How I Survived the Pandemic?

The sudden suspension of public worship and celebrations in mid-March, due to the corona virus, caught all of us by surprise -- it was just like a thief in the night and left all of us unprepared. The world was put to a halt - activities both secular and religious were suspended indefinitely or cancelled. All of a sudden, we found ourselves in quarantine or isolation. Stay at home. Stay safe. Wearing masks is a must. Wash your hands. Keep a safe distance, or social distance, became international mottos. Staying home was the safest way to avoid the spread of the virus. Visiting friends or family members or social visitations were discouraged. With all these things happening, I could not help but ask, "How can one survive, not only the virus, but loneliness, isolation and home-sickness, which the pandemic brought about?"

The first Sunday celebration of the Eucharist was so strange and weird, because instead of facing a live congregation, I was facing the camera with a virtual audience. It was not easy because they could see me, but I could not see them, their facial expressions and how they were reacting to my homily. Suddenly, I was celebrating the Eucharist by my lonesome in a cry room turned into a chapel. All Church activities were impromptu, or decided in a spur of the moment. Since the faithful could not attend Mass physically, I had to open the Church for private prayer, personal devotions and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. The Sacrament of Reconciliation was made available by appointment. Those were the activities that continued my connection with the parishioners.

As days went by, we could not see with certainty when things were going back to normal. Things seemed to be getting worse. Almost all of the news was frustrating and depressing, and it seemed like there was no light at the end of the tunnel. The number of infected individuals was rising by the thousands, reports of deaths were increasing and nowhere could one hear news of recoveries or numbers of infected people decreasing.

On my part, as I am not a front liner in the strict sense of the word, the thing that I could do was to stay home so others would be safe, and to put everything in God's hands –because, after all, God is the power in control of everything. All I could do was pray.

I started a devotion to the Blessed Mother by praying the Holy Rosary. My original plan was to pray on Facebook Live every Sunday evening. After the first night on the 22nd of March, I received several requests to have the devotion nightly, which I did. I thought that it would only run for a few nights, but because of the inspiration of those prayer partners participating, and for the Blessed Mother and her intercession for all the front liners, the devotion is still going on, after almost a hundred days since it's initiation. There was even an evening with more than 600 people participating, which inspired me to go on live twice a week on Wednesdays and Saturdays and to replay previous episodes on the other days.

I was able to survive and still am surviving amidst this pandemic of loneliness, homesickness and isolation because of the Eucharist and my devotion to the Blessed Mother, which deepened my prayer life. Actually, I say in all honesty that never in my life as a priest have I prayed as much as I have prayed during this pandemic. There

is always truth in the words of the Blessed Mother in her appearance to San Juan Diego when she said, "I am here. I am your mother. Do not fear. I am near." And there are inspiring words from Saint Paul in his Letter to the Philippians: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ."

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During the first quarter of 2020, NCCW affiliates made the following donations to Water for Life of \$4,924; Refugee Women Emergency Fund of \$391; Madonna Plan of \$4,735; Help-a-Child Fund of \$531; and General Fund of \$815 – for a total of \$11,396 (thanks to so many generous donations). Also, on behalf of those individuals who donated to have their mothers and/or family and friends remembered at Mass on Mother's Day at the Basilica of the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC, NCCW sent the Basilica \$1,975.

As an update of NCCW Membership in our area of the San Francisco Province – of the 34 parish Affiliate Memberships, only two have not renewed; of the 66 Individual Members, there are 24 who have not renewed; and of the 16 Supporting Members, there is only one who has not renewed. I will be reaching out to those unaffiliated memberships to see if they would be interested in renewing their memberships or remain as unaffiliated. understands well the longing for closeness with those whom we love.






MARIA MORERA JOHNSON BOOK CLUB





Due to our "new way of life", there aren't activities to report, so I would like to use this article to talk about the presidential election coming up in just five months.

It is part of our Catholic faith to participate in public life and to make our voices as Catholics heard. I invite you to go to http://www.usccb.org/news/2020/20-26.cfm for information about the USCCB's most recent update on Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, the teaching document for the faithful on the political responsibility of Catholics, put out every four years. It does not tell you how to vote but gives direction on what must be considered to make an informed vote. There are also resources discussing the importance of civilized dialogue with those of differing opinions.

Also, this year, there are videos which complement this document and can be viewed on the <u>USCCB's</u> <u>YouTube channel</u>.

The videos are titled:

- Catholics Participate in Public Life
- Catholics Protect Human Life and Dignity
- Catholics Promote the Common Good
- Catholics Love their Neighbors
- Faithful Citizens Work with Christ as He Builds His Kingdom (a compilation of the four videos)

The videos are only 2-3 minutes long, and are available in English, Spanish, Tagalog and Vietnamese. The videos in Tagalog feature Bishop Oscar A. Solis of Salt Lake City.

Archbishop José H. Gomez of Los Angeles, president of the USCCB, emphasized the importance of these videos saying, "The bishops of the U.S. invite all Catholics to bring their faith into the public square. Political engagement and participation are important ways that together, we can work to protect the unborn, welcome immigrants, bring justice to victims of racism and religious intolerance, support families, accompany those experiencing poverty, and advocate on behalf of all who are vulnerable. As we enter an election year, these *Faithful Citizenship* videos are meant to help the faithful reflect on this call, and we hope they will be widely shared."

Another great resource is our own Diocesan Office of Life, Justice and Peace https://www.dioslc.org/outreach/office-of-life-justice-and-peace. The director, Jean Hill, has a lot of resources for legislative priorities and advocacy tips. She also includes "find your legislator".

I hope you will take time in the next few months to review these resources and share them with others. All of these resources will be a great help to you in reflecting and praying before the November election.

LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION

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There was a very controversial issue on Capitol Hill during the Utah State General Session, which started on

January 27th and ended on March 12. 2020. This bill was House Bill, (HB) 90, which was sponsored by Representative Angela Romero, who happens to be a Catholic legislator. This bill was about priests breaking the seal of Confession. This bill had it become law would have placed priests in a position to be mandatory reporters like doctors, nurses, therapists, social workers and educators, who are mandatory reporters. They are required by law to report cases of child abuse, if it is reported to them. As Director of Health & Human Services Study Committee of Women's State Legislative Council of Utah, (WSLC) I invited Representative Angela Romero and Jean Hill, Government Legislative Liaison from the Salt Lake Catholic Diocese. We had a presentation scheduled on February 12, 2020. Jean spoke about how the Diocese received responses from concerned Catholics in over 82 cities across Utah in both Spanish and English as to how much interest this bill created. Representative Romero spoke about how much negative feedback and even death threats she received as the sponsor of this bill. She said there were derogatory accusations about her own Catholic personal faith. At the end of this Capitol Hill presentation, I emphasized how important it is that as Catholics or just human beings we would always remain respectful to elected officials even if we do not agree with their sponsored legislation. Representative Romero has done a good job with her dedication to help all Utah citizens with legislation helping domestic violence victims as well as years of dedicated work since she was elected in 2012. Usually when a bill is introduced on Capitol Hill, there is an impetus in why the issue became a bill initially. This bill never got very far in the legislative session as it did not have a Senate sponsor and got buried in the Rules Committee.

Senate Bill (SB) 39 Affordable Housing Amendments was sponsored by Senator Jake Anderegg, R-Lehi. This bill provides not only substantial funding to address varied needs for people who may be homeless or trying to avoid such experience. It included funds targeted to permanent supportive housing and extremely affordable housing statewide as it will go into effect in January 2021. As Catholics let us be reminded from the Themes of Catholic Social Teachings that Life and Dignity of the Human Person and Option for the Poor and Vulnerable. This bill addresses these themes as basic human rights. It had 2 substitutes and the 3rd substitute did not pass or get adopted. A \$10,000,000 appropriation was approved during the session and hopefully this will not get reduced during an upcoming special legislative session

in June.

During this surreal time in a Covid-19 pandemic setting, it is vital for our political leaders to know how we feel about issues in order to preserve the Sanctity of Life. Many decisions our political leaders are making during this pandemic can literally make a difference between life and death. There is a line between a surviving economy and a surviving population within a pandemic setting. We all need to make tough choices in how we can individually make the correct choice with social distancing and wearing masks to protect others as well as ourselves.

It is also significant to note that many more Catholic bishops, priests, religious laity are joining in 'Black Lives Matter' protests due to the senseless death of George Floyd by a policeman in Minneapolis. Legislators will be looking at measures used as choke holds which limit a person's ability to breathe. This legislation is being sponsored by Representative Sandra Hollins, a Democrat from District 23 elected in 2014 and she is a Social Worker by profession. There is much work to be done to address racial inequalities, but this is a good beginning. Let us do what we can as Catholics to preserve and honor the Sanctity of Life because all lives do matter.

This is an important time to think about how you want to get to know your political candidates who are running for office in November. If you do not know who your local elected Representative or Senator is, this may be a good time when we are not in a 45-day Legislative General Session. 


- Donate \$ 200 to CCD for Confirmation Class Retreat
