
# West Branch Friends December, 2019

An interview between Roscoe and his pastor!

#### What is your favorite Christmas Hymn?

"I think 'Silent Night' would be pretty close" (and then he proceeded to whistle it for me:)!

#### What is your favorite Christmas Carol?

"Jolly Old St. Nicholas" is about as good as I can come up with. I don't tend to pick favorites, really....they're all some that I know and can sing and whistle."

Were you ever in Christmas programs at Springdale Friends? "Oh, well, yes. There was always a nativity scene, but I don't remember what part I ever had."

#### What was your favorite gift as a child?

"We didn't give many store bought gifts when I was a child, but Dad made me something – some kind of a little wheeled cart, a tricycle of some kind, all

made of wood, even the wheels. I don't know how he made the wheels round, like they should be, but I was pretty young and that was something that really took my eye."

**Favorite gift as an adult?** "As an adult, I've been around a long time and just having the family at home was a big deal. I think that was the best gift since our family got scattered, like when I was in high school; and just having everybody home was the best. Of course there were always ties, shirts, and socks, you know!" (said with a laugh).

**Did you always have a Christmas tree?** "We always had a Christmas tree; sometimes it was the darn cedar tree from the pasture or ditch, but we always had some kind of tree. The cedar trees weren't the nicest, by a long shot. Helen and I had about a six-foot high artificial tree about the last 15 years of our life together. Same one, of course!"

What part of the Christmas Story in the book of Luke do you connect with the most? "The babe in the manger, of course....the cattle are lowing, the poor baby wakes...no crying he makes. Just the calm setting."

**Do you have a favorite Christmas decoration?** "The star, of course, which is the Light which I follow."

#### Do you have any good advice for the best gifts parents might give their children?

"Clothing and boots don't seem like gifts to a lot of kids, but warm clothing and boots – something that's useful and durable and will last longer than just through the holidays would be the best things. And give your clergy a hug!" (Said with a laugh and a grasp of my hand!)

# Favorite Meeting Recipes The Best Steak Ever! By Larry Reiner

## Hello, Friends!

As I write this letter, October is coming to an end. My wonderful boss Eden is here for the week. We are planning a flurry of meetings and joyous conversations. We are getting ready for the bittersweet departure of our extraordinary Living Letters volunteers, Adrian Bishop and Rosalie Dance (bitter because we have to say goodbye – sweet because they will get to see people they miss). We are all well into the rhythm of the school year, and we're enjoying those few weeks in the fall semester between settling down from the many Belizean holidays in September and the impending excitement of Christmas projects.

In this moment, I'm sitting in my office, listening to a songbird twittering a melody over the bass line of an idling truck engine, punctuated with occasional passing vehicles. I can hear the kids from our school laughing and talking while they enjoy their morning snack (provided by USFWI). The window is open – the air coming through is cool after a much needed downpour this morning. My children are at their school, my husband is at home working at his company remotely.

Two things rise to my mind when I think of the month that has passed. One is the amazing outreach event that we hosted last weekend. The other is the work that Adrian and Rosalie have done. (Continued on next page)

#### **Outreach Project**

Oscar, the pastor here and my colleague at Belize City Friends Center, wrote an engaging and thorough description of the outreach event in his recent newsletter, which you can read by <u>clicking on this link</u>. Here I will give you a quick sketch of the event from my perspective.

On October 19, Belize City Friends Center hosted an outreach event held by Belmopan Nazarene Church. The group came from Belmopan, the capital of Belize, which is about an hour from Belize City. They brought lawyers, counselors, a medical team (including doctors, a nurse, and a pharmacist), groceries, clothing, and shoes. The day ended with an enthusiastic streetside worship service. Teams of people went into the neighborhood in the morning to let people know what was happening, and a steady stream of people came all through the day to access the holistic services the group provided.

It was really amazing for me to see a group from a different city in Belize come to benefit our community. I'm grateful to them for coming and to Oscar for coordinating with the group for the use of our space. Oscar went out with one of the teams that walked through the Southside neighborhood to publicize the event. It was an unusually hot day, and Oscar told me that people in many of the homes he visited offered him cold water. "What could be better on a hot day?" he said. I love that our neighborhood was ministering to this group, even while the group was ministering to our neighborhood.

### I Go to Sing By Lindy Thompson

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I might be exhausted and the children might be cranky, but I will be going to church on Sunday.

Don't know who is preaching, doesn't matter — the sermon may be helpful or not, holds my attention or doesn't — it's the singing.

I go to sing.
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I get up,
get clean,
get dressed,
possibly get mad (at not-ready kids, at empty coffee pot, at traffic)
get going,
get there,
get seated,
get comfortable,
get focused
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and when the music starts,

get saved.

It's the singing. I go to sing.

It's the willingness to *stand if you are able*, the common agreement on page number, the voluntary sharing of songbooks with people on your row, even ones you rode there with –

but most of all,
it's the collective in-breath before the first sound is made,
the collective drawing upon the grace of God,
the collective, if inadvertent, admission
that we are all human,
all fragile,
all in need of the sustaining air, freely dispensed,
all in need of each other to get the key right and not sound discordant —

it's the hidden life-celebration in the act of making a joyful noise, all together.

We don't even have to sound that good. Singing together still brings home the *we*-ness of worship,

the *not-alone*-ness of life in God, the best of all we have to offer each other.

When we are singing, I think that I might actually be able to forgive you for being so terribly human, and you might be able to forgive me for being so terribly not there yet, and we might be able to find peace *now*, not postpone it for some heavenly hereafter but live and breathe it today, drawing in the grace of God, voicing out our need and hope and gratitude and longing.

When we are singing, I can feel the better world coming, and if I get to be a part of it, you do too . . .

so sing with me, and we'll make our way down that blessed road together, collectively better than we ever thought possible.
