

April 18th 11:30am after Worship St. Mark's Annual Congregational Meeting Pastor's thoughts....

Resurrection Easter Sunday is here! After the trial, and often death like grip on our usual patterns of life, resurrection is even more meaningful.

John 20.1-18 ¹ Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb.

These are the first words from the Gospel of John that we shall hear on Easter Morning from St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church. This one verse tells so us so much about the Resurrection story.

Burial customs in the time of Jesus were important. The Israelites referred to Deuteronomy regarding burial. It was believed that it was a curse to leave the dead unburied. "Thy carcasses shall be food unto all fowls of the air, and unto the beasts of the earth" (Deut. 28:26). Because the ground is all rock and sand in area of Jesus burial, it was customary to use a cave or chamber cut out of the soft rock. Often many people were buried there together. The wealthy and the patriarchs purchased family tombs. In these times cremation was considered an outrage. The New Testament sheds some light on Jewish burial practices of the first century C.E. Jesus' disciples took his body, bought a great quantity of myrrh and aloes, "and wound it in linen clothes with the spices, as the manner of the Jews is to bury" (John 19:40).

It was the first day of the week which was Sunday. Saturday was the Sabbath Day according to Genesis when the Lord rested. Sunday begins a new week. Christians adopted Sunday as a day of worship in the First Century.

Mary Magdalene comes to the tomb while it was still dark. Why? So that she would not be seen? Was she fearful? Maybe she was grieving? Maybe she could not sleep?

Mary Magdalene sees the large stone at the entrance has been removed. Most of these stones were estimated to weigh 2000-4000 pounds. Most of these stones were round or square and flat so they could be rolled in place. Sealing the door to the tombs were meant to kept grave robbers and wild animals out.

In this first verse there is much to think about. The Stone symbolized a barrier between the Living & Dead. Now that Jesus Had Risen, "Death Had Been Conquered!"

Do we have barriers like stones that keep us from being resurrected? Barriers that keep us from visiting with Jesus and the angels? Barriers of self-concern, fear, anxiety, irritation, frustration, or any manner of sin that keeps us from worshipping the Risen Christ?

A lot happens after verse 1. Jesus appears behind locked doors. Some believe he has risen, and some do not. For Christians, we believe by our baptism that there is new life in Jesus. That we can be reborn in this world and the next! Everyday there is a new beginning for Christians! We are fed and forgiven children of God!

As we move into Spring, we give thanks for the Resurrection and anticipate a resurrection of health and wellness for God's people and a Resurrection for the church in the world!

Treasurer's Report: Income for the month of February was \$5,893 with expenses \$7,745 with a deficit balance of \$1,852 for the month

Pastor's Report: Oran and Pastor were blessed to have received their 2nd Covid vaccine 2 weeks ago. Pastor is glad to see the February blizzard weather being over as it was a challenging month with weather affecting the internet along with her computer crashing. Kent Anders was able to get some church reports for pastor. Microsoft 365 was purchased for the computer in order to do bulletins, worship and teaching material. The cost to the church was about \$75 for the year. Pastor looks forward to being able to see other fully vaccinated shutins soon.

Worship Plans: On March 7th we had indoor worship with 26 in attendance. It was a 45-minute service and Cheryl provided beautiful music. Assistants, ushers, flowers, soloists are needed going forward. Pastor hopes to have some confirmation students to assist. Pastor continues to do worship on-line. 
