico's rum industry was

shaken when distilled spirits giant Diageo decided to move its operation to the U.S. Virgin Islands after negotiating very profitable incentives and conditions, including a new rum distillery built completely by the local government. The USVI government extended its negotiations to Washington, D.C. in an effort to obtain the same benefits Puerto Rico has for the soon to be produced local rum. Up to then, Diageo's brands were being produced in Puerto Rico by Destilería Serrallés in Ponce. This situation unleashed

the so called rum wars.

The economic impact the Diageo move to the USVI had on Puerto Rico is \$140 million less in federal rum tax reimbursements to the commonwealth.

Pérez did not elaborate on the jobs lost at Serrallés as a result of the move.

While Pérez insists the new distillery is a good step for the recovery, its immediate contribution to the island's treasury is expected to be "\$20 million, eventually," according to PRIDCO's assistant director Jorge Junquera.

"You have to realize DIAGEO's opera-tion had reached its peak when it moved

Still we expect Club Caribe Distillers operation to increase in the near future and start attracting other investments to Puerto Rico," said Pérez.
