Four Helping Hand Projects

During Hurricane Sandy, and through the Christmas holiday, students, faculty, staff and alumnae reached out and helped others. Here are four stories.

Hurricane Sandy: The Rockaways

On November 11, 2012, Cabrinians partnered with Xavier High School to volunteer to assist victims of Hurricane Sandy in Far Rockaway. One group worked at a distribution center, which provides food, clothes and cleaning supplies to the community at no cost. This center was located in St. Francis Elementary School. As I walked the



halls and passed classrooms being used for legal assistance and first aid, I could not help but wonder about the students of this parochial school-turned-relief center. Where would they attend school now? When would they be able to return?

At the center, I met victims and volunteers who came from all walks of life. The youngest volunteer was nine and the oldest was in her 70's. Stewart was from New Rochelle and was volunteering with his two grown sons. Kendricka was a volunteer and victim of the storm who had a baby at home that needed supplies as badly as other



members of the community. Abby was an older woman who works at a hospital and immediately responded to the need she saw in Far Rockaway. Victims of the storm all had one thing in common: frustration...Just imagine: one day you could be living a normal life and the next you might be asking a stranger for a hand so that you could

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In addition to the work Elizabeth and her group did, other Cabrinians helped local homeowners clear their houses of storm damages.

Sr. Mary Ann Hawes, MSC, formerly Mother Anna of the Infant Jesus of Prague, celebrated her 65th Jubilee in the St. Frances X. Cabrini Shrine on Friday, April 12, and Saturday, April 13, 2013. She taught at Cabrini off and on through the 1950s and 1960s, and currently



serves as the school's Director of the Cabrini Ringers (handbell choirs), assists with the Cabrini Singers, and does fundraising through the school's Advancement Office.

She was born in Pasadena, CA and entered the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus on May

26, 1948, at Villa Cabrini Academy in Burbank, CA.

"When I was eight years old in third grade my mother was very ill with undulant fever and could not take care of me. My Godparents learned of Villa Cabrini Academy and I was placed there for one year. The Principal Moth-

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Two Alumnae Inducted into Hall of Fame

At the 2013 Annual Reunion, Gretta (O'Connor) D'Agostino '59 and Daphne (Fodor) Philipson '65 were inducted as members of the Mother Cabrini High School Hall of Fame. Annually, the Hall of Fame chooses alumnae and others who helped build community in the spirit of the school's founder, St. Frances X. Cabrini, MSC. D'Agostino helped establish four schools for autistic children and adults in Staten Island. Philipson helped pass the New York State Healthy Teens Act, and dedicated herself to improving the health and education of young women. The induction ceremony took place during the school's annual all-alumnae reunion on April 13, 2013, at the school.

Gretta D'Agostino has been active all of her adult life in making the world a better place for autistic children and adults. She has a son, Peter, now an adult, who is autistic, and for his benefit worked at establishing programs

to help him and other autistic people.

As a child, Peter lived at home in Staten Island for 22 years and attended Eden II day programs. Eden II provides young people with autism specialized community based programs and other opportunities with the goal of enabling them to achieve the highest possible quality of living across their life spans. As parents, Gretta and her husband helped establish adult programs and group homes for autistic youth and adults. Because of their efforts, there are four new schools for autistic people in Staten Island, serving preschoolers to adults. She continues to volunteer countless hours to help autistic people and has been publicly recognized by the Staten Island Borough President for her work with the Eden II School for autistic children.

Daphne Fodor Philipson is a regional and national supporter of women's health and education. In her early professional years, she earned a BA from Barnard College and a MBA from Columbia University, and then worked in finance for over 25 years, including as a Managing Director

at E. M. Warburg, Pincus & Co in New York.

One of her primary passions remains the education, health and well being of women of all ages. She is a pen pal to young girls in Africa and the Philippines, and has been generous, financially, to her high school alma mater and elsewhere. At Cabrini, she pays for college applications for cash-strapped seniors, provides tuition support for students, and helped remodel the school library. Outside of Cabrini, she is a member of the American Association of University Women and supports their Legal Advocacy Fund's campus projects in Westchester County. She also volunteers her time as Board Member of the Alumnae Association of Barnard College and is a founding Advisory Board Member of the Athena Center for Leadership Studies, an initiative at Barnard College dedicated to the advancement of women's leadership.

Ms. Philipson is also a member of the Women's Leadership Forum of the Democratic Party, and advocated for the passage of the Healthy Teens Act in Albany. The Act awards funds for school districts, boards of cooperative education services and community-based organizations to help them provide comprehensive health education programs for young people.

Reunion Class Gift

Each year, the anniversary classes collect money to make class gifts to the school. They do it as a way of saying "Thank you" for the education they received. When the gift is made, it is earmarked for a specific purpose.

This year, the classes of 1963 (50th) and 1988 (25th) made gifts. They talked among themselves for months and collected, per classmate, anywhere from \$5 to \$2,500.

The Class of 1963 collected \$5,568 for student financial aid. They remembered the struggles their own families had trying to pay the tuition.

The Class of 1988 collected \$2,125 to help the seniors graduate with dignity. Much of the money went to help cover prom expenses for students who struggle to afford shoe laces. The other funds helped cover last-minute tuition emergencies and the senior dinner, a very special culminating event.

From the students, faculty, staff and administration of Mother Cabrini High School, we thank the Class of 1963 and Class of 1988 for their tireless work of collecting from each other and reaching back to help today's students.

er Benedetta wrote a play on Mother Cabrini's life in which the High School and younger students performed. I never forgot the experience there."

St. Mary Ann's first mission was to teach kindergarten at Villa Cabrini in Burbank, and for the next 32 years she taught throughout the country grades 3-8, including at Mother Cabrini Elementary School, NYC; Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary Schools in Brooklyn; Mother Cabrini



High School, NYC; Sacred Heart Villa Academy, Seattle; and taught English and Religion at Villa Cabrini Academy, California; and Cabrini High School in New Orleans.

In 1981, she took on a new ministry at Cabrini Retreat Center, Des Plaines, IL, where she worked as support staff for five years.

She then served as Superior of the Senior Sisters at Sacred Heart Villa and later as Director of Volunteers at St. Cabrini Hospital

feed your baby or clean your kitchen.

At the center, I collected empty cardboard boxes that cluttered areas so that they could be crushed, emptied a classroom of everything it contained because of possible contamination, and became a "runner"—a person who runs supplies from the warehouse to the section they belong in on the main floor.

Hurricane Sandy: Belmar, NJ

On Saturday, November 17, 2012, 100 students, alumnae, faculty and staff went to the seaside town of Belmar, NJ. There they worked to help eight different families in the rigorous work of removing debris and addressing water damage in homes that had as much of six feet of water in them after the storm.

The following is an excerpt of a letter of gratitude we received from a couple we helped in Belmar: Donald and Nettie Aker: "When you came to our home in 8th Ave. with the group of girls...we had no idea what could be done. In a matter of hours the two bedroom apartment, which was destroyed by Sandy, was emptied out of everything moveable.

The strength and willingness to help was unbelievable. They saw first hand some of the minor damage the storm had caused and their minds and hearts were set on a job to be done."

Immediately following the storm, a group of alumnae from the 1990s

bumped into each other at George Washington High School in Washington Heights, the public high school closest to Cabrini. The alumnae were there to help local residents stranded at the school's shelter after their homes had been flooded. The group distributed clothing and food and offered emotional support. News about their work came to us through Silvia Cabreja, '98, whose whole family showed up to help.
