PURCHASING K9 DOG

The Prairieland Standard Schnauzer Club of Central Illinois (PSSC) provides a variety of projects in support of animals. One project it is closely monitoring is the possible grant funding in 2023 from the AKC Reunite Adopt a K-9 Cop (www.akcreunite.org/k9) to purchase police K-9s. A police dog is specifically trained to assist members of law enforcement. The commonly used breeds are German Shepherds and Belgian Malinois.

PSSC has been in contact with Lieutenant Jon Albee, Patrol Division Commander of the McLean County Sheriff's Office. He supervises their K9 Unit. He is a previous

handler and has been fortunate enough to train with several other agencies including the National Police Canine Foundation. The McLean County Sheriff's Office currently has 2 dogs and plan to add in the near future a 3rd dog. Lieutenant Albee informed PSSC that they are looking at purchasing a dog in the coming year and would very much appreciate any grant money to aid in the purchase of the dog, equipment, and training.

PSSC will work with Corn Belt KC, the local all-breed club that hosts the dog shows over memorial weekend, to secure the grant once grant funds again become available and do community fundraising for the purchase and equipping of the K-9 officer.

Does a Dog Recognize a Person's Face?

Dogs do recognize people that they have seen before. . . by face, or smell or the person's whole being.

My ex-neighbors moved away from me and got a dog, a yellow lab mix. She was very sweet, but liked to run down the street all the time, and their neighbors always threatened to call Animal Control on them, and have Sabrina picked up, so they found a new home for her.

Sometime later, I was visiting a friend of mine that I hadn't seen in a while. She had a new dog named Bree, and every time that I visited, Bree was always hanging around me, right in front of me, always looking at me right in my face.

Why do dog experts say not to punish a dog as they can't remember anything; yet they hide in the bedroom after tearing through the trash?

Actually that "guilty" behavior you're seeing is your dog beautifully displaying what are called **calming signals**.

You may notice when your dog doing some or all of these when you're being too (to a dog) confrontational.

- -Turning the head away
- -Head down
- -Licking the tongue out
- -Yawning
- -Sniffing a spot on the floor

You may even notice that your dog sometimes licks and looks away from the camera/phone when you want to take pictures. The camera and you aiming right at him is just naturally a little uncomfortable to most dogs. They tolerate it fine but you might have to make a noise or hold something to distract them into looking.

Calming signals are how dogs prevent and resolve social issues. These behaviors are how they de-escalate confrontation. Your dog is trying to calm you and make everything ok again. Not because of what he's "done" but because from a dog's perspective, you're acting very confrontational, even if you are giggling too. Punishing after the fact because you, as a human, take his correct canine communication skills as straight guilt, will only cause stress and possibly traumatize your dog and put stress on your relationship. It certainly won't keep your dog from raiding the trash in the future. Honestly, the best solution for that is a trash can with a lock, and sufficient exercise and different, appropriate activities to keep your dog happy and out of trouble.
