2:00 p.m. Update Pueblo, CO #PuebloCOVID19

- We as a community support Governor Polis Executive Order D2020 017 **Ordering Coloradoans to Stay at Home Due to the Presence of COVID-19 in the State.** Today Sheriff Kirk M. Taylor and Public Health Director Randy Evetts will work with community leaders to review and make guidelines for Pueblo.
- March 26, 2020 was Pueblo’s first death due to COVID-19 of an 81-year-old woman.
- To date COVID-19 testing, in Pueblo County:
 - There have been 254 tests administered in Pueblo County. Currently it is taking seven or more days for test results to be reported to Pueblo’s Public Health.
 - 32 of the 90 tested at the State Fair Grounds are received
 - 31 negatives
 - 1 positive, from Douglas County
 - 1 test sample was not able to be processed
 - 57 test samples still pending from State Fair Grounds
 - 86 tests previously sent from Pueblo County have been returned with negative results.
 - 69 tests are pending (not including test from the State Fair Grounds)
 - 10* tests previously sent have been returned with positive results, seven from Pueblo County, one from Crowley County, and one from Huerfano County, one from Douglas County.

*Please note, results are not all Pueblo County residents. Pueblo’s hospitals serve and test individuals from outside of Pueblo County.

- Pueblo School District 60 announced Grab-and-Go Meals resuming Monday, March 30 as well, now at 8 sites. More info is at puebloemergency.info.
- School District 70 announced Grab n’ Go meals (lunch and breakfast resume Monday, March 30, 2020. Meals are served Monday-Thursday, more information puebloemergency.info.
- Currently Pueblo has as no curfews related to the Governor’s Stay At Home order.
- City of Pueblo Fire Department is following their Non-Transport Guidelines. For the duration of the pandemic emergency, Pueblo EMS and AMR units responding to patients complaining of COVID-like symptoms will be asked a series of

questions. Based on the response to the questions, the patient may be directed to stay at home with a set of instructions for home-based self-care.

- 2-1-1 phone call service can help anything related to community resources which includes:
 - Basic Needs-food, shelter, etc.
 - Unemployment information
 - Transportation
 - Child care
 - Mental health
