

relationship with others. Every time I encounter another person, a question is being put to me - what is the Lord asking of me at this moment?





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At our most recent Evangelism/Stewardship team meeting, we had a long discussion about how many members we've not seen for a while. Here are some thoughts from the Ebersoles.

CH__CH: Are you missing?

Way back in the late 1970's, almost before time began (ha!), Jane and I were living in Columbus while I was going to optometry school at Ohio State. We drove to and from CH:
Findlay for visits with parents and friends on a fairly regular basis. On the way down route 23 somewhere near the Vanlue exit there was a sign that always caught or eyes. It read Ch__ch, what's missing? We often commented that it was clever, but was it needed? Our churches were full and active, often on special Sundays like Easter being so full that chairs had to be put in the aisles. Fast forward to today. What has changed?

Has God changed? Is He giving us a pass from gathering on Sundays and offering up praise and thanksgiving to Him as only we can do as a group?

In his book *Mere Christianity*, C.S. Lewis points out that our world is really "enemy-occupied territory" meaning that Satan has overtaken it. "Christianity is the story of how the rightful king [Jesus] has landed and is calling us to take part in a great campaign of sabotage. When you go to church you are really listening to the secret wireless from our friends: that is why the enemy (Satan) is so anxious to prevent us from going. He does it by playing on our conceit and laziness and intellectual snobbery."

Is it important to gather with our church family and reach up in praise to God? Is it appropriate to use a liturgical service completely bible based? Are we really, when gathered as a group, joining in with the heavenly host, altogether singing praises to God? Of course, the answer to all of this is yes! We <u>need</u> to gather, to worship, and fight together for God's purposes.

2 cups sugar
2 sticks of butter, melted
1 ¹/₂ cups flour

2 teaspoons vanilla

Happy Easter from Your Social Ministry Committee!

As is customary, the Social Ministry Committee is responsible for designation of various funds to our ministry partners both locally and globally.

A few updates the group wanted to share with the congregation this spring are the distribution of the Opal and Tell Thompson benevolence funds and the free will collection received during the Lenten Soup Suppers.

After much discussion, the committee decided that our Soup Supper collections would go to NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness), a Hancock County grassroots mental health initiative.

For the distribution of the Opal Thompson funds (\$10,317) generously entrusted to us by the Community Foundation, Ukraine was heavy on our hearts. The committee, who usually debates on beneficiaries for several months, decided they we must act quickly and nominated the *ELCA Lutheran Disaster Response*, *Ukrainian Fund* as the majority recipient of the gift. \$8,815 of the Opal and Tell Thompson benevolence was distributed to Lutheran Disaster Response.

Keeping with tradition, the committee will also disperse some of the funds locally, to the *Fostoria Sharing Kitchen* and the *Findlay City Mission.* \$750 of the Opal and Tell Thompson benevolence was distributed to the City Mission and the Fostoria Kitchen respectively.

On another note, the committee along with help from our Sunday schools, packed up 75 bags of taxable necessities (soaps and hygiene items) to distribute at upcoming Community Dinners.

As always we thank you, our congregation at First, for supporting our committee and our mission of





YOUR GIVING MAKES A DIFFERENCE.

At our Annual Congregational meeting on Sunday, January 23, a recommendation from the Finance Committee was presented for First Lutheran Church to send \$10,000 in financial assistance to an ELCA Lutheran Church in the western part of Kentucky affected by the devastating tornados in December 2021. A motion for the recommendation was moved and seconded. Following a time for discussion, the members present at the meeting approved the motion to send \$10,000 in financial aid from our Surplus Dedicated Fund.

From the discussions, our wishes for these funds are to be used to help with repairs on their church facility and/or to help any members of their congregation, with financial assistance for such things as repairs to house/property, transportation, medical expenses, etc.

The Finance Committee identified two ELCA churches in western Kentucky from a listing of congregations from the Indiana/Kentucky Synod website. A phone call was made to the IN/KY Synod office, and we discussed our commitment to send financial aid to an ELCA congregation with Rev Heather Apel, Assistant to the Synod Bishop. Rev Apel acknowledged the two congregations we identified, St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Paducah, KY and St. Matthew by the Lake Lutheran Church in Benton, KY. She said St. Matthew in Paducah was not affected by the tornados, but St. Matthew by the Lake was affected. It was decided to send our financial support to St. Matthew by the Lake Lutheran Church.

Rev Colleen Winkler, pastor of St. Matthew by the Lake Lutheran Church, was called and told of the commitment by First Lutheran Church to send financial assistance to their congregation and our wishes for how the funds are to be used. She was very thankful and appreciative of the generous contribution from our congregation. A letter and check were sent to St. Matthew by the Lake Lutheran Church. We continue to keep their congregation along with many other affected by the December tornado event in our thoughts and prayers for continued healing. —Finance Committee

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
