## God's Encouraging Word ... *when I am tired*

Sleep experts advise getting seven to eight hours of sleep a night. We need rest for our tired bodies to recuperate.

Even on the most regular day, life is draining. The work day is long and the demands are great. The commute, getting the kids to school, work schedules, meeting deadlines, grocery shopping, getting dinner ready, children's activities, only to get ready to do it over again the next day. Getting older doesn't help matters. By the time you hit the pillow at night you may feel like a smart device that has only 2% battery life left.

But what do you do when you become tired emotionally? It's the exhaustion that comes from strained relationships, heated arguments and being rejected by those from whom you want acceptance.

Then there's that inner weariness—the kind that no one else knows you have except you. The weariness that comes from the burden of sin and guilt. It comes when you must live in the brokenness of past mistakes. When things don't go so well on any given day, you wonder if God is angry and out to get you. The earthly consequences of your sins and knowledge of your guilt is...well...spiritually tiring.

God comes to you today with an encouraging word recorded in the book of Isaiah: **The LORD is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom. He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak.**

The LORD is the everlasting God. He is the Creator. He never gets tired. He has perfect understanding; he knows what it's like when you feel tired for any reason at all. He promises to give strength to you when you're tired. The LORD God is Jesus, your Savior. He took your sins and guilt to the cross and died for you. It's a fact! Jesus took your sins and guilt away from you, buried it all in his tomb, and rose from the dead. Your sins are forgiven. That's rest—rest for your soul. Talk about strength for the weary!

And don't forget! It's the LORD God who gives the blessing of physical rest too. It's been said that a clean conscience is a good pillow. God gives you this clean conscience in Jesus Christ. He also provides you with home, food, and bed to become recharged to tackle the new day with all its challenges. So do it with all the energy and strength that Lord God gives you as his own through faith in Jesus!

Ten years ago, you, the members of St. John's, sent me on the trip of my life to Israel. Now I am inviting you to come back with me. That's right! In January of 2020, my father (Pastor Philip Schupmann of Aurora, IL) and I will be hosting a professionally guided trip to Israel with Imagine Tours.

What would we be doing in Israel? Simply put, we would be walking where Abraham, Issac, Jacob, King David, the disciples, and Jesus walked. It is not only a scenic trip but an opportunity to have the scriptures pop in a way that you never dreamed of before. You'll see the river where Jesus was baptized. Stand upon Mt. Carmel and see where God lit Elijah's altar on fire from heaven. You will travel the Palm Sunday path to the Temple. You will pray as Jesus did in the Garden of Gethsemane and stand in silence in the hole where Jesus was held before his trial before Pilate. You will see thousands of people who do not know Jesus, as the Savior of the World and your heart will be broken as you see the place where he was crucified. Your heart will leap for joy as you see the empty tomb. Need I say anymore...

On October 20 at 6:00 PM, I will have a presentation on the trip to Israel and will try to answer any questions that you may have. If you are considering going, even just a little bit, I would encourage you to attend. If you can't make that presentation I will host other presentations in November and beyond as needed. If you have any friends or relatives that you want to bring with please do so. Our goal is to grow in our faith as we study God's Word in Israel and walk where Jesus walked.

**DAY 1 – MONDAY, JANUARY 20: DEPART U.S.A.**

Tour members meet for our flight to Israel. After dinner is served, sit back and relax, enjoying the on-board entertainment as you prepare for this exciting adventure of a lifetime, walking where Jesus walked.

**DAY 2 – TUESDAY, JANUARY 21: ARRIVE IN TEL AVIV, JAFFA, CAESAREA, MT. CARMEL, TIBERIAS**

We arrive in Tel Aviv and transfer to our motor coach for a drive to Jaffa, the home of the Jonah and Peter's stories (Jonah 1, Acts 9 & 10), then we will proceed to Caesarea, where Peter proclaimed the Good News to the Roman Centurion (Acts 10). We proceed to visit Mt. Carmel where Elijah prayed, and God defeated 450 prophets of Baal with fire from heaven (1 Kings 18). Time permitting, we'll stop at the Druze Village for a short lunch break (not included). Then, we drive to our hotel in Tiberias in time for dinner and overnight.

**DAY 3 – WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 22: MAGDALA, NAZARETH VILLAGE, HOME OF JESUS, MEGIDDO**

After breakfast, we drive along the Sea of Galilee to Magdala, where we see the new excavations and the ancient synagogue. We continue via Cana (John 2) to Nazareth (Luke 1 & 2) with a special visit to Nazareth Village. A short drive takes us to the Mt. of Precipitation, the traditional site where an angry mob attempted to throw Jesus off the cliff after his bold proclamation in the Nazareth synagogue. The site offers a panoramic view of the patchwork Jezreel Valley and Mount Tabor (Luke 4:16-30). We visit the Church of Annunciation, where the Angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she would give birth to Jesus. Afterwards, we continue to the Sisters of Nazareth convent to see the newly-discovered site of the home of Jesus. Our last stop is the national park of Megiddo, also known as Armageddon. We return to Tiberias for dinner and overnight.

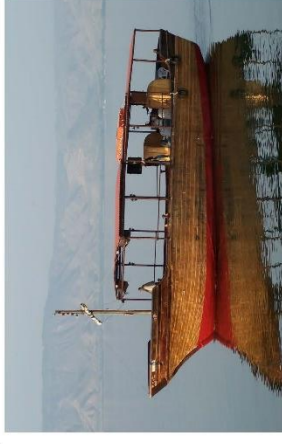
**DAY 4 – THURSDAY, JANUARY 23: GOLAN HEIGHTS, CAESAREA PHILIPPI, DAN, BEIT SHEAN**

After breakfast, we travel north for the Golan Heights and view the area from a special lookout. We drive to Caesarea



Philippi, where Peter made the good confession of Christ as "the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:13-16). We have a short

hike/walk to Tel Dan, where we see the altar of Jeroboam. Then, we will drive to Gideon Springs (if time permits). Afterwards, we visit Beit Shean, one of the best-preserved Decapolis Roman cities. In Beit Shean, the bodies of King Saul and his sons were hung from the city walls after they were defeated by the Philistines (1 Samuel 31:10-12). Dinner and overnight are in Tiberias.



**DAY 5 – FRIDAY, JANUARY 24: GALILEE, TABGHA, MT. OF BEATITUDES, CAPERNAUM, BOAT RIDE, GADARA, KASER EL YAHUD, JERUSALEM**

There is nothing like watching a sunrise on the Sea of Galilee from our hotel. We begin our sightseeing with a drive to Tabgha, Primacy of Peter, and the Mt. of Beatitudes (Matthew 5-7), with time for reflection and worship. We then head to Capernaum (Jesus' base for His early ministry). Afterwards, we board a replica wooden "Jesus Boat" for our boat ride on the Sea of Galilee. We also have an opportunity to see the recently excavated boat from the time of Jesus. Our lunch stop features the option of the special St. Peter's Fish for those interested (not included). Next, we see Gadara, and if time permits, we'll include a short visit to Bethsaida. We then drive along the Jordan valley to Kaser El Yahud baptismal site on the Jordan River near Jericho. Afterwards, we ascend to the majestic city of Jerusalem in time for dinner and overnight. "I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord.' Our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem" (Psalm 122:1-2 NASB).

**DAY 6 – SATURDAY, JANUARY 25: MASADA, EIN GEDI, QUMRAN, DEAD SEA SWIM/FLOAT**

After breakfast, we drive to Masada, ascending the wilderness mountain by way of cable car to the fortress built by King Herod. Here, we survey the

ruins of fortifications, waterworks, the synagogue, temples and palaces. Nearby, we visit Ein Gedi, where David hid from King Saul. From here, we make our way to Qumran and the settlement of the first-century sect known as the Essenes, authors of the Dead Sea Scrolls. We will make a special stop at the Dead Sea (the lowest spot on earth) for a short swim. We then drive back up to Jerusalem. If time permits, we will include a visit to Jericho. We have a brief stop along the Wadi Kelt to view the "Valley of the Shadow of Death." The road from the Dead Sea area to Jerusalem is an ascent of 4,000 feet in 13 miles. Dinner and overnight are in Jerusalem.

**DAY 7 – SUNDAY, JANUARY 26: MT. OF OLIVES, PALM SUNDAY ROAD, GARDEN OF GETHSEMANE, JEWISH QUARTER, TEMPLE MOUNT, SOUTHERN STEPS, BETHLEHEM**

We begin the day on the beautiful Mt. of Olives to behold the breathtaking panorama of the Holy City. Our pilgrimage proceeds down the Old Palm Sunday Road to the Garden of Gethsemane with its ancient olive grove, and the Church of Agony, where tradition holds that Jesus prayed. We enter Jerusalem and walk to the holiest site in the whole Jewish world, the Western (Wailing) Wall of Herod's temple. Beyond the wall lies



the 35-acre temple area purchased by King David (2 Samuel 24:18-25). On this site now stands El-Aksa Mosque, and the magnificent Dome of the Rock (the third holiest shrine in Islam). From the temple area, we make our way to St. Stephen's Gate, to walk the Via Dolorosa – including St. Anne's Crusader Church, Pools of

Bethesda, the Pavement (where Jesus stood while being tried by Pilate), Ecce Homo Arch, and the ancient Cardo. We continue to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. A short walk takes us to stand on the original steps that Jesus walked on as he entered the Temple area. We conclude our sightseeing with a visit to Bethlehem. Here, we will pass by Rachel's tomb on the outskirts and visit the Church of the Nativity and Shepherd's Field. Dinner and overnight are in Jerusalem.

**DAY 8 – MONDAY, JANUARY 27: CITY OF DAVID, RABBI'S TUNNEL, ST. PETER GALLICANTU, GARDEN TOMB**

After breakfast, we visit the City of David, and then we go on a short walk through Hezekiah's Tunnel (conditions permitting). Be sure to bring a flashlight and water shoes to walk through the tunnel. Anyone wanting to stay dry can walk through Hezekiah's shaft. If time permits, we will visit the newly excavated Pool of Siloam. Then, we head back to the Western Wall to visit the Rabbi's Tunnel. From here, we continue to the Church of Agony at St. Peter Galllicantu. Afterwards, we visit Golgotha and the Garden Tomb for worship. Dinner and overnight are in Jerusalem.



**DAY 9 – TUESDAY, JANUARY 28: SHRINE OF THE BOOK, MODEL CITY, ELAH VALLEY, YAD HASHMONA, FAREWELL DINNER**

After breakfast, we begin our sightseeing with a visit to the Shrine of the Book Museum, where the Dead Sea Scrolls are displayed. We then see the fascinating 1:50 scale model of Jerusalem as it would have appeared in Jesus' time. We continue to the Elah Valley, where David slew Goliath. We will proceed to Yad Hashmona Biblical Village for a first-hand look at living in the times of Jesus. Then, we travel back to our hotel in Jerusalem for our Farewell Dinner and last overnight.

**DAY 10 – WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 29: DEPART FOR U.S.A.**

This morning, we transfer to the airport for our flight home. At the close of an unforgettable tour, we take home wonderful memories of the Old and New Testament, a renewal of our faith, and a greater understanding of the life of our Lord.

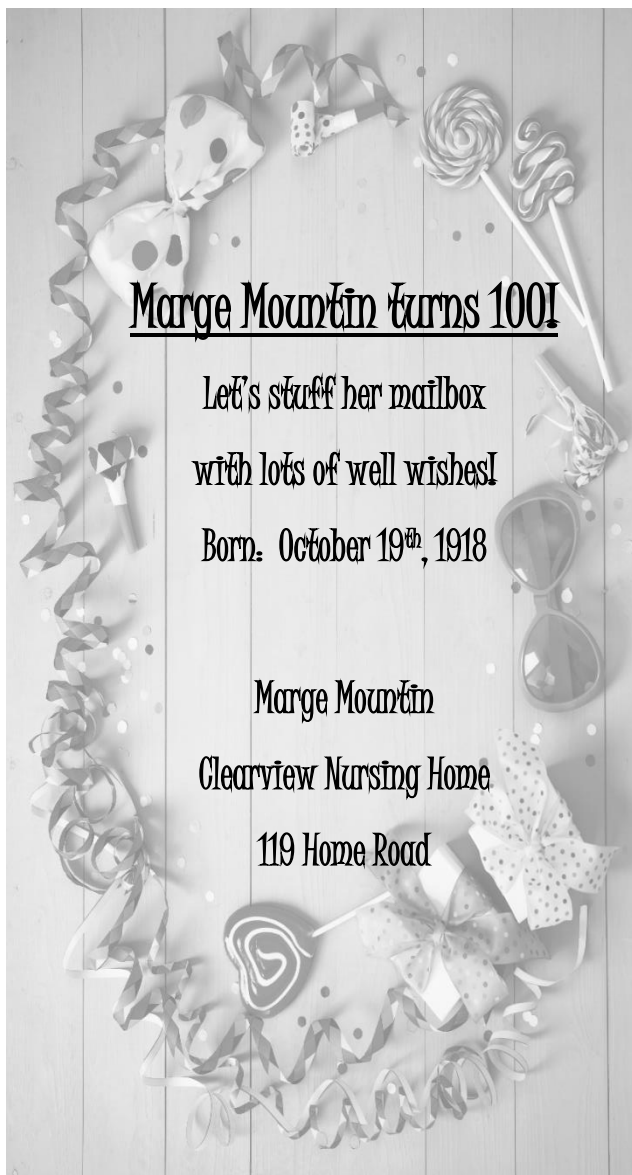

# Ten Fascinating Facts About Luther's Catechism

Many of us have handled a copy of Luther's Small Catechism before, but do you know how and why this crucial tool for Christian education came to be? Check out a list of ten fascinating facts about Luther's catechism below. You might learn something new!

1. The word *catechism* is derived from the ancient Greek word *katekheo* which means "to teach by word of mouth." One of the root words, *ekheo*, means "to sound or resound," and this is also where English derives the word *echo*.

2. In 1520, nine years before the catechism was published, Luther published a work called *The Confessional Mirror of the Common People*. It studied the Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, and the Apostles' Creed—the first three topics of his catechism.

3. Altogether, Luther preached on the chief parts of the catechism for 12 years before the book itself was created.

4. Luther had recognized the need for a comprehensive book for religious instruction, but he did not personally take on the work at first. He commissioned others to compile the work before ultimately tackling it himself.

5. Luther was finally compelled to write his catechism after seeing the poor spiritual conditions of the congregations in Saxony, Germany.

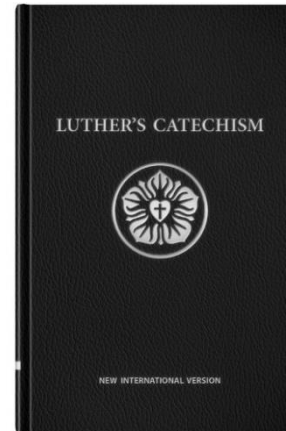
6. Because of its directness and clarity, Luther's Small Catechism was sometimes called the "children's Bible."

7. In addition to being printed as a book, parts of the Small Catechism were printed on posters or charts for use in the home.

8. The fifth main section of the catechism—the section detailing the Ministry of the Keys and Confession—was not included in the original catechism. It was added later and encourages both pastors and parishioners to share God's Word with others.

9. It is believed that the first English catechism printed in America was produced in 1749 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

10. Though it is often used in a classroom setting today, the catechism was originally meant for household use. You may notice that chief parts of the catechism begin with the phrase "As the head of the family should teach . . .", referring to this intended purpose.

## **Disasters provide opportunity to show Christian love**

Storm damage in Wisconsin has given WELS members the opportunity to show Christ's love in their communities.

On Aug. 20-21, more than 11 inches of rain fell in a 24-hour time period in Dane County. In some areas, residents were evacuated to higher ground. Homes and vehicles were flooded.

St. Andrew, Middleton, Wis., worked with WELS Christian Aid and Relief to provide help to their neighbors.

On Aug. 25, more than 200 volunteers coordinated by St. Andrew helped their community members clean up following the storm.

"As Christians, all our earthly possessions may be swept away in 35 minutes or less," says Elizabeth Zambo of Christian Aid and Relief, "but our faith, that is anchored to the Rock, will remain secure. These people that have experienced flooding are now being emotionally, physically, and spiritually challenged. I am always amazed when I see the people soon after the disaster strikes and then witness the changes that occur in their faith and attitude over the days, weeks, and months after the disaster. Not only do the people suffering from the flooding grow in their faith, but those who are assisting those in need realize they too are growing in their faith."

In a report to his members following the clean-up effort, Rev. Kelly Huet, a pastor at St. Andrew, noted, "Lives and communities were impacted today because of your love for Jesus." St. Andrew is continuing to offer help as homes are now being rebuilt.

On Aug. 28, 17 tornadoes touched down in Wisconsin, including one F2 tornado outside of Brownsville in Dodge County. The church property and parsonage of St. Paul, Brownsville, sustained damage from the high winds and downed trees, but no one was injured.

On Sept. 1, the congregation coordinated an effort with Christian Aid and Relief to offer aid to its neighbors who suffered damage from the storm and to help clear its property. The effort brought together 85 WELS members, including many from surrounding areas. Community members also joined in, as well as a group from Stillwater, Minn., who brought one of Christian Aid and Relief's trailers. These trailers are stocked with items such as chainsaws, generators, rakes, brooms, ropes, buckets, helmets, and gloves.

The Brownsville community was grateful for the volunteers' help. Many were overwhelmed by the number of trees that needed to be cleared from their property.

The congregation's rented worship facility lost shingles in the wind, allowing torrents of rain to destroy the ceiling and fill the worship space. Christian Aid and Relief is still awaiting reports regarding how other area WELS members and communities fared.

Rev. Bob Hein, chairman of Christian Aid and Relief, reported that Christian Aid and Relief approved a \$10,000 gift to Direct Relief, a secular relief organization that is providing immediate relief to people affected by Hurricane Florence. Hein reports, "We are also assessing ways to personalize our relief efforts by working through our churches in the affected areas."

### A Letter from Africa

"Give thanks unto the lord for he is good; his love endures forever".

Its Wednesday today and I woke up to a faint glimmer of hope. The tiny red light on the air conditioner in our bedroom was on, a sign that we still had power. But within a few minutes there was a click, the light faded out and the realization came that once again "No Power Wednesday", as we lovingly call it, was upon us. Rolling black outs and power outages in general have become common place here in Malawi. When you have rapid population growth and urbanization in what is often regarded as one of the poorest nations in the world, it is hardly surprising that the infrastructure cannot keep up with fast growing demand. Here in Lilongwe's area 10, where the Lutheran Mobile Clinic house is situated, we are relatively lucky and typically only have power outages once or twice a week, Wednesday seems to be our day. Over at the Lutheran Bible Institute, where our missionaries live, it's a different story. Theirs is a less affluent part of town and more often than not family supper is spent in candle light or with power supplied from a generator or battery inverter.

ESCOM (Electricity Supply Company of Malawi) isn't alone. Lilongwe's roadway infrastructure hasn't kept up with the growth in the number of vehicles. In fact, it is well understood that it is best not to travel from one side of town to the other during evening rush hour, because you will be driving at close to walking speed. There's even a rule of thumb when shopping: if you see something you might want, buy it now, because you just don't know when it might be in the store again.

People have come to expect many aspects of life here to be unreliable. They might get angry or complain from time to time but in general they shrug their shoulders and get on with it

So in a place where things that are taken for granted in the United States do not always work, its good know what does. At the villages where we hold clinics, people know that they can rely on the Lutheran Mobile Clinic to show up and to have the medical expertise and medicines they need for themselves and their families. They will see our nurses and staff demonstrating Gods love first hand. They will also hear God's word in a devotion before clinic, and will know that despite all else in their lives that they cannot rely on, that our Lord is always there to love and protect them with His saving grace - something we can all depend on and should be thankful for every day. I know I am.

Its evening now, and the power hasn't returned. Time me to fire up the generator. Something else to be thankful for.

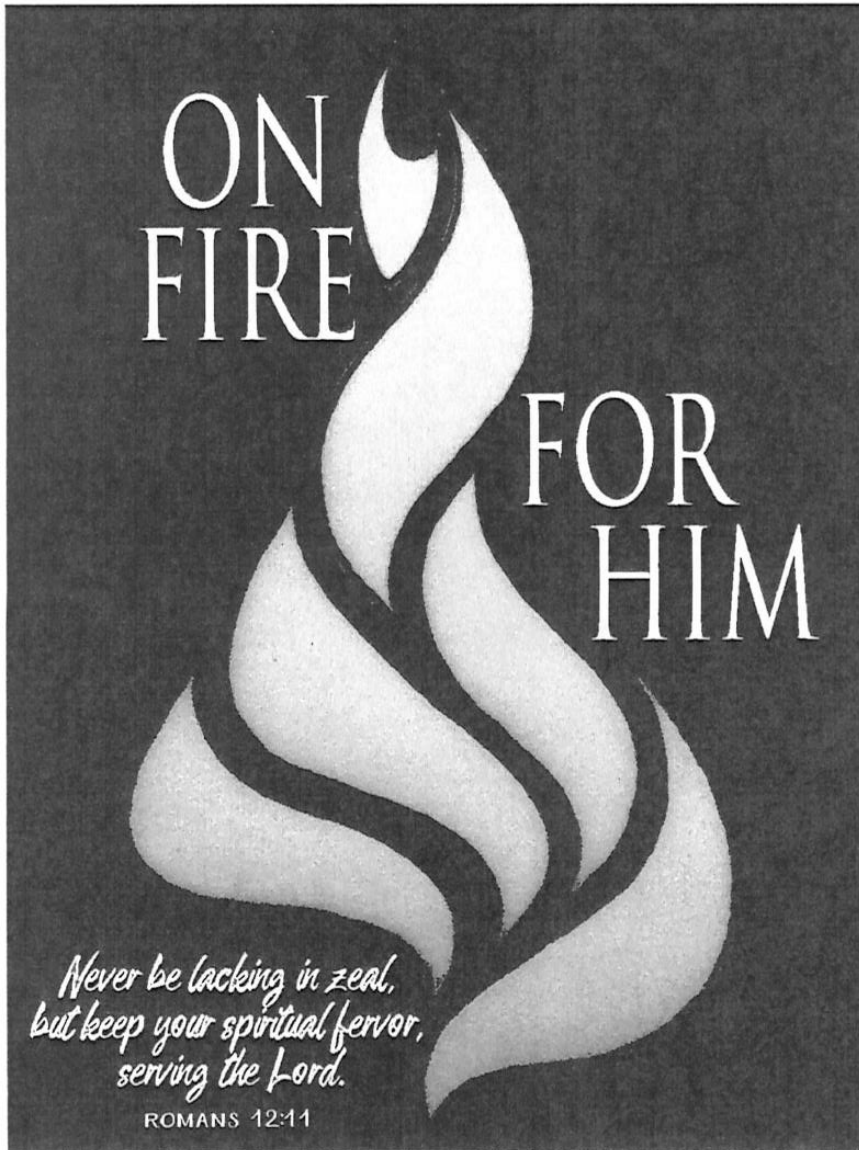
