## Pointe Claire Retains Inter-Town Trophy

For the fourth successive year, Pointe-Claire captured the coveted Inter-Town Trophy at the Lakeshore Playgrounds Fourth Annual Inter-Town Track and Field Meet Last Wednesday, August 16, at Courtland Park in Dorval. Competitors from Beaconsfield and Dorval valiantly attempted to prevent Pte. Claire's domination, but their final 80 points each were a long way from Pte. Claire's 210 points.

Inter-park trophies were awarded to the winning park in each city or town, and the winners were Christmas Park in Beaconsfield (60 points) in Surrey Gardens Park in Dorval (28 points) and Cedar Park Heights Park in the Pte. Claire (87 points). In addition there was a special team trophy for the open classification, and this went to the team from Walters Park, Dorval which had 26 points. This trophy is retained by the park.

The official opening of the meet was given by Mayor John Pratt of Dorval, after which an Olympic-style torch was lighted and run around the track. The events, which included the high jump, broad jump, softball throw, shotput, sprints, and relays continued until approximately 3:30 P.M., at which time the trophies were presented.

Dorval contestants who won their respective events were: Ann Clarke of St. Charles Park, Junior Girls High Jumps 3' 7 1/2"; David Fox of St. Charles Park, Intermediate Boys High Jump, 4' 2 1/2". 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## Report Requested On Sewage Plant Sites

Members of City Council met with representatives of the engineering consulting firm of Lalonde, Girouard and Letendre on August 17 to discuss locating of the proposed sewage treatment plant for Dorval. The Engineers were asked to investigate a total of seven possible sites for the plant: 1. e. three in St. Charles Park (north, south and central), Dixie Golf Course, an industrial area north of the Ballantyne Park Pool on the other side of the old C. NR Railway line, and two on Dixie Island one with a causeway and one without causeway.

A report on these proposed sites including cost estimates was requested by Council for their meeting on Sept. 8 at City Hall.

Also in attendance at the meeting were four residents of the St. Charles Park area.

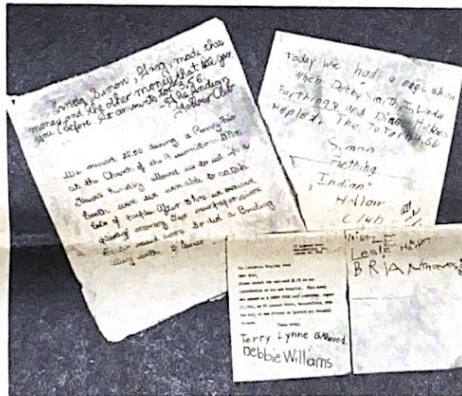
### BILL OF RIGHTS

A Bill of Rights for Canadians has become a reality under the leadership of Prime Minister John G. Diefenbaker. The Bill of Rights, providing for "The recognition and protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms" is one for which the Prime Minister has spoken out through the years.

In recent months a great deal has been written and said, in the press and over the air, on the pros and cons of this Bill of Rights. In order to clarify some of the arguments involved in this controversy, I thought it might be advisable to explain exactly what the Prime Minister had in mind in sponsoring this Bill of Rights, by repeating his exact words in addressing the House of Commons on Dominion Day, 1960, the 93rd Birthday of Canada, when Mr. Diefenbaker said:—"I am a Canadian, a free Canadian, free to speak without fear, free to worship God in my own way, free to stand for what I think right, free to oppose what I believe wrong, free to choose those who shall govern my country. This heritage of freedom I pledge to uphold for myself and all mankind."

"What are civil liberties? I defined them on one previous occasion as constituting and making him a sovereign in his dealings with the state. "We have today, in effect, although never adopted by Canada, a universal declaration of human rights in which was passed by the United Nations . . . This measure that I introduce is the first step on the part of Canada to carry out the acceptance either on the international declaration of human rights or of the principles that actuated those whose produced that noble document.

"The Bill in question can be

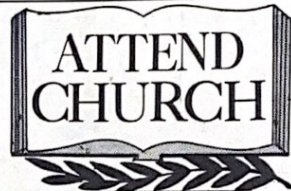

  - (b) The right of the individual to protection of the law without discrimination by reason of race, national origin, colour, religion or sex.

  - (d) freedom of speech;
  - (e) freedom of assembly and association; and
  - (f) freedom of the press.
- "I wish to say that the bill of rights, as I see it, will deny the right of any government to interfere with my right to speak within the law, my right to be free from the threats of the activities of a

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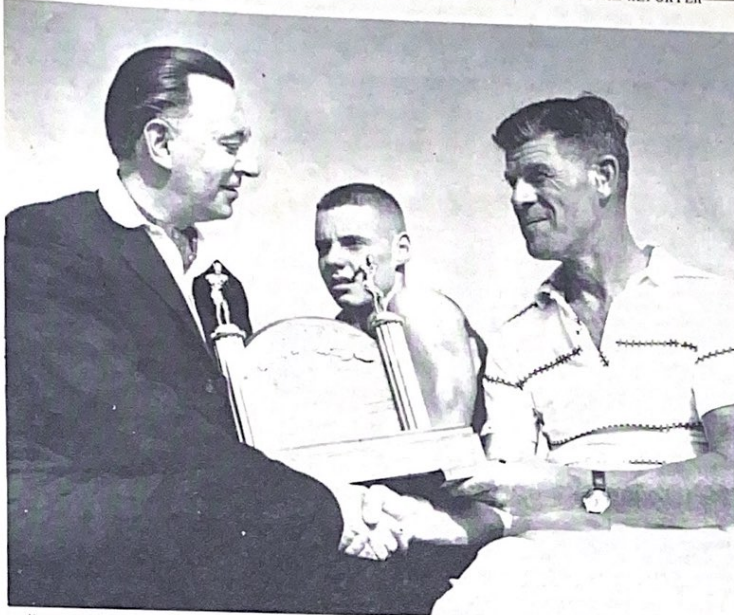

## Dorval Parks Program Meets Needs

According to Roger Bastien, Director of Parks and Recreation for Dorval, this summer season has been the most successful yet for the Dorval playgrounds. The program has broadened in scope by offering a greater variety of activities and by initiating several new events to challenge the interests and skills of all ages.

The schedule of major inter-park events began with a Bicycle Relay Championship on July 19, with the Surrey Gardens Park teams emerging victorious. Due to the success of the event and the interest shown, this activity will be held annually.

The junior track and field meet for boys and girls age ten and under was held on July 26, and was this year changed to a tabloid-type meet, in which each child competed in eleven events, thus providing greater participation. Courtland Park won the junior division, while the Nihon Park team captured the Intermediate championship. The next major inter-park competition was a bowling tournament at Laurentian Lanes, with the winners being Anne Keillor of St. Charles Park and Bernard Brunet of Neptune Park. Continued for the second year was the golf tournament on August 7, for boys and girls age twelve and over. Champions in this event were Marise Raymond of Nihon Park and Gilles Le-cavalier of Surrey Gardens Park.

The major event of the entire season was the Lakeshore Playgrounds Inter-

Town Track and Field Meet held on August 16. This was the first year that Dorval hosted the meet.

Apart from these major inter-park events, a wide variety of day-to-day activities were offered to members of the individual parks, highlighted by numerous special events for all ages, including pet shows, costume contests, sand-modelling competitions, teen-age dances, parents' nights, and a host of other activities. It is felt that the playground staff has done a commendable job by offering such a wide and varied program, and Dorval Parks and Recreation are looking forward to an even bigger and better season next year.

It will deny anyone the right to prevent me living my own life within the limits of the law without regard to race or colour or creed. It will remove from my government the right to deny me the right to belong to an unpopular minority anywhere in the country. It will deny any government, however powerful in the future, the right to deny recourse to the courts.

"Those were my hopes. Those were my aspirations as an ordinary Canadian now having the opportunity in a country that gives opportunity, to bring others before parliament that which I believe to mean much to Canada."

The house has been equipped with a bedroom nursery, and a large playroom filled with constructive toys. The yard is equipped with swings and a paddling pool, and various training projects are carried out with children's records and books. The children are given morning and afternoon snacks besides their noon dinner. As Mrs. Cox explained it, the project sounded pleasant for children, a pleasure for "Aunt Pat", and a boon for mothers in need of this type of care for their children.

**Caution Urged For Children Travelling Alone**

A plea to Montreal parents to exercise caution and foresight sending their children unattended on a long train or bus trip has been voiced by Mrs. Jean Henshaw, executive director of the Travellers' Aid Society of Montreal, a Red Feather agency. Travellers' Aid representatives, Mrs. Henshaw said, have been greatly concerned over the number of youngsters left stranded in bus terminals and railroad depots far away from home because their parents had neglected to take the simple step beforehand of calling Travellers' Aid.

"If a valuable object is lost or broken in transit", the Travellers' Aid official commented, "You can very often repair or replace it. But there is no way of completely undoing the hurt suffered by a young child who finds himself in a strange

and terrifying city, hungry and tired, surrounded by unfamiliar faces and without any of the security of family or friends", she pointed out.

"And yet", she continued "the entire problem can so easily be avoided". During the past year, Travellers' Aid helped avoid this upsetting experience by planning with families to provide proper safeguards for their children on long unaccompanied journeys.

A typical example cited by Mrs. Henshaw was that of seven-year-old Anne. Brought to Travellers' Aid by a worried intercity bus driver in the late afternoon, her grimy face and tear-filled eyes could not hide the child's attractiveness. Anne told her mother had put her on the bus that morning in her home city, telling the driver that her grandmother would meet her at the bus depot here. But Anne's mother had no way of knowing that this was just the day grandma decided to visit an institutionalized friend out of town and that neither telephone calls nor a telegram

Parents can help protect their youngster by having his identification, including name, address and city, and telephone number, securely placed in his possession. He should also be told how much of his money he is to use for meals, tips and other travelling expenses and how much he may spend on amusements, candy and the like.

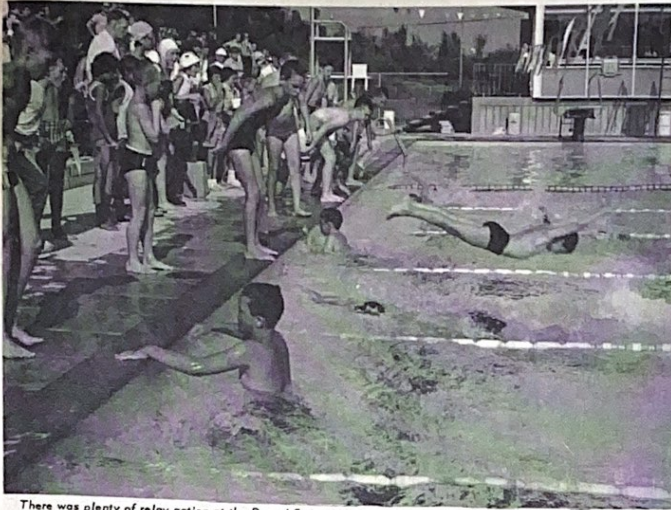

The contest was organized by a committee headed by T. Hunter, president of the Lachine Lawn Bowling Club.

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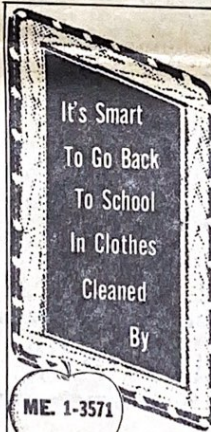

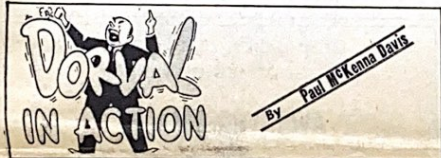

The success of ex-Alderman Sarto Desnoyers in the current racing meet at Blue Bonnets recalls to mind that Dorval once had a race track of its own, and major racing is just about the only sport that isn't flourishing in Dorval these days.

Mr. Desnoyers, one of Canada's leading breeders, has so far corralled most of the major purses at the Bonnets' meet, with a sprightly colt named Dorval. The former alderman, a manufacturer of ethical pharmaceutical products, once told me that he's got his heart set on winning a Queen's Plate — and even a Kentucky Derby. Some three years ago, Desnoyers had one of the favorites for the Plate, a speedster named Jeansen, only to have his hopes dashed when the three-year old injured himself the morning of the big race and ran a dead last. But let's delve back into history.

More than 40 years ago, in the days of Commodore J.K.L. Ross, the Seagram stables, R.S. McLaughlin and other fine sportsmen, a promoter named Sam Holman conceived the idea of building a racetrack on the site where the airport now stands.

This was the time when Blue Bonnets was the finest racing plant in Canada and one of the best in North America. But Mr. Holman had dreams of glory and profit that far outstripped anything Blue Bonnets ever had in mind. While a Bonnet's handicap or stake race would run to the then staggering purse of \$5,000, Holman, with his spanking new one-mile track, announced a \$25,000 "Dorval Derby."

The optimistic Holman was born about 30 years too soon.

From the outset, the Lakeshore track was beset with nothing but trouble. The promoter hadn't reckoned with the transportation problem. Across to the track was by way of the narrow, tortuous Lower Lachine Road, and what is now the broad Cote de Liesse airport highway was then little else but a wagon track.

The details are lost in the passage of time now, but according to the information I managed to dig up, "Holman's Folly" collapsed when he failed to pay off the \$25,000 purse money for the big Derby.

The track was then taken over by the late Joseph Cattarinich and Fred Richard and struggled along for several years, until the early thirties when, I am told, the Town of Dorval took the site over for taxes.

One of my conferees tells me that, at one extreme end of the airport land, there are still a couple of post markers, yellowed with age but still standing.

It makes one wonder how an enterprise of this sort would go today. Certainly, business in Dorval and its surrounding area offers plenty of scope for the promoter. Everything from motor hotels to shopping centres has made good on the Lakeshore, and attendance at amateur sports events is more than good.

But who needs a race track? The City is getting its entertainment gratis — with the swim pools, the baseball diamonds, and its rinks and football fields.

All this without contributing to the \$2 window. It's rather engaging to look back, though, and consider the tiny rural town of just a few decades ago. Imagination might even lead us to the illusion that sometimes, maybe late at night, an attentive ear might catch the ghostly sound of pounding hooves where now the noise of DC 4's and Viscounts holds sway.

Anyone who hasn't already visited the "Models Unlimited" Show at the Dorval Civic Library, should make it a "must" for this week-end. The show was officially opened last Friday evening by His Worship, Mayor John Pratt, and will be open from 2 to 4 and from 7 to 9 p.m. this Friday, Saturday and Sunday. There are models of planes and ships of all sizes and varieties — many made by local model enthusiasts, as well as a very striking display loaned by various transportation companies.

Two Dorval boys — Ken Mantha and Bruce Penniston — are to be congratulated on their enterprise and achievement in gathering and displaying these models.

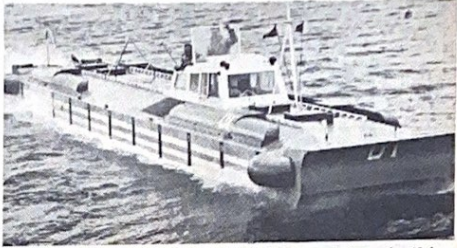
