CCA receives Iowa Leaders in Ag Award

The Clear Creek Amana School District was recognized by the State of Iowa's Department of Agriculture for promoting and serving locally produced foods at CCA schools at the Iowa Ag Leaders Banquet in Ankeny March 8

A release from the Iowa Ag Secretary reads, "Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig recognized organizations and entities making exceptional contributions to the state's agriculture community. Naig presented the awards to the City of Cedar Rapids; Country View Dairy; Clear Creek Amana Community School District - Field to Family' the Mighty Howard County Fair; Bill Northey and Craig Hill during the 10th annual Iowa Agriculture Leaders dinner held at the FFA Enrichment Center in Ankeny on March 8.

"Over the 10 years of the lowa Agriculture Leader Awards, we have recognized people and organizations that are making a difference for our farmers and rural communities," said Secretary Naig. "I am proud to continue that tradition this year by recognizing outstanding leaders who champion conservation, build new markets for lowa products and engage the next generation of agriculture leaders."

Debbie Klein, Nutrition Director at Clear Creek Amana Community School District was there to receive the award for Leadership in Market Diversification on behalf of the CCA District.

The award recognized the work being done at Clear Creek Amana CSD to incorporate locally-produced or grown food into the school menus while supporting local agriculture. CCA serves yogurt and other products from local sources. They are working directly with Country View Dairy in Hawkeye, lowa, a 250- head diary that produces its own yogurt, "Field to Family." Clear

Creek Amana shares this award with Field to Family and Country View Dairy for Leadership in Market Diversification.

Bird Watch Amana

The past couple of weeks have seen a large uptick in the number of birds in the Amanas as the spring migration is on. Thanks to birdwatchinghq.com and my own bird books for this information about observations.

Birds we are seeing these days in these parts:

- About 15 species of duck.
- Herons have a smaller population hence are seen in small numbers, but they are back or moving through lowa now. Great blue herons and the hard to see but common, black crowned, night heron, have been spotted.
- Canada geese of which there are greater numbers than ever in the middle west. Canada geese, well adapted to modern North America, are in here in abundance.
- Snow geese. These have white to grey bodies, but have blackish wing feathers.
- Ross's goose. A Ross's goose looks like a snow goose, but has a stubby bill, smaller head and black rear tail feathers with a white belly.
- The cackling goose which looks just like a Canada goose but has a stubby head, shorter bill and shorter neck.

- The greater white fronted goose which has a mostly grey to brownish colored body with a white patch on the front of his face above his orange/ gold bill and white on the bottom/ rump area. They have a shorter neck than the Canada goose. They aren't native to the midwest but do move through lowa this time of year.
- The tundra swan which looks very like a trumpeter but is a bit smaller in size and has a small, yellow patch below/ in front of their eyes. These migrate through lowa, but don't live here generally. They are known to make a sort of "whistling" noise when they fly so are often called "whistling swans."
- The mute swans. These are very large birds, have long necks and orange bills. They are not mute and they are not native to lowa. They were originally imported from Europe and are the graceful swans we generally associate with ponds in pretty parks.
- The trumpeter swan. The trumpeter swan is the largest native bird in lowa and is the only swan native to lowa. They have a black bill and black facial "hair" from bill to eyes. They have black to grey colored feet and legs.

Mary Lou is survived by her husband Willard; five children, Sharon (Terry) Roberts of Marengo; Dean (Mary) Dickel of Mineral Point, WI; Joan (Russ) Jones of Williamsburg; Chris (Donna) Dickel of Green Castle, MO; and Danny (Mandy) Dickel of Marengo; in addition to 16 grandchildren and 31 great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her parents; three brothers, William, Albert and John; and two sisters, Janet Aiken and Edna Michalek.

Mary Lou Aiken was born August 1, 1933, in rural Victor, the daughter of Ralph and Jesse (Shine) Aiken. The family moved to a smaller farm west of Marengo during The Great Depression. Mary Lou graduated from Marengo High School in 1952 and later received a teaching degree from Iowa State Teachers College in Cedar Falls (now the University of Northern Iowa). She married Willard Dickel in Marengo on Oct. 23, 1954. Willard and Mary Lou purchased the Aiken Farm in 1957. They lived there until Willard's father died in 1961, at which time the family moved to the Dickel house in Middle Amana. The family moved back to the Marengo farm about 1967 and all five children received much of their education at Iowa Valley Schools.

Mary Lou loved farm life and always a had a large garden that provided a bounty of potatoes, tomatoes, corn and other staples. Flowers were her passion. Stray animals somehow sensed they would never be turned away if they found their way to Mary Lou.

Around 2000 Willard retired from farming and he and Mary Lou moved back to Middle. Willard took over the gardening when Mary Lou's health started to fail.

FREE SEEDLINGS AT GATEWAY PARK ARBORETUM TREE WALK

A guided Spring Tree Walk in conjunction with a distribution of free tree seedlings will take place April 23rd at 2 pm. at Gateway Park Arboretum located on the north edge of Marengo. There will also be a tree planting demonstration and door prizes.

Gateway Park Arboretum, has been awarded a Level I Accreditation by The ArbNet Arboretum Accreditation Program and The Morton Arboretum, for achieving particular standards of professional practices deemed important for arboreta and botanic gardens. The ArbNet Arboretum Accreditation Program is the only global initiative to officially recognize arboreta at various levels of development, capacity, and professionalism. Gateway Park Arboretum is also now recognized as an accredited arboretum in the Morton Register of Arboreta, (http://www.arbnet.org/morton-register-arboreta) a database of the world's arboreta and gardens dedicated to woody plants.

Gateway Park Arboretum was created in 2004 with a grant that was used to purchase 70 trees. A

collection of conifers was donated and planted that same year. Today there are 36 different species of identified trees and shrubs including 10 species of oaks and 12 species of conifers.

A walking trail runs through the arboretum and continues around a 41-acre lake that is part of Gateway Park and Preserve. A meditation garden provides space for trail walkers to pause and rest or reflect. Guided tree walks and educational activities are organized by lowa County Master Gardeners and lowa County Conservation Naturalists.

Arboretum accreditation is an important step toward achieving the goal of educating the public about the importance and the beauty of trees and their place in the natural world.

Gateway Park Arboretum encompasses 7.5 acres of trees, shrubs, and perennial gardens. It is nestled within Gateway Park and Preserve, a 131-acre property owned by Iowa County Conservation.
