

A lot of positive changes have happened (or are happening now) in our City during 2019, starting with ridding downtown of the homeless encampment in front of the main library. The City is also partnering with the County on Education and has hired Zoie Saunders as

the City's Chief Education Officer. The Education Office was launched in April, 2019, engaging stakeholders in our community, striving for excellence in our schools (better schools-higher home values)! The new aviation program (Fort Lauderdale Aviation Academy) is a unique approach to learning opportunities, providing quality employees to a growing aviation industry in our community. The great thing about this type of program is that not only will a student graduate with the qualifications needed for a great paying job, he will also be graduating without any student debt! In addition to a pilot shortage, there is also a shortage of mechanics in the aviation industry. The Fort Lauderdale Aviation Academy is going to help fill that void. There is an expected increase of 23% (that's about 4000 jobs) of aviation jobs in Broward County, so the need for the program is there. The long term vision for the academy is to have a facility at the Executive Airport. There is also a need in the marine industry to have the same such program (lets hope we see a "Fort Lauderdale Marine Academy" in the near future).

The Riverland Road project will happen, and when it happens will be up to the powers that be. As of last month the MPO office advised us that they were down to two contractors to choose from. Unfortunately, when the TIGER grant was applied for, traffic calming measures were not included. The County's MPO office that is basically in charge of this project has heard our concerns over the need for traffic calming measures on Riverland Road. They can make Riverland Road look beautiful but if they can't slow down traffic, it will still be too dangerous for bicyclists and joggers.

By the time you receive this newsletter, the Sablich's (on Whale Harbor Lane) should probably be ready to "flip the switch" on their awesome light display for the holidays (it keeps getting better and better)! And what's "the buzz" on Sugarloaf Lane? It's birds and bees of course! If you're out and about during the daytime, check out Isabel and Ernie's front yard (2449 Sugarloaf). Isabel and Ernie have created a pollinator-friendly yard, and they're happy to chat with you if you are interested in creating your own bee, butterfly and bird friendly yard!

Blue Crab Testing

Deceased Iguanas in the Canals

Most people in the neighborhood seem to agree that a dead iguana is a good iguana. We are not taking sides on this issue, except to note that almost every day we see iguanas who have met their demise floating in our waterways. These iguanas have invariably been shot while up in a tree by someone with an air rifle. They end up falling into the canal, and as they decay they contribute to the nutrient load which in turn can help to trigger blue-green algae. Please note that it is illegal to discharge any kind of firearm including air rifles within the City of Fort Lauderdale. (City Code Sec. 16-52) If you kill an iguana by any means, bag it and put it in the trash, not in the canal.



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Aggressive Dogs and Negligent Owners

On September 1st, my wife was walking our Chihuahua, Jellybean down Key Largo Lane. He was on a leash, not barking, not bothering anyone. Suddenly, a pitbull jumps out of a truck at 2610 Key Largo Lane and savagely attacked and killed Jellybean. For any of you who have lost a beloved pet, you know the anguish and despair you feel when you lose a be-

loved family member. A big thanks to all of our neighbors for your support during this period.

The police showed up and wrote a report. A copy of the police report was sent to Broward Animal Care. The pit-bull owner was distraught and apologized for the attack. He came by later and apologized to my wife. My wife told the owner we could not bring back Jellybean, but wanted to make sure his dog would not attack any other dog or person. The owner said he was sending the pit-bull to the vet for training. My wife and I were determined to make sure this vicious dog does not attack anyone else, so we followed up with Animal Care to insure everything that could be done to address this was being addressed. Animal Care seemed somewhat dysfunctional. I ended up speaking with five different people at Animal Care to try to understand the proper procedures needed to insure this vicious pit-bull was properly handled. Animal Care, 11 days later, cited the owner for not hav-

ing the pit bull on a leash and made a mandatory muzzle order. My wife was given a summons to appear in court to testify as a witness for the citation, which was to be held 7 months later in March. The citation was for not having the dog on a leash with a \$500 fine.

The concern of my wife and I, along with the neighbors, was this dog is obviously dangerous/aggressive and the owner was negligent in controlling this dog. In speaking with Animal Care, I was told since the pit-bull had not bitten anyone and had only killed my dog, they could not declare the pit-bull as being dangerous. I was told by Officer Mesa that neighbors should use means, such as base ball bats, to protect themselves from this pit bull, and there was nothing Animal Care could do until another attack occurs. Apparently, it takes two attacks or one person bite before the pit bull can be classified as dangerous. I was later told by Officer Goen, the supervisor of Officer Mesa, that she misspoke about the baseball bats. He said we should use a stick or some other non offensive means to prevent a charging pit bull from attacking you or your dog. That sounds downright silly. I later found out the Animal Care had contacted the pit bull owner and requested he respond to their request that the dog could be declared aggressive. He agreed to this designation, along with the mandatory muzzle order. Had he not agreed, then my wife would have been subpoenaed as a witness and requested to have this dog declared aggressive. The new homeowner at 2610 Key Largo Lane has decided not to move into the house, and it is up for sale. It appears at this time, that his pit bull will no longer be a threat to our neighborhood.

Obviously, the rules and procedures of Animal Care are confusing. To try to demystify this, I contacted Animal Care for clarification. Below, I will detail some of the responses I received from Animal Care.

The definition of an Aggressive dog can be found under Broward County Ordinance section 4-2-Definitions which reads "Aggressive dog shall mean any dog that, according to the records of the Division, has killed a domestic animal while unprovoked and off the owner's property."

4-11.5 specifies the requirements that must be met by an owner once a dog has been classified as "Aggressive" by the Division. It is also stated that the process/procedure for making this classification as the same as what is listed in 4-12 which is the process for a dog being classified as "Dangerous". For the initial determination/classification of an Aggressive dog as defined by the Ordinance a witness providing such evidence may be required to appear in a hearing should the dog be classified as Aggressive and a hearing is requested by the owner of the dog in in your particular case there is also a Muzzle Order in effect for question pursuant to 4-12 of the Ordinance.

The owner of a dog that has been notified of the Aggressive classification may either accept the designation and comply with The Hearing Officer makes a determination regarding whether registration requirements, or request a determination Hearing. Please note, this hearing is due to the Aggressive classification NOT due to citations being issued. A citation hearing is a completely separate hearing that is held to determine the validity of the Ordinance infraction that a pet owner was cited for. If an owner does request a hearing be held, then the require-

ments for registering a dog as Aggressive are suspended pending the outcome of the hearing. This does not mean that the dog is free to roam unrestrained however, as this would be a violation of 4-3 Dogs at Large Prohibited in the Broward Ordinance. Although the requirement of a muzzle is part of the Aggressive classification, this is not the only way that a muzzle order may be issued. The muzzle order that you are referring to, is one that was issued pursuant to Section 14.5 of the Broward County Ordinance.

Although Citation hearings may occur several months after the date of infraction for which the owner is being cited, the hearing that you are referring to is an Aggressive classification hearing which is completely separate from a citation hearing. The Aggressive classification hearing must requested within 7 days of the owner being notified. Once requested, the hearing must take place no sooner than 5 days and no later than 21 days from the date of request.

The lack of Aggressive classification does not preclude an owner from abiding by Section 4-3 "Dogs at Large Prohibited", the dog in question regardless of the outcome from the classification.

or not the dog in question is to be classified as "Aggressive" as defined in the Broward County Ordinance. Once this determination is made, the owner has 14 days to comply with the requirements outlined in Section 4-11.5




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Another Jewel in Our Neighborhood – Riverland Preserve

Green Thumb Remedies for your Garden

For many of us, the struggle of keeping a green and flowering garden without using pesticides or insecticides is quite the challenge. While all insects and snails have their place within the ecosystem, when

they take over your planters, it is hard to keep calm. Additionally, finding easy do-it-yourself formulas, that won't kill everything that comes in contact is even harder. Following are a few recipes, that proved to have great results on potted plants.



When snails decide to feas on your plants, as a first step a great deterrent, simply apply egg shells on top of soil. When the rough surface starts to fail, try the following tonic formula:

1 can of beer

1 tablespoon of sugar

1 teaspoon of baker's yeast

Mix the above ingredients in a bowl, and let them sit for 24 hours. Then pour the

mixture into a shallow aluminum or glass container, and set in your planter or around your garden. You'll catch lots of snails.

When using a pest control spray inside your home, we want to make sure it's as harmless to people and pets. Ingredients:

½ cup of cooking oil

1 teaspoon of baking soda

1 cup of water

Mix the oil and baking soda in a small bowl. Then combine 2 teaspoons of this mixture with 1 cup of water in a hand-held sprayer, and fire away when ready to send pests packing.

For those of you who have a freshwater aquarium, when you change the water in your tank, save the old water and feed it to your potted plants. The fish have added the best natural fertilizer that you could ever have.

For weeds, try the following mix/ingredients:

1 tablespoon of gin

1 tablespoon of white vinegar

1 tablespoon of baby shampoo

1 quart of warm water





Pollinators Garden

Some time ago, an MBA student in a class I teach on Sustainability Mindset created a project to grow organic cucumbers. He soon realized that his plants were not giving fruit because there were no bees to pollinate them! He researched the problem and decided to "hand pollinate" them with Q Tips. This certainly would not be a viable solution for a regular production, but it was his firsthand experience with a situation he had only read about. While pesticides impact the bee population, they are not the only pollinators impacted. Alongside come butterflies, dragonflies, worms, ladybugs, moths, and many other insects, who play equally important roles.



Living on Sailfish Canal, we have witnessed the algae blooms that proliferate with the runoff of fertilizers used to keep the yards nice and "clean". While we appreciate the beauty of manicured gardens, as a professor of Sustainability I came to think how we could create a beautiful space that would also be ecofriendly, that would not require pesticides, fertilizers, special irrigation nor lawn mowers. Using the concept of prairies, and inspired by a Fort Lauderdale park that had such a section, my husband Ernie and I decided to design a Pollinators Garden in our front yard. We consulted with the Florida Wildflower Foundation on plants that were native and appropriate to our soil, and planted some seeds plus some small butterfly attracting flowers. We decided to stop cutting the lawn and discovered that the crabgrass actually was naturally kept in control by its other competing plants. After a few weeks, flowers are covering the grounds,





without any planting from our side, probably birds did that job? We added some color with a few higher plants, and it is great to see that even as we are ready to transfer them from pot into the soil, bees and butterflies start to circle!

We had a sign made to indicate what is going on here – because we may find prairies beautiful when driving out of town, but may not be expecting to see a prairie-like yard on our street, and this may look "unattended". But it isn't!

The story of the student led to many conversations in class and in other classes, and students were inspired to start organic farming, create neighborhood vegetable gardens in the yards of some willing property owners, and above all, it made everyone more aware of how we could create beauty while promoting healthy ecosystems.

We welcome neighbors interested in this to stop by and chat! We can also tell you about getting the sign.
