for General Conference Points included in this document are provided as a summary of the recommendations to the special 2019 General Conference. For more information, please read the entire report from the Commission on a Way Forward.	Summary: This plan, preferred by a majority of the Council of Bishops, would remove restrictive language from the Book of Discipline that prohibits same-gender weddings in UMC properties and ordination of "self-avowed, practicing homosexuals." It would add langauge to protect churches and pastors who choose not to allow same-gender marriages.	Summary: This plan would replace the current jurisdictional conferences with three connectional conferences based on affinity: Progressive, Traditional and Unity. All 3 would use a general Book of Discipline (Articles of Religion, General Rules, Confessions of Faith) with the ability to adapt other portions to their context for ministry.	Summary: This plan, developed more fully toward the end of the Commission on a Way Forward process, broadens the definition of "self-avowed, practicing homosexual"; puts penalties in place for disobedience to the Discipline; and requires bishops, pastors and annual conferences to certify adherence to the Discipline.

January has been a month of deep conversations about what it means to be a United Methodist. I have found this very interesting, because I usually only have those conversations with kids in Confirmation Class, or with those who are thinking of becoming a member of the church. But this year, it seems that many others are joining in on the conversation. I believe this to be a good conversation, because our goals for the year are: "Love God and Your Neighbor...Tell Your Story of God in Your Life...Share with Others."

We tend to talk about loving God and neighbor in pretty generic terms—and it is much easier to love others when we don't talk about the particulars in others that may make us angry, sorrowful



or joyful. But when we get to the point of telling the story about how we have been loved by God and how we have loved others, we have to talk a lot more about the particular situations involved; and that is where the stories get both very interesting and complicated! Sometimes our conversations then get emotional and we may stop telling the stories of how God is in the process of transforming our lives.

To me, one of the most challenging things that has come out of these conversations is the emotional discussion of which Bible we read—and why. The pictures to the left show the various Bibles that I use for study and worship each week as I approach the texts for Sunday. I read from a variety of translations and interpretations because I cannot read the words from the original Hebrew, Greek, Latin or Aramaic in which they were written. I am dependent upon those who have done so, and I must trust that they have practiced due diligence in their study. I read a variety of translations and interpretations to help me better understand the story that the writer of that particular text is trying to tell. These books of the Bible are their story; and then once I

have read their story, it is up to me to understand what that story means for my life today. That is part of the work that, I believe, is the delight and responsibility of each disciple of Jesus. And, particularly as a United Methodist Follower of the Way, I am invited to reflect on the texts using the four-fold process called "The Wesleyan Quadrilateral" that uses Tradition, Experience and Reason to understand the scriptures. Even better, I am invited to read scripture in community with other believers, share my understandings and listen to theirs. This often results in new understandings about the way God is working in all of our lives.

This is not easy work—but it can be very rewarding. As I shared with the group who gathered on Sunday January 20th—I believe that every conversation ends with a "," or "…" because God is not finished with us yet. We are on our way to being "sanctified" and "made perfect in the love of God" each and every day; and it is important to not close the door on our conversations.

In case you are wondering about those words, they are more United Methodist "Speak" of how the grace of God works within us. If you want to know more, come and talk with me. I promise that I will listen with open ears and open heart, and that the conversation will remain open with possibilities...

## **RISE AGAINST HUNGER**

Many of our church youth and members were blessed to be a part of a group that gathered on Wednesday January 23rd at the Gothenburg High School and helped bag 180,000 meals for those less fortunate. This was the 5th year for this program. Rise Against Hunger is a wonderful organization that provides meals to those who are in need in this country and overseas. In the last 4 years the Gothenburg community has bagged over 100,000 meals and fed over 400,000 people. This organization gathers its funds from tow fundraisers and donations. A walking taco stand at the Living Out Loud concert and a soup



supper and silent auction in November. Donations are always being accepted. Each bag of food costs 35 cents and all materials are purchased with the donations and the monies raised from the fundraisers. We are always taking volunteers to help with fundraisers or the bagging. Thank you to those who donated this past year and volunteered.
