Saturday, June 3, 2006 8am to 2pm



CDEC will have a garage sale fundraiser on June 3, from 8am to 2pm at 913 Totonaca Lane in West El Paso. To reach the garage sale take I-10 to Redd Road. Go east on Redd towards the Franklins and watch for Applebee's on the right. After you pass Applebee's turn left on Medano. Go down to the second street and turn right on Totonaca. AT FEATHER LAKE

The long dry spell at our Feather Lake Wildlife Sanctuary continues. The central part of the basin has been partially flooded with irrigation water on several occasions the past 2 months, but each time the water has quickly disappeared. For the most part, the lake has been dry for over 5 months now. In several places along the shore, cottonwoods, willows and tornillos are looking severely stressed.

For the past 3.5 years, Feather Lake has been dry as often as it has been flooded, and many of the dry spells have been during periods when our sanctuary is normally open to the public. Conversely, the lake has often held water during periods when we're normally closed, especially August and September. This year, to expand publicuse opportunities, we plan to open in September rather than the usual October opening. If we have water, that is.

You'll have two chances to check out Feather Lake this summer. Our upcoming workdays are **Sat., June 3** and **Sat., July 29**. On both dates, the gates will open at **8 a.m.**, but come any time during the day to help out. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.



<u>WANTED</u>: Keystone Site 'New' Bird Species Sightings <u>REWARD</u>: \$15/ first sighting!

Well, the Keystone site bird checklist now stands at 191 species, & I wanted to continue to add an incentive to get some more birders to go out and help add some new species to the list, especially since our Spring migration is ongoing!

For each new species that is observed by someone else, for the list to reach the 200 species level, I will donate \$15 in cash &/or birding or similar equipment [they don't have any optics or field guides for visitors/volunteer use] to Keystone Heritage Park, Inc. [KHP]. 'Proof of Sightings' can be discussed with me, on a case by case basis.

The bird's listed below are some of the more likely species that <u>may</u> be found at the site, but there are other less likely or more difficult to identify species, as well [review the site's checklist on the KHP or EP/T-P Audubon websites, to determine which additional species have not been seen at the site].

Hopefully this 'incentive' to help the Keystone group, will spur you to visit Keystone in the next few weeks & more frequently overall, and help 'build-up' the bird checklist!

For those wanting more comfortable accomadations, it's only 10 miles to Alto and another 5 to downtown Ruidoso, where you will find many nice places to put your head down.

Birds that could be seen; 3 species of Jays, Mountain Chickadee, Golden-crowned Kinglet and Mountain Bluebird. Northern Pygmy Owl could be heard in the camp area. Extra effort will be made to find American **Dipper**, it has been cooperative in the past.

Just because July 14th is in the heading, its a Friday, don't let it stop you from coming up Sat. You must let Bob (757-1876) know if you think you will be going as I need at least 5 others to make it a worthwhile trip.
