THE JEW

Centuries of Persecution

From earliest days, the Jew has been a wanderer.

First heard of as a member of the Twelve Tribes of Israel. He settled in Palestine between 1000 and 2000 B. C. and established a monotheistic (Jehovah) code and civilization which marked him apart from the people of other gentile tribes.

The sufferings of the Jew began many years before the Crucifixion. Once was the Jewish nation in Palestine scattered by the might of Babylonia and rose again through the sheer forces of racial and religious solidarity.

Jewish independence was ended by the Roman Pompey in 63 B. C. Nearly 200 years later (in 135 A. D.) Jerusalem was completely destroyed by the Romans, and its Jewish inhabitants scattered over the earth.

Even before the destruction of Jerusalem, the Jew's career as an international trader and business man had taken him into Northern Europe and the Far East. Now he redoubled his efforts in those fields.

With the rise of Christianity, the Jew was made to feel that he was unwanted. During the middle ages, dislike turned into hatred and distrust as the Jew took up money lending at interest, a practice forbidden to Christians.

Prejudiced citizens of different countries never stopped to consider that the Jew took up money lending because he was forced into it by discrimination in other lines.

In 1209 the Jew was barred from England; in 1306 from France; in 1492 from Spain. Throughout Europe he was restricted to Ghetto districts and forbidden to live among Christians. Only in Poland and a few neighboring districts was the Jew tolerated; and even that tolerance was not to last.

The Netherlands, freed of Spanish rule, was the first European country to guarantee the Jew complete tolerance in 1579.

The Jew was formally readmitted to England by the hard-headed puritan dictator Oliver Cromwell, and has remained there since.

Meanwhile France, under Napoleon I, had already let down the barrier to Jews. The breaking of the Dreyfus Case (1895-99), a plot on the part of corrupt French Army officials to cover up espionage activities by pinning blame

upon a Jew, Dreyfus, removed opposition to Jewish penetration of French life.

The principles of modern anti-Semitism were formulated first in Germany in the 1880's, but practiced most actively in Tsarist Russia and Russia-controlled Poland. With the purpose of taking Russian citizens' minds off their troubles, pogroms, bloody massacres of Jews, were carried out under government sanction.

Under such circumstances, it is not surprising that large numbers of Jews migrated to the United States, where they have always been assured of physical safety. Migration began in 1818, at which time there was 3,000 Jews in the U.S. Today there are 4,500,000, constitut-3.58 per cent of the country's total population.

The rise of fascism in Europe, especially Germany, has resulted in new hardships and terrors for the Jews of today. In Germany and Austria he is beaten, deprived of citizenship, hopelessly exiled without funds.

Thus, 1800 years after being driven out of his native land, the Jew is still an exile in many parts of the world, unwanted, despised and abused.

Germany has repudiated the Jew and his countless contributions to her civilization. But she cannot repudiate her debt to him, and many thinking people wonder whether she, or any nation, can be as great without him.

Wasserman, Heine, Mendelssohn, Reinhardt, Meyerbeer, Schnitzler, Kreisler, Ehrlich, Lewisohn, Freud, and Einstein; these are but a few of the outstanding German or Austrian Jews whose contributions have helped make German culture renowned among nations.

HERE IS WHAT HAS HAPPENED TO THE GERMAN JEW

- 1. He has lost all rights and privileges of citizenship.
- 2. He cannot be a lawyer, doctor, judge, juror, executor, school teacher, journalist, or movie actor.
- 3. He cannot work for any mercantile or retail organizations.
 - 4. He cannot start or expand any business.
- 5. He cannot inherit land, deal in cattle and grain, advertise in newspapers or by radio.
 - 6. He cannot join a labor union.
- 7. He cannot join a sports organization; in some localities he cannot even fish, use public buildings, enter towns.

- 8. He cannot marry an "Aryan." Civil intermarriages already made have been nullified. One Jewish grandparent is legal proof of non-Aryanism.
- 9. He cannot keep company with an Aryan German girl. If seen with a Jew, the girl is also punished.
- 10. In schools and universities Jewish students are limited to 1.5 per cent of the enrollment. If a would-be student can stand firm against active hostility, he must carry a yellow admission card.
- 11. Every Jew, resident or foreign, having assets in Germany, must list all his possessions with the Nazi Government.
- 12. He cannot take any money from the country, consequently escape is practically impossible. Present plans indicate a confiscation of property for which he will be "recompensed" at a low valuation by non-transferable 3 per cent bonds.

In other words, Jews are not permitted to exist as human beings. Hounded, beaten, killed, they and their children are victims of a New Dark Age.

IT CAN HAPPEN IN AMERICA

Discrimination against Jews in the United States has reached the violent stage in only a few cases. But the American Jew is unwanted in many business concerns, hotels, country clubs, resorts and colleges.

Anti-Jewish propaganda is being spread countrywide via magazines, circulars, lectures and radio, while well organized groups like the Nazi Bund and Silver Shirts are stirring up race hatred.

Hard times may breed more serious resentment against the Jews. It has happened in other countries and can happen here!

Today the Jew still finds relative security in a few such countries as England, France, the U.S. and U.S.S.R., although there are forms of Jewish prejudice in all these countries.

In Soviet Russia the Government specifically combats anti-Semitism, but even there the Jew is persecuted for his religious belief and Zionist ideals.

JEW LOOKS TO PALSETINE AS A HOME LAND

Yet for centuries the Zionists, an intensely Jewish group, have advocated the return of the Jew to his native land. Little more than a dream at first, this movement became a reality when Britain, to gain the support of Jewry during the World War, issued the Balfour Declaration setting up in Palestine a national home for Jews.

To Palestine the hopes of many refugee Jews are turning today.

Jews from all nations have begun to return to their ancestral home, bringing with them the civilization and culture of the countries in which they have been living. Modern cities, irrigation, schools, a university, a seaport, and organized sports have made their appearance in this ancient land.

The Jews have long hoped that Britain would eventually relinquish the mandate which she now holds over Palestine, that the latter will some day become a Jewish state. However, Britain is bound by treaties to respect the rights of the 700,000 Arabs in Palestine, and the Arabs, despite the increased wealth which the Jews have brought, resent their intrusion.

Riots and bloodshed have resulted, and with each new arrival the situation becomes more strained. Even in his national home, the Jew is not free from persecution.

At present there are only about 400,000 Jews in Palestine, and Britain, to pacify the Arabs, has greatly reduced the immigation quotas. In 1935, the peak year, 61,000 Jews entered Palestine; between April and October of 1938 only 2000 capitalists (Jews with \$5,000 cash) and 1,000 laborers will be admitted. These immigrants will be permitted to take their immediate dependents.

Selections from long waiting lists are made by Zionist organizations in various countries, labor permits (permission to settle there) secured from a British consul. At the present time, immigrants retain their citizenship of the country from which they come, with Jewish citizenship a future hope.

But there are more than 16,000,000 Jews in the world; this year not more than 12,000 will be admitted to Palestine.

With the above information concerning the Jew and the latest word over the Associated Press, that they are being driven from Italy, we of course believe that the return of the Jews to Palestine means the close of the Gentile Age, the door of opportunity on christians, the door of mercy on sinners, the beginning of the

tribulation, the time of Jacob's trouble, the near reign of the Anti-Christ, climaxing with the great tribulation and the Battle of Armageddon, with Jesus Christ coming as King of Kings and Lord of Lords to destroy the armies of the world. With all these things before us our treasures should be in Heaven and our conversation should be pleasing to the Lord. We should strive to please the Master in all things. Let us not lift our consecration but make a deeper consecration to do the whole will of God.


