Tuesday, February 9 – Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper at 6:00 pm in Trinity Hall.





From the Vicar...

In all the many ways we divide ourselves as human beings, by race, gender, religion or denomination, or by any of a variety of labels that really have very little meaning, one that is rarely used, but I think could be helpful to consider is whether we are people who ask questions or seek answers. The next question might be, do I answer yes or no, or are those two different groups of people? But it is probably more valuable to think about it than it is to try to get the labels right.

Occasionally I encounter parts of our Christian tradition or practice of worship that make me say, "Wait, we do or say what? Why?" And several times I have talked to others with similar questions, or an odd sense that something we do as Christians seems wrong or strange. Contrary to 20th century sociologist, Max Weber, who suggested that in religious environments there is a form of sacred dishonesty in which one can express beliefs that they do not believe, so long as everyone else is, I have always suggested, "If you're unsure about something we do, don't do it." But then I always follow this with, "But let the fact that everyone else around you is doing what you are not be a reminder that you should talk about it with others and learn what it means in the tradition and that it means to others."

The dilemma that Max Weber identifies is that the sense of participation and belonging in socio-religious circles often overshadows our willingness to ask questions and explore our faith. But our God is not a God of mandate and ignorant obedience. Romans 12 reminds us that God desires that we expand and renew our minds.

In the medieval period, when the priests conducted worship in Latin only, during communion the priests would say,, "Hoc est corpus," meaning, "This is the body." The peasantry, who didn't know Latin but understood that Christ's body was present in the bread after the priest completed the invocation, rather than ask the questions, "What is this? Why do we do it?" concluded these must be magical words. Not long after that, "Hocus Pocus" became synonymous with magic. If only someone had stopped to ask. But taking the time to ask questions is more than avoiding silly foolishness like this. Taking the time to explore what we do in worship can give us a deeper appreciation and experience in our time of worship, and engaging others with simple questions like "What does this mean for you?" can open wonderful opportunities to talk about our faith and our experience in our life with Christ. And you never know who might be engaging in some sacred eaves dropping, and encounter your discussion as a witness to the wonders of the grace and blessing of God in our lives.

Durham IHN Transition Update

by Ellen Lavery and Margot Wuebbens As of December 31, 2015, Durham Interfaith Hospitality Network (DIHN) has merged with Genesis Home, one of the other organizations in Durham that help homeless families gain permanent housing. This merger has created a new organization named Families Moving Forward (FMF).

FMF will use the previous Genesis Home facility located just north of the Main Durham Library branch



downtown. The lower level of this building at 300 N. Queen Street is currently being renovated to provide housing for the additional families that used to be part of DIHN. After renovations are complete this summer, it is anticipated that FMF will be able to accommodate approximately 21 families at a time, with expectations of serving 80 families per year. At that point, all FMF families will be living in this FMF facility. Since they will not longer be rotating through host churches, the current system of hosting as we know it will no longer exist.

FMF is hoping to continue working with the congregations who have hosted for DIHN over the past everal years. At this time, we are unsure of what that will look like for our congregation, so St. Paul's has not yet officially committed itself to volunteering for the new partnership. We will keep the congregation posted as we get more information on how we may be able to serve FMF in the future.

However, you still have two more opportunities to participate in the hosting experience as we have known it with DIHN. St. Paul's will be hosting families February 21-28 and May 8-15 before the FMF renovation is complete. Look for the sign-up sheets in the foyer prior to our hosting weeks. The 2016 congregation council welcomed new members Maria Chi, Bonnie Cooper, Marilyn Hawley, and George Seiz at our January planning session. Here is a summary of what was discussed:

- For those who have not heard, council had 1. eliminated the funding for a new vicar as of Aug/Sept of 2016. This was a very hard decision but one that we felt had to happen based on end of year numbers. Our typical sponsorship of a vicar includes their lodging and a modest salary. This year, Pastor was asked to accept a vicar from the seminary that would not require lodging because they are already local. Several congregation members approached Pastor and offered to donate the funds to cover the new vicar's 2016 salary. The council voted unanimously to approve the new vicar for the 2016/2017 year (typically Sept thru Aug). We felt that we are already understaffed enough as it is and this was too good of an opportunity to pass up. We will have to add the expense back into the 2017 budget.
- 2. Another main topic of discussion was improving communication with the congregation. We have not finished with this subject, but it would be safe to say that we all agree that we should use a combination of Congregational Meetings, Cross Connections, our web site, the Sunday bulletin, announcements at both services, Susan's "Parish Notes" and discussions at Wednesday night dinners to keep everyone informed.
- 3. The upcoming purchase of the Paschall property was also discussed. There is a separate committee currently studying different possibilities of how to best utilize the house and approximately 4 acres.
- 4. The date of Sunday, February 21 was chosen for the next Congregational Meeting.

We welcome your ideas and input. Please don't hesitate to contact a council member if there is

something you would like for us to consider. Thanks to all of you for making St. Paul's a wonderful congregation to be a part of!

Have you or someone you know lost a loved one and are journeying through grief? There is a free, open, confidential program sponsored by a




