Director's Welcome

n behalf of the Kingsborough Art Museum, it is my pleasure to welcome you to Supernatural: Works by Dolores *Furtado*. Part of our *Emerging* Brooklyn Artists series, Supernatural offers us the all-tooinfrequent opportunity to reexamine our relationship to the material world. Dolores Furtado's work challenges a sharp distinction between the material and artistic realms, a tightrope walk between natural and modified matter.

What exactly, though, is that divide? How minimal can one venture, or seemingly venture,

without erasing one's self from the process? The blurring of

matter and art object forces us to question the nature of matter itself, the fluctuating energy flow of atoms that provides the reassuring illusion of solidity.

Nevertheless, the forms she produces are intriguing; at times vaguely mimetic, at others more primordial and evocative of a pure but unknown substance. Some appear as shards, or fragments—the vestiges of a lost civilization for which we must provide our own archaeological history.

The uncanny feeling we sense when confronted with objects that are simultaneously foreign and familiar compels us to apworld with equal wonder. This is the wondrous gift artists provide to humankind. Artists employ Earth's matter to convey the staggeringly strange predicament in which we find ourselves as sentient human beings. We are matter, we exist on a planet of matter, in a universe of matter. Matter matters.

Often a sensual eroticism permeates Furtado's material forms, with sculptures often suggesting the body or at best anthropomorphized organic matter.

In the end, *Supernatural* is an exhibition that deals with materials and process, and the conventional desire for overt mean-

ing is best surrendered to the sheer joy of perception and reflection. Rather, it is perhaps more appropriate to say that the meaning lies within the matter itself. And as matter yourself, a good starting place is within.
