UUOCC BUILDING COMMITTEE

In a recent Building Committee meeting, Bonney Parker, our liaison with the Murray Grove Board, was given the following items for their Board to address: 1) Review our Church Building Criteria 2014 document. 2) Review the site layout for the church and parking lot. 3) Include us in the development of their Master Plan.

Bonney received positive responses to our requests as well as a copy of the Murray Grove Master Plan Study to be prepared by their architect, Thomas Kocubinski. The completed plan is scheduled for August, 2015. We will participate in a "charrette", a form of focus group used by architects to identify needs and functions for architectural design. This is scheduled for October 18, 2014.

We have developed a Needs and Wants documents for discussion with our attorney, Mr. Tennant Magee, prior to developing a working relationship with Murray Grove relative to the funding and design of the church. A meeting will be scheduled. Elaine McConnell consented to be the sole contact with Mr. Magee for all attorney-related issues. The committee unanimously approved this decision.

The question of an early relocation to Murray Grove arose again to determine if this was still viable. At the time of our previous discussion with MG, there was no room to meet our needs for Sunday services, committee meetings, administrative offices, hospitality needs. Temporary structures such as trailers are not allowed by Lacey township ordinances unless used for construction site purposes.

We feel it should be reopened to provide us with an earlier relocation to make known our presence and future home location in Murray Grove. Early relocation may also be a cost saving measure versus increased costs at our present location. Murray Grove will be doing some construction of rest room facilities so a temporary trailer may not be out of the question.

Murray Grove is very positive on our relocation to their site. They will include "Future Home of UUOCC" in their signage. They would like us to prepare a proposal with our needs in terms of space and times for service as well as a pro forma financial plan for the cost of building the church.

Our proposal to transfer the church endowment funds is still in its initial state. At present we have two options. We can cash out each of the account instruments (e.g., funds, stocks, etc.) and transfer the cash to MG. Another approach would be to create a joint account with MG and include some of their Board members as signatories and add to the present endowment amount any amount that is in their master plan for the church building. This will be a point of discussion with our attorney.

A Long Range Plan outline was prepared by Barbara Diamantopolous using our 2009 Long Range Plan Report, the Nextsteps Weekend Report and the Rockford, Illinois UU Church LRP. The Long Range Plan Committee will be established as a committee separate from the Building Committee and composed of members of all church committees. Our initial focus, by the Nextsteps weekend analysis, is the membership growth of the congregation and a balanced operating budget each year, no more supplemental pledge campaigns. The Long Range Planning Committee should consist of members of the Membership, Church Building, Finance, and Worship committees, to name a few. Bonney Parker, Eileen Fallon and Elaine McConnell volunteered to be members of the LRP Committee. Anyone interested in becoming a member of this committee should contact Barbara Diamantopoulos.

OUR SEVEN PRINCIPLES


Every week we are reminded about our Seven Principles during our communal gathering, as the Worship Associate points to them in the introduction to the service. But these principles have a history of birth and evolution of which we may know little. So, let's take a look at their history.

When the American Unitarian Association and the Universalist Church of America consolidated in 1961, they prepared a list of six principles as signs

of their commonality and joint commitment to a liberal faith. These were:

- 1. To strengthen one another in a free and disciplined search for truth as the foundation of our religious fellowship;
- 2. To cherish and spread the universal truths taught by the great prophets and teachers of humanity in every age and tradition, immemorially summarized in the Judeo-Christian heritage as love to God and love to man;
- 3. To affirm, defend and promote the supreme worth of every human personality, the dignity of man, and the use of the democratic method in human relationships;
- 4. To implement our vision of one world by striving for a world community founded on ideals of brother-hood, justice and peace;
- 5. To serve the needs of member churches and fellowships, to organize new churches and fellowships, and to extend and strengthen liberal religion;
- 6. To encourage cooperation with men of good will in every land.

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This Month in UU History (Continued)

Our faith did not stand bound to a list of common beliefs but allowed for evolution as reason and changing times demanded. At the start there was no list of sources from which the faith arose. Also, as the Association was formed, one of the by-laws calls for a review of the Principles at no less than every 15 years.

The original principles were reviewed during the 1980s and the seventh principle was added, as well as six sources. The mention of earth-centered traditions was added in 1995

A children's version of the seven principles was also adapted in the 1980s;

- Every person is important;
- All people should be treated fairly;
- Our churches are places where all people are accepted and where we keep on learning together;
- Each person must be free to search for what is true and right;

Profile: New Member Jan Hagen

Jan's thoughts echo those of many a member who come to UU as adults. She says, "I've been a UU all my life. I just didn't know it."

UUOCC is indeed fortunate that Jan was introduced to us just a few months ago by her friend, member Lorraine Talbert. She brings a desire for spirituality and community, as well as a lifetime of diverse experiences.

Her first interesting job was as a mother's helper at a dude ranch in Jackson Hole, Wyoming. The fact that she didn't know how to ride a horse—one of the requirements--didn't stop her. Thankfully, she's a quick study, and learned on the job. And what a glorious place it was to wake up in every day, located as it is in the beautiful Teton Mountains

That wasn't the only beautiful setting that Jan has experienced. Indeed, her first child was born in Hawaii, which Jan had travelled to with her first husband, an academic. She's also lived in Berkeley, California and upstate New York. In fact, she says that she moved to Leisure Knoll in Manchester from "paradise," an eight-acre, wooded parcel in the Poconos. Over time, it required too much work, however, so she decided to move to a place where she could be close to her grown children and to her grandchildren.

Mother's helper in the American West was only her first of many types of jobs. She's been a social worker, a teacher of ESL (English as a Second Language), and a teacher of emotionally disturbed children. She's even taught adults how to swim (which she calls her most difficult job). She believes, though, that her greatest training was the one she undertook to be a hospice volunteer. How did she manage to succeed in this wide variety of occupations? She learned long ago that, "If you make it about the other person, you will be blessed."

When asked which historical figure she'd most like to meet, Jan does not hesitate. "Mark Twain," she responds immediately. The reason she would choose Twain shows why Jan fits in so well with us here at UUOCC: "He knew how to laugh at life; he was unostentatious; he treated people fairly—no exclusivity."

He was initially interested in sculpture, and learned how to draw while traveling the New York City subway to the High School of Music & Art by drawing the other passengers. He believes, along with Ingres, that "drawing is the conscience of art." Having started his studies in sculpture, it was only later that he turned his attention to two-dimensional art, and he now spends all his time with painting and graphics.

Religious Education (RE)

The September, we will begin a new RE program for all children. It is entitled "Love Surrounds Us." This curriculum came from the UUA's Tapestry of Faith Lifespan Curriculum, which can be found on the UUA's website.

The goals of this program will:

- Teach the seven Unitarian Universalist Principles
- Develop connections among love, the Principles, and the communities of home, school, faith, and world
- Lift up Unitarian Universalism and the Principles in activities and stories
- Teach children skills for forgiveness, love, sharing, acceptance, caring, and peace in a loving community
- Explore rituals that help us focus on and celebrate UU Principles.

We are asking for volunteers to teach the program. We would like to have 8 volunteers (2 each week) to commit to a Sunday each month. So if you agree to the 1st Sunday, you would be responsible to teach every 1st Sunday between September and June (2nd Sunday, etc). The entire curriculum is online, so you can look it over ahead of time.
